### SPECIAL TOWN MEETING PLANNED ON WATER TREATMENT PLANT

The Board of Selectmen has set a date of Thursday, July 27, at 7p.m. in the Alton Central School Gymnasium for a Special Town Meeting to act upon the following warrant article:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00), gross budget, for the construction and equipping of a water treatment plant; and furthermore, to authorize the issuance of not more than forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Revenue Bond Act (RSA 33-B), and to authorize the Water Commission to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, subject to the approval of the Selectmen. (2/3 Ballot Vote Required)"


The purpose of having a Special Town Meeting to vote on this Article is to correct a mistake at the 1995 Annual Town Meeting where a similar Article had been approved by more than a two-thirds majority but a ballot vote was not taken. As a result of this error, the NH Department of Revenue Administration has disallowed the previous vote (Article 14 of the March 1995 Town Meeting).

The Selectmen have sought and obtained permission from the Superior Court to have the Special Meeting. A public hearing on the Article will be scheduled by the Budget Committee.

# KEVIN D. IWANS SELECTED AS ALTON POLICE CHIEF

The Town of Alton has hired Kevin D. Iwans to be the new Police Chief. He started on June 12.

Iwans was formerly a detective with the Dover Police Department. At the Dover P.D., he was recognized as one of the premier investigators and was most recently rated as a senior crime analyst. He is also a firearms instructor and has participated in numerous law enforcement training programs.

He has 12 years of law enforcement experience serving New Hampshire communities. Prior to this, he was a security police officer in the U.S. Air Force for 4 years.

He has 2 sons, Kristopher, age 12 and Mark, age 10. He was born in Boston, MA, graduated from high school in Norway, ME, and is working towards a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice at the University of New Hampshire.

Chief Iwans comes highly recommended by his peers, supervisors, past and present chiefs, and prosecuting attorneys with whom he has worked in the past. His law enforcement administration skills were specifically selected after a lengthy and painstaking search to complement and enhance the police leadership system that is already in place at the Alton Police Department.

Chief Iwans will supervise a 24 hour emergency response department with 7 additional full-time officers, 3 part-time officers and 2 full-time secretary/dispatchers.

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# IN MEMORY OF CATHERINE S. CALVERT

A resident of Alton since 1983, Catherine Calvert contributed to her community as a volunteer at the Alton Central School, the Gilman Library, and for Main Street.

Her participation in Main Street began as a member of the founding committee and subsequently as an incorporator and long-time secretary of Voice of Alton, Inc., the publishing organization of Main Street. Cathy served as a reporter and assistant editor, often taking on stories when no one else would volunteer. She was always present at the monthly meetings when the pages had to be collated and stapled for distribution. Her contributions over the last ten years were immeasurable, her counsel was invaluable and her spirit was unflagging.

Cathy was a very special person - always willing to help out - never seeking credit - always doing the right thing. The staff of Main Street and the community of Alton will miss her.

# IT'S MAIN STREET'S FIFTH BIRTHDAY

Much research and study preceded the first issue of Main Street in July 1985. It really began over a year earlier with four Alton residents attending the state-wide conference hosted by the NH School Volunteer Program on community-school relationships. They returned from the conference with a number of proposals and ideas to share with a gathering of several local organizations and interests in Alton. One proposal stood out - a newsletter consolidating information on events of general interest and importance to school and community alike. Because no single news source of local events was available, a decision was made to begin working toward the development of such a newsletter for Alton. A small grant from the C.S. Mott Foundation was received to "seed" the project.

A working committee of five met for several months to plan editorial and advertising policies, secure non-profit incorporation under the name of Voice of Alton, Inc., choose a name for the newsletter, and guidelines for establishing a solid base for a long-term project. The quintet of Bill Watkins, John Duffek, Chris Consentino, Dave McKenney, and Cathy Calvert doubled as the editorial as well as production staff. Bill Watkins was named publisher, but he also wrote articles and served as advertising manager. John Duffek was named editor, and he too took on all kinds of additional duties. Much is owed to these two innovators, without whom there probably would not have been Main Street.

Five years have passed, and the all-volunteer staff has increased to 19. As this 5th anniversary issue hits the mail, John Duffek is still the editor, and Alton's monthly newsletter has been cited by the NH Municipal Association as an outstanding example of school-community relations and communications excellence. Over 40 local residents have served for periods of time.....some as writers, some as "folders and staplers", and some in circulation and advertising. We are proud to have established a Main Street scholarship, given for the second time to an Alton graduating senior who contributed to the field of journalism.

There is much evidence that <u>Main Street</u> has been well-received by Alton's citizenry, and on this 5th birthday we salute our valued readers and pledge another five years of effective and constantly improving communications as the "Voice of Alton".

### GILMAN LIBRARY CAMPAIGN PASSES THE 63% MARK

The Gilman Library Expansion Fund campaign took another major step forward this past month as the campaign passed the \$315,000 mark or 63% of the \$500,000 goal. The momentum appears to be building (no pun intended). A sizable gift of \$50,000 from the activities of the Trustees of Trust Funds led the parade. Memorial gifts and package gifts are helping considerably. And now for the first time, the private phase of the campaign passed the town allocation total, most unusual in area library campaigns where the town portion normally averages from 60% to 80% of the total. This is a tribute to Alton residents who have already established a capital campaign giving record in our town.

### FOUR ALTON STUDENTS TO ATTEND **WASHINGTON DC YOUTH TOUR**

New Hampshire Electric Cooperative, Inc. is sending eight high school students to Washington, D.C. on Friday, June 16, to attend the National Rural Electric Youth Tour.

Laura Coots, Chris Dore, Kelly Lord and Stephanie Osborn from Alton High School, along with Sarah Bartlett, Kathy Butman, Chrissy Gagnon and Lura Sanborn from Pittsfield High School won the one week trip by participating in the Cooperative's Youth Tour Contest. Once in Washington, D.C. they will be joined by hundreds of other students from rural electric cooperatives across the country.

The purpose of the trip is to give students the opportunity to learn more about the government, American history, rural electrification and visit Washington's many monuments, museums and memorials. A private tour of the White House, visiting with congressmen, a play at Ford's Theater, a cruise on the Potomac, touring Mount Vernon, a wreath laying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery and the Marine Sunset Parade are some of the highlights of the trip.

The Youth Tour is coordinated by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA), headquartered in Washington, D.C. NRECA is a service organization to the over 1000 rural electric cooperatives that operate in 46 states. New Hampshire Electric Cooperative selects its Youth Tourers on the basis of a contest that includes an essay and personal interview.

# Alton Central School Student Wins Travel Scholarship to Europe

Diane J. Carr, a tenth grader at Alton Central School, will travel to Europe this summer on an EF Ambassador Scholarship. Diane, together with teenagers from every region of the U.S. and Canada, will visit London, Paris, Geneva and Lucerne on the EF Ambassador Tour. Sponsored by EF Educational Tours of Cambridge, Mass., the tour will celebrate the innovative ideas of North American students during a ten-day circuit of learning and discovery.

The Alton resident won the travel award for her winning idea to change the world, a proposal, excerpted below, promoting communication.

"One concrete change that I would make to this world," writes Diane, "would be to further develop our ties of communication and language with other countries of the world. Communication is a fundamental process of today's modern world. The information transmitted between each country is a valuable key that opens the door to a different and important world. I believe that to keep our society moving forward, we must learn to appreciate not only the ideas and thoughts, but also the oral sound and literature of the languages of our cultures. We cannot even begin to imagine the amount of knowledge and importance each language holds. We're depriving ourselves of the wisdom and spirit of cultures by the lack of effort to understand the usage of words." Diane recommends that schools adopt foreign language requirements; create more



student exchange opportunities; and make foreign language television, radio, books and magazines more available to "help influence people to realize how important languages really are."

Diane was one of more than 1000 high school students from every U.S. state who applied for the award, identifying one change they would like to make to their world (at a local or global level); why they would make this change; and how they would implement it. Submissions were judged for feasibility, clarity of concept, quality of thought, and presentation.

Departing July 8, EF Ambassadors will travel vast distancesboth geographic and cultural from 50 U.S. states and 11 Canadian provinces. Participants will come from public schools and private; from rural towns and urban neighborhoods; and from backgrounds as diverse as the continent of North America.

The travelers will first fly to Washington, DC, where they will meet their fellow ambassadors before boarding a transatlantic flight to England. From there, highlights of the tour will include London, Windsor, Oxford, Stratford, Paris, Versailles, Geneva and Lucerne. All costs-including domestic and international airfare, intercity transportation, accommodations, breakfast and dinner, professional sightseeing and selected attractions-are covered by EE.

EF Educational Tours sponsors the Ambassador Scholarship program, now in its second year, in support of creativity and innovation in North American youth. According to Olle A. Olsson, president of EF Educational Tours, "EF firmly believes in the importance of awarding excellent students, and providing them with opportunities to learn about the world through firsthand experience. We are proud to support students through travel scholarships, and we welcome this year's Ambassadors to the Global Classroom."

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


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# ALTON SCHOOL 1945-1975 Part II

The new four room elementary school and gymnasium, completed in 1955, received praise from Superintendent John Day. The Frank Howard property was moved across the street to make way for the present parking lot by the gym and outbuildings were moved and the surrounding grounds leveled and graded for the playground and ballfields. That year the town of New Durham voted not to enter into a 10 year contract with Alton but the loss in tuition revenue was offset by more room for the growing student numbers.

By 1957, increasing emphasis was put on changes in the educational programs, administrative practices, and the approved status of the high school by state standards. Minimum action was recommended in all class areas, guidance services, the school library and the cafeteria. Total enrollment was now 285. That year the shop students made bleachers for one side of the gym.

In 1959 another two room addition was built for the elementary school. Television was used in many of the elementary and high school classes and the elementary school finally had individual classrooms for each grade. Superintendent Jason Boynton gave credit to work done over the summer by George Stevens who resurfaced all the desk tops and renovated the science room, and Cad Morgan, who refinished every floor in the high school and to the extensive improvements of the science lab.

Special education classes began in 1960 as Alton joined the surrounding towns of New Durham, Moultonboro, Wolfeboro and Tuftonboro in the former VFW Post building located in South Wolfeboro. An article in the 1962 School Warrant approved preliminary plans for the building needs of the school.



In 1963 New Durham voted to join the new Kingswood Regional High School in Wolfeboro, In an emotional meeting and long debate, Alton voters choose to keep their high school here and committed themselves to meet the educational challenges of the future. Our new high school was built in 1964 and the old school was demolished. An era was ended. The changes since 1945 were as dramatic internally as they were structurally for our little town as indeed they were throughout the whole country.

Another addition was needed to the elementary school in 1973 and kindergarten classes were added that year. In 1975 the school population had grown to 428. The teachers numbered 33 and the support staff had grown to 12. We were still in Supervisory Union 49 in Wolfeboro and the school was now a business by itself under many federal and state mandates.

We have remained a small school, meeting challenges and committed to individual students. Many of our graduates have left, some have returned to raise their families and others have stayed on in Alton and enjoyed the benefits of this small but growing community. All have contributed in some way over the years to the Alton School.


#### A GATHERING FOR ALL NATIONS





# MODEL WIND TUNNEL OFFERED TO AREA SCHOOLS BY RETIRED ENGINEER

Alton is fortunate to have as one of its residents Rolf Dutzmann, a retired aerospace engineer who lives with his wife at Mauhaut Shores. He presently serves as a volunteer at the Alton Central School where he is the advisor to the Young Astronauts Chapter. He lectures on aeronautics and astronautics, as well.

Meeting with Mr. Dutzmann recently, I learned that he is a member of the National Space Society, the National Association of Rocketry, the Academy of Model Aeronautics, and the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics.

As a member of the New England Section of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, Mr. Dutzmann was aware of the Institute's concern that most schools lack appropriate equipment to introduce students to the basic principles of aerodynamics. Recognizing this shortcoming, the Institute provided plans to its members for building small portable wind tunnels (miniature versions of the wind tunnels used in development testing of aircraft and their components).

The wind tunnel consists of three parts: the entrance cone, the test section and the diffuser. Air is pulled through the test section by a three-speed fan mounted at the exit from the diffuser. The plexiglass test section allows visual observation of the test object that can be rotated to demonstrate the effect of different angles-of-attack on the test object.

Mr. Dutzmann's wind tunnel device is ready for use in area schools as a tool for an introduction to basic aerodynamics. He has compiled a packet describing in detail the wind tunnel and its uses, as well as providing suggested activities to accompany demonstrations. These packets offering his services free of charge have been sent to local schools.

Mr. Dutzmann demonstrated for me some of the activities used in introducing basic aerodynamics with and without the tunnel. They were fascinating and he presents them in a way that is both interesting and readily understandable. Students who have the opportunity to participate in this program are in for a real treat!

# HOME AND GARDEN TOUR SCHEDULED FOR JULY 12 TO BENEFIT HOSPICE



Kellie McGrath is one of Alton's highly visible public servants. This UNH leisure management and tourism major has directed, developed and expanded Alton's Parks and Recreation program since October, 1992, to the point of becoming one of the finest in Central N.H. And considering the results and impact on Alton residents young and old, it's unquestionably one of Alton's "best values" in terms of tax dollars expended.

She's in the first office to the right on the first floor as you enter Town Hall. She's very personable, service and results-oriented and very happy in her job. She sees her mission as providing activities and program opportunities for Alton residents of all ages. And a look at the current summer schedule confirms that she is delivering on this mission.

How does one choose this career field? In her case she has always liked planning and executing such plans. She is dedicated to the principle that it's easier to join activities and events in your own neighborhood than to go a distance to find them. She's people-oriented, and she's here to help people with their recreational and other needs.

She admits that there are still unmet recreational needs in Alton. One such need is two more combination soccer and baseball fields. Such activities have skyrocketed, and there just isn't current space for



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all who want to participate. She also sees a need for a "community activities center" equipped for indoor activities in the winter. There's a need for a gym and meeting rooms that could also serve as an afterschool activity center. The Civic Profile study a few years ago pointed to this major need. And Kellie sees a need for more hiking and biking trails.

She's high on the quantity and quality of volunteer support for the program. A great committee and people coming forward to help in individual events combine to make this so. Other longer-range goals include a stronger fall and winter program. She'd like to see more Senior Citizens involved. And she envisions special programs for tots and toddlers.

Many don't realize that this office is also responsible for maintenance of all lawns at town buildings and for maintenance at "the Bay", including the public restrooms. If you have not met Kellie McGrath, stop by the Town Hall and shake her hand and congratulate her on a great job for all of us. And even if you have met her, drop by and do the same!

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

#### **HOLWAY PAINTINGS ON DISPLAY**




