

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING APPROVED BY SUPERIOR COURT FOR JULY 24

The Board of Selectmen recently petitioned the Superior Court to authorize a Special Town Meeting on Wednesday, July 24, at 7p.m. for the purpose of purchasing a piece of property adjacent to the Gilman Library on Main Street. The property is to be used in conjunction with the Library expansion.

Because the property was not available prior to the Annual Town Meeting, a special session must receive approval.

The only article on the warrant will ask the town "to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00), gross budget, and to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a parcel of land located at Tax Map 27, Lot 36; said land to be used in association with the expansion of the Gilman Library; provided that all acquisition expenses are paid equally divided as follows: not more than twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) shall be paid from the Agnes Thompson Memorial Fund as approved by the Library Trustees and not more than twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) shall be paid from the Clough-Morrell Trust Fund as approved by the Trustees of Trust Funds; whereby no funds for this purpose shall be raised from tax dollars".

BICENTENNIAL DAY IS FITTING TRIBUTE TO ALTON'S 200 YEAR HISTORY

Alton's glorious Bicentennial Day began with a special breakfast and ended with a spectacular fireworks display with a variety of wonderful events in between.

Bicentennial Day, the result of years of planning by a hard-working committee under the direction of Chairman Nancy Merrill, was the first major event of this special year. Other events are planned including a special parade during Old Home Week in August.

The churches of Alton and the Alton Bay Campmeeting Association sponsored a breakfast at the Lombard Center on the Campground to get the day off to a good start. Peter Roussaki, pastor of the Community Church, and Roy Ames, pastor of the Bay Church, briefly described the history of their churches and Campground Director David Northup was the master of ceremonies.

Church bells were heard throughout the community at noon to note the special day as residents and guests gathered at the Town Hall to witness the dedication of two hallway murals created by Alton artist Joan Chase. The murals were underwritten by the Richard Dame and Thomas Fry families.

A Bicentennial Walk from the Town Hall to Alton Central School for the Bicentennial Program was led by Master of Ceremonies Bob Calvert.

Various speakers offered congratulations, poems, a bicentennial song, plaques, and proclamations to note the event including U.S. Senator Bob Smith; U.S. Congressman Bill Zeliff, State Senator Leo Fraser, State Representatives Alice Ziegra, Linda Ann Smith, and Gordon Bartlett; Alton songwriter Todd McKinney; Committee members George W. Stone, Jr. and Virginia Dore; and Terri Rollins-Noyes. Music was provided by Moulton's Band.

The evening began and the day concluded with a family picnic in Alton Bay followed by a concert by the Freese Brothers Band and fireworks over the Bay.

Since the date 1796 represents a transitional period in clothing, Betsy's clothes range from "Colonial" style with panniers and petticoats to the "latest" fashions with a high waistline. Betsy has underwear including a corset for each of these styles and outerwear such as cape, shawl and hats. She has everyday clothing and party clothing as well as a riding habit. All clothing has been carefully researched by HHDC members and made to be as authentic as possible.

Betsy is currently on display at Parker Marine in Alton Bay. Betsy will be raffled off August 16 with proceeds to benefit the club's long-range goal of a doll museum in the Alton area.

ALTON SCHOOL BOARD GETS STATE APPROVAL TO FORM NEW SAU

The Alton School Board recently applied to the State Board of Education for permission to form its own School Administrative Unit (SAU) and it received approval to do so last month. It was the second request this year. The first was denied in January after the school boards in Barnstead and Pittsfield, who along with Alton comprise the current SAU 51, opposed Alton's request.

This time both Barnstead and Pittsfield gave approval to the plan and the State agreed to establish SAU 72 as of July 1, 1997.

According to Alton School Board Chairman Arnold "Pete" Shibley, the new SAU might cost an extra \$20,000 or \$30,000 for the first year, but after that, he expects the cost to be equal to what Alton taxpayers pay now, about \$150,000. Shibley said the new SAU plans to hire a full-time superintendent, business manager and secretary.

Alton has wanted to leave SAU 51 for some time because, based on its equalized property values, Alton taxpayers pay half the costs of the SAU, but receive only one-third of the services.

Last month, Art Saulnier contributed to this column a brief bit of history about the origins of senior center on Pearson Road. We would like to continue the Saga of the Old Barn on the Hill with his second installment:

The main reason for this article on the Senior Center is to show how it came to be as we know it today.

Prior to the seniors getting involved, Stanley Olender petitioned the town of Alton to purchase the property, which they did. A committee was formed consisting of Mr. Olender, Ralph Littlefield, and some other townspeople. A study was made and architects hired to draw up plans for what they wanted to do with the property. The end result was a petition to the Town for \$90,000. It was turned down, and the property became a dead issue. Mr. Olender told us that they got nowhere with the site. At the time, the Town was contemplating a new police station. Mike Stanley, the Town inspector at the time, made a suggestion that they use the property for the new police station, but the Town preferred the station where it is now.

About a year later, when the Seniors found out about the property, it was being used as a garage for the Parks and Recreation Department and also as a storeroom for replacement toilets and sinks for the restrooms at the Bay. The Alton Seniors petitioned the Selectman to give them permission to see what they could do. If the Seniors hadn't volunteered, would it still be a garage for the Parks Dept., or might it have been sold?

Mr. Saulnier's history of the senior center will be continued next month. In the meantime, keep cool during the lazy, hazy days, and remember, there is a lot to do and enjoy in the beautiful town of Alton!



TOWN HALL NOTES

QUALITY OF LIFE

The Alton quality of life has been demonstrated in its finest with recent celebrations for Memorial Day and the Bicentennial Day. It was wonderful to see folks and families turn out to come together for these special occasions. Larger towns may do things such as this on a bigger scale, but the small town touch is what we are all about. Congratulations to all who played a role in organizing these events.

A Special Town Meeting has been scheduled for Wednesday, July 24, to see if the Town will vote to approve the purchase of the Haase property on Main Street, next to the Library. Permission had to be obtained from a Superior Court Judge to hold this "emergency" meeting. Right now the Town is holding an option to buy this property for \$47,900, but this option expires on July 31. If approved by the voters, this property would be used to relocate a new septic system and parking lot as part of the Gilman Library expansion project. If approved, Town Meeting voters will also be asked for their input on what to do with the building, options include: have the Fire Department burn it as a training mission; auction the building and have the buyer remove it; or have the Town move it to the old Route 140 Salt Shed foundation.

Welcome aboard to Paul Varney as the newest Truck Driver for the Highway Department. And speaking of Highway Department trucks, the Selectmen have voted to purchase a new Mack truck with a dump body, head plow, wing plow and sander, with funds approved at Town Meeting. This new set of wheels cost \$94,857, based on bid prices, which is under budget and should be on the road by October 1.

During the month of June, Police Chief Kevin Iwans and Town Clerk's Clerical Assistant Lynn Brooks both completed their first full year of employment with the Town. Roger Clark began working as the part-time, seasonal laborer responsible for keeping the Bay restrooms and parking lots clean. Helen Laurion has been appointed Water Works Clerk. Congratulations to each of these people.

Here are some things to think about until next month...don't forget to license your dog, check out the summer offerings by the Parks and Recreation Department, drive safely, be kind to tourists and summer visitors and stay cool!

Lastly, if you are like me and spend many a moment thinking of ways to improve your government of the people, for the people and by the people, have you ever wondered why judges are appointed for life? A CENTURY OF ALTON YOUTH CAMPS ON DISPLAY IN TOWN HALL

During the month of July the display case in Town Hall will provide a glimpse of camp life in years past as well as a glimpse into camp life as it is in the 1990s. Come enjoy memorabilia collected from several boys and girls camps that are active and thriving in Alton today. The exhibit is open Monday through Friday, 8:30a.m. to 4:30p.m.

The following is excerpted from George W. Stone's minihistory on youth camps in Alton completed in 1993. The complete mini-history essay will be available for reading at the Gilman Library and the Alton Historical Society by the latter part of July.

At the celebration of Alton's Centennial in 1896 no camps for youth existed in Town. It seems appropriate now, on the eve of the celebration of the Town's Bicentennial, that note be taken of the hundred year history of such camps in Alton during the Town's second century.

Alton has had, in its time, fifteen prospering camps for boys and girls: Kehonka, Khoo-Khoo-Khoos, Kuwiyan, Mi-Te-Na, Mishe Mokwa, Lawrence, Winnipesaukee, Norbey, DeWitt, Herrick, Kabeyun, Alton, Advenchur, Deer Run, and Brookwoods.


In 1993 five operate — Mi-Te-Na, Kabeyun, Advenchur, Brookwoods, and Deer Run. Only one is, in a sense, a private camp (Kabeyun), which has now been deeded to the Audubon Society of New Hampshire, which has agreed to maintain its open space for campers.

The goals of Alton's camps, were and are about the same, to enable their young campers to have fun, acquire self confidence and independence, learn a good deal about many things, build character, establish solid friendships, and lead socially adjusted lives for at least eight weeks.

The overall numbers involved in Alton Camps from 1902 to 1992 comes to at least 61,000 bodies. All in all, Alton's fifteen camps occupied 11,000 acres and enjoyed over four miles of shore line.

Times and finances for operating a youth camp changed over the years. Camp property came on the market and developers gradually acquired lakeshore property, now sought after by families wishing to escape the crowding of metropolitan areas in the city and build second homes in the picturesque Lakes Region.

This is the time of the year when a little hard work on your lawn will repay you with a lot of hard work later on.





PAULETTE ALDEN HONORED ON RETIREMENT FROM ALTON SCHOOL

Paulette Alden, a teacher at Alton Central School for more than 31 years, was recently honored at a reception and dinner at Sandy Point Restaurant attended by over 100 family members, colleagues and friends.

Accolades, memories and humor were the focus of remarks by the various speakers. Former Alton Principal and current Superintendent of Schools for the Governor Wentworth School district Sherwood Fluery served as master of ceremonies and described Alden as a teacher always willing to give extra time to her students. "I would see her after hours regularly - almost daily - taking students under her wing and trying to help them through the field of mathematics."

Alton Principal George J. Rogers recalled some of the comments made about Alden in her evaluations over the years. These included "an outstanding professional. Organized, students on task at all times. Outstanding, devotes after school time for extra help for her students. A master teacher. Among the best. Mrs. Alden's value to the school cannot be overstated. She is a true professional. The school is lucky to have a teacher of her caliber."

Social Studies Teacher Nancy Merrill, retired mathematics Department Chairman Ted Bense, and retired School Librarian Jean Roberts also spoke in tribute to Alden.

During most of her career Alden taught mathematics, but also taught French, English, chemistry, physics, and general business. She is a graduate of Mount St. Mary College in Hooksett.

A committee of Nancy Merrill, Nancy Thomas, Sherry Brown, Connie Racine, Joan Chase and Barbara Francis planned the activity.



KEEPING OUR WATERS CLEAR AND CLEAN

The lazy, hazy days of summer are upon us this month, and all who enjoy Alton outdoors usually stick close to the water. The local waters are still relatively clear and clean though some long standing residents say the waters are dirtier than years ago. With the many people who use our waters, we must all be aware of not abusing them.

The boats and motors we use must be checked for fuel leaks. Septic systems must not leach into our waters, and people must not take a bath in our lakes or streams. I still see people using soaps and shampoos in our waters. Perhaps they are visitors, but maybe not. I've seen this bathing in the Big Lake, Merrymeeting, Sunset and Crystal to name a few. Please help stop this polluting practice.

July 1 starts another phase in fishing for bass, when bass may be taken by bait, flies or artificial lures with a daily limit of 5 bass. Sunfish can be caught easily this month and can provide some tasty meals. Some may reach 8-9 inches although most are smaller. One must collect the fillets of several sunfish to make a meal, but it's worth it. They taste just like flounder. Try it.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE **COLLECTION DAY IS JULY 27**

Now is the time to start checking your house, garage and workshop for hazardous items that you would like to dispose of. Household Hazardous Waste Collection will be held Saturday, July 27, from 9a.m. to noon. This is an annual opportunity to safely discard materials that can contaminate our lakes, streams and groundwater.

Alton residents and taxpayers may bring waste to any of nine collection sites throughout the Lakes Region. Collection sites closest to Alton are the Gilford Department of Public Works, the Wolfeboro Public Works Garage, and the Belmont Elementary School. Other sites include the Bristol Highway Garage, the Franklin Department of Public Works, the Laconia Department of Public Works Garage, the Meredith Department of Public Works, the Moultonborough Town Highway Garage and the Ossipee Town Highway Garage. What to Bring:

FROM THE HOUSE

drain cleaners oven cleaners metal polish arts and crafts supplies photo chemicals floor cleaners dry cleaning fluids old pills and medicines radiator cleaners

FROM THE YARD AND GARDEN

pesticides in one gallon or smaller containers (including DDT and chlordane)

herbicides insect sprays rodent killers pool chemicals muriatic acid no-pest strips cesspool cleaners

FROM THE GARAGE

used motor oil antifreeze brake fluid old car batteries (limit 2 per family) engine and radiator flushes gasoline transmission fluid old chemistry sets

FROM THE WORKBENCH

rust preventatives wood preservatives wood strippers oil-based paints paint thinner solvents degreasers sealants

Please bring only household products. No commercial waste is allowed! Each household is limited to 10 gallons (containers no larger than 5 gallons). Car pooling is allowed and encouraged. Put individual items in a box (no bags). DO NOT MIX OR **CONSOLIDATE THE ITEMS.** Each participant will be asked to complete a brief survey which helps to improve future collection efforts.

This year the Town of Alton joins 21 Lakes Region communities in sponsoring Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day, which is organized by the Lakes Region Planning Commission. Alton's participation in this effort is coordinated by the Conservation Commission. 

The playground is designed for children 5-12 years of age and is a great addition to the Jones Field Recreation Area. The playground is bright and vibrant with blue, red and yellow colors


The following components make up the new playground: two Slides, horizontal and end climbers, loop bridge, climbing pole, spider climber, bumper ladder, decks and transfer points.




