CARR AND HOPPER ON SCHOOL BOARD WILLIAM RYAN IS NEW SELECTMAN

The annual Town and School District elections drew only 758 of the 3,195 eligible voters last month as various Town and School District positions were decided.

There were only three races contested. William Ryan (342 votes) was elected selectman for three years beating Peter J. Pijoan (235) and Albert C. Burbank (113). There were six filed candidates running for the two three-year School Board positions in addition to one announced write-in candidate. Incumbent Robert L. Carr (377) and PTSA President Joyce Hopper (284) were elected, followed by Robert Loprete (191), William "Bill" Watson, Jr. (145), Angelyn D. Duffy (143), and Marjorie O'Toole (77)

Four people ran for the two three-year positions on the Planning Board. The results were David P. Sleeper, Sr. (393), Pamela Canuel (261), Ruthanne Barnett (254), and Stephen Sheldon (235).

Unchallenged Town candidates included Gwendolyn M. Jones, Town Clerk for three years (672); Anne M. Kroeger, Tax Collector for three years (642); Helen M. Sullivan, Treasurer for three years (619); Muriel Stinson, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years (645); Kenneth G. Roberts, Highway Agent for three years (620); Ellamarie Carr, Library Trustee for three years (610); Russell E. Jones, Fire Ward for three years (671); John E. Streeter, Water Commissioner for three years (617); Pamela Canuel, Budget Committee for two years (549); Scott Gage, Budget Committee for one year (519); Bonnie Dunbar, Planning Board for one year (527); and Nancy L. Mokrzecki, Supervisor of the Checklist for three years, (577).

School District candidates running unopposed included Terri A. Noyes, School Moderator for one year (548), Cynthia A. Duffek, School Clerk for one year (626); and Shirley E. Young, School Treasurer for one year (626)

Write-in candidates Laurie Boyce (95), Scott Sweezey (20) and Ruth Messier (14) were elected members of the Budget Committee for three years. Tom Hoopes received 16 write-in votes for Cemetery Trustee for three years.

Voters split their opinion when it came to adopting the provisions for official ballot voting on all issues, commonly referred to as SB2. The vote required 3/5 to pass and it was defeated for Town issues and passed for School District issues. A recount was requested of the School District results and the original outcome was confirmed.

By a vote of 472 to 203, residents indicated that the Board of Selectmen should be increased from three members to five. The question of modifying elderly exemptions was approved 546 to 104.

All zoning amendments with the exception of an amendment submitted by petition regarding sign regulations, were approved.

\$3.4 MILLION BUDGET APPROVED AT 1997 TOWN MEETING

The 1997 Alton Town Meeting, held on March 12, will not be remembered for its smooth sailing in adopting a \$3.4 million town budget - rather, it will be remembered as the meeting where the last significant article on the agenda was voted on first. It was no contest. The meeting started at 7p.m. and, after 12 minutes of introductions and explanations of the rules of the meeting, the 226 voters took only another 10 minutes to not only revise the agenda, but to overwhelmingly pass Article 35 prohibiting the introduction of "Class B sewage sludge/biosolids" into the Town. The competing Article 34 was withdrawn by the Selectmen.

The second most discussed issue was Article 13, the appropriation of \$18,000 to purchase a new Town Hall copy machine. A significant majority approved the article.

Other capital improvement articles approved were: \$5,000 for repairs and improvements to the Town boat docks; \$20,000 for a replacement police patrol car; \$50,000 added to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund; \$30,000 for a replacement fire boat; \$50,000 added to the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund; and \$10,000 for improvements to the Alton Bay Community Center to be offset in its entirety by the Clough-Morrell Trust Fund.

There were four articles approved dealing with improvements to Town roads and bridges: \$575,000 for the reconstruction of Town Highways, \$68,500 added to the Bridge Replacement Capital Reserve Fund, and \$45,000 for resurfacing dirt roads. The fourth article, requiring a 2/3 vote with no one voting in the negative, redesignated the Hollywood

ALTON RESIDENTS AMONG STATE HONORED HEROES

Ray Penn and John H. Young, Sr. are among 26 NH residents honored by the Union Leader for risking their own lives to save others during 1996. The recipients will receive a framed medal at ceremonies this month in Manchester.

Penn and another Public Service Company of NH employee rescued three men whose boat had capsized and sank while they were cleaning up an oil spill in the Piscataqua River on June 30. The men were wearing life preservers but whirlpools were pulling them under and the fierce currents were sweeping them from shore. Drowning would have been imminent if the quick-thinking Penn and his co-worker hadn't jumped into a boat, raced down the river and pulled them out.

During the tragic Alton dam break last March, Young was singled out for rescuing Larry Sinclair, whose tractortrailer was stuck in a sink hole as water roared over Route 140. He threw a rope to Sinclair, who tied it around his waist. Young, assisted by his wife, fought to pull Sinclair to safety through the raging waters.

A neighbor wrote that Young's good deeds did not stop there. He brought Sinclair home with him and gave up a week's work to try to ease the suffering of neighbors victimized by the flood, letting the damage to his own home wait.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING APPROVES \$4.9 MILLION BUDGET

Voters at a sparsely attended School District Meeting March 15, rejected the recommendations of the Budget Committee and passed a budget of \$4,891,834. The amount

represents an increase of 8% over last year.

While most of the increase and most of the discussion centered around the establishment and staffing of SAU 72 which will be operation in this summer, voters endorsed the plan presented by the School Board including the hiring of a superintendent rather than to combine the position with existing administrative staff as recommended by an amendment to reduce the budget by \$50,000.

Another suggestion to use the additional money to hire more

classroom aides.

A special article to raise and appropriate \$25,000 for computer upgrades was opposed by the Budget Committee. Voters, however, endorsed the School Board's recommendation and passed the article.

Additional recommended Budget Committee cuts of \$800 from the Student Activities account and \$600 from the Library account received little or no support from the voters.

\$20,000 was approved to for a newly-created School Buildings Maintenance Fund for meeting the requirements of

the Americans with Disabilities Act.

At the conclusion of the business portion of the meeting School Board Vice Chairman Loring Carr presented an update from the building study committee which is examining options for increasing school facilities. These include expanding and renovating the existing building, building a new high school and renovating the existing school for grades kindergarten through 8, or building a new K-6 elementary school and renovating the existing building for grades 7-12. A final proposal is expected to be ready for the 1998 District Meeting.

Re-elected School District Treasurer Shirley Young was recognized for her 25 years of service and retiring School Board member Dick Quindley was thanked for his service to

the Board.

Karen Cullen came on board as Alton Planning Director on February 12 and is heavily involved in all phases of planning for the Town of Alton and its february

planning for the Town of Alton and its future.

The new title (it was formerly "town planner") more aptly describes the role of the incumbent. Often the "town planner" concept implied just working with the Planning Board, whereas the planning official's role really extends to all facets of the town and its future. Cullen will be working with the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Adjustment and the Conservation Commission as well as budget preparations for the office of Code Enforcement. And she may he assigned periodically to special projects, utilizing her expertise.

She is admirably qualified with some 13 years experience, most recently as Planning Consultant to the Town of Peterborough, NH, with its long range planning and planning board activities. She began with the Southwest Regional Planning Commission and has since been self-employed as a consultant and specialist with several towns. She holds a master's degree in regional planning from the University of Massachusetts, where she also pursued her undergraduate studies. She holds a membership in the American Institute of

Certified Planners.

This Bedford, MA, native is married to a civil engineer, and they have a ten year old son, all currently living in

Hillsborough, NH.

As she looks to the upcoming planning priorities, she suggests a new and updated Master Plan, revised subdivision site plans and zoning regulations as well as a booklet totally in layman's language that will be user friendly and make life a bit easier for those who want to build, expand or seek a land use objective and for whom the "system" is often confusing or intimidating. She would also like to review the Alton Civic Profile findings and recommendations and incorporate them in future planning.

Karen has a unique hobby. She has made over 60 quilts and now enjoys doing her own designs. One fine example

hangs in her office, adjacent to her desk.

She stresses that she hopes for a long tenure in Alton, and after visiting with her and learning of her strong dedication to the job, this writer would agree and hope that, indeed, she has a long tenure here.

LIBRARY GROUND BREAKING NEARS

The Gilman Library moved closer to a Spring ground breaking with Town Meeting approval of its request for \$50,000. This brings the total raised by taxation since March of 1993 to \$250,000. The Town of Alton has now completed its pledge of public support for the expansion of the Library. This public support has inspired the fund raising efforts and success of the Kitchen Cabinet Committee to contact and seek private support from the Alton Community. A recent letter was mailed to 1,500 summer residents and community supporters. Forty additional gifts have added \$2,000 to the Fund which brings the private total up to \$340,000.

Private support is still needed to assure funding for all of the original design features. The Kitchen Cabinet Committee will continue to solicit private funds with \$68,500 still needed to reach the construction budget of \$658,500. The recent private gifts of \$2,000 will assure that the rear entrance can

be built as designed.

Private support will be solicited for the interior furnishings. A community member in the interior design business has pledged to pass on her savings in the purchase of furniture as a memorial gift to her parents. This example of in-kind giving will "Help Make the Gilman Library All That It Can Be" The New Gilman Library will be a distinctive public building and a source of community pride!

BURNING PERMITS REQUIRED

On April 1, burning permits are required and the following

- 1. You must get a written permit from one of the following fire wardens: Russell Jones, 875-7510; Norman Barrett, 776-6301; Robert Witham, 859-4122; Russell Sample, 875-7534; Irving Roberts, 569-2629; Charles Adams, 875-7246; or Henry Nowe, 875-6820.
- 2. With the permit, burning is <u>NOT</u> allowed between 9a.m. and 5p.m. unless it is raining. Then you may burn any time of the day for which the permit is issued.
- 3. You may burn only on the day for which the permit was issued.

1998 School District Meeting.



OPEN WATER FISHING BEGINS APRIL 1

April is the month that old Man Winter unlocks his icy grip and opens the way for spring. The first of April is the beginning of the open water fishing season for salmon and lake trout. The fourth Saturday is the opening of trout fishing in ponds classified as Trout Ponds. For a listing, see the 1997

NH Freshwater Fishing Digest.


As I write this (mid March) winter's icy grip is reluctant to let go, we have had 15 inches of snow in the last two weeks. With the cold weather still making ice, it looks like there will not be much open water. If you can't find any, the Merrymeeting River along the Letter S Road will be the place to fish on opening day. Some nice salmon and rainbows were caught last fall at the end of the season. Remember this is fly fishing only water until April 25. Have a good supply of flies because the river bottom can "eat" your flies as there are many bottom dwelling snags to hook on. Other areas to try if there is late ice out are the Winnipesaukee River from Paugus Bay to Winnisquam Lake, Opechee Bay, and the area between the dam at Lochmere and Silver Lake. The currents there keep the waters ice free.

As the lakes open up look for salmon to be following the smelt moving into the shallows as they start to spawn. Any method of fishing can produce salmon, lake trout, or rainbow trout as the water warms and the fish begin to feed heavily.

During the weekend of the Great Winni Ice Fishing Derby, I saw a large pile of trash on Echo Point roadside, evidently dumped by one group of people who must have been partying on the lake. This irresponsible act is a form of pollution and gives outdoor people a bad reputation. This can also cause landowners to get upset and close off our access ways. Please pass the word to pick up after oneself and put trash in its proper place. One should always have a trash bag packed amongst the gear or picnic lunch you bring with you. Thank you!





LEGISLATURE HANDLING OVER 800 BILLS

We are in the midst of passing or killing the over 800 bills this year. Thus far those passed to another committee (usually Finance) include:

A House Resolution urging television and radio, in or out of state, to refuse to broadcast reports of exit polls and predictions about the outcomes of elections.

Services at the Veterans Home will be expanded to address the changing needs.

A committee will be created to study the establishment of a New Hampshire Volunteer Program.

Two dam regulation bills were passed: one to clarify the definition of "dam" and "dams in disrepair," and the second bill addressed the implementation of the Emergency Action Plan for municipalities who own dams. "Permitting" for building dams and facilitating repairs on dams in disrepair has been changed.

There is another (4th) attempt to change the term of the governor from two to four years.

There may be a prohibition of former members of the House of Representatives from becoming lobbyists for two years after leaving the House.

Bills that were killed include: a bill to expand or establish casino or video gambling, a bill to return to biennial sessions, and for the third time, a newer version of "Right to Work." The vote was 157 to 193 against. It was an effort to be fair to both sides.

By a vote of 286 to 57, a bill banning conibear and leghold traps was killed. The Fish and Game Department, Farm Bureau, and New Hampshire Wildlife Federation all backed killing this bill as necessary to wildlife control.

Gilmanton has a beautiful new school. It was a special pleasure to be present at the ribbon cutting ceremonies. I will be at Alton on Monday, April 7, from 3 to 4p.m. Meanwhile I can be reached at 875-2151.

Beach Road Bridge Capital Reserve Fund as a broader Bridge

Replacement Capital Reserve Fund.

The special warrant article to add \$50,000 to the Gilman Library Addition Capital Reserve Fund passed, while the special warrant article to create and fund a Capital Reserve Fund for the up-dating of tax maps failed.

Articles dealing with the salaries of elected officials were approved at the following amounts: Town Clerk, \$28,000; Tax

Collector, \$25,000; and Highway Agent, \$36,000.

The "sweep" article to "defray all necessary charges arising in the management of Town affairs" was passed after being successfully amended by the Highway Agent to add \$25,000 for road sand and replacement plow blades. After the amendment the total approved was \$2,339,965.

Additionally, the Town Meeting approved the cost items in the collective bargaining agreement reached with the employees of the Highway Department. The petition article to appropriate \$22,000 for the purchase of a machine roller for the Highway Department was approved, but the other petition article to spend

\$32,600 for a new police boat was withdrawn.

There were several articles making money available for health and social services: \$1,000 to New Beginnings; \$8,166 to VNA-Hospice of Southern Carroll County and Vicinity; \$5,302 to the Community Action Program of Belknap and Merrimack Counties; \$1,500 for the Greater White Mountain Chapter of the American Red Cross; and \$3,000 to Laconia's Community Health and Hospice.

Property transactions were also on the agenda and the voters in attendance approved them all: Article 28 enabling the Town to sell 1/10 of an acre in Alton Bay to the Campmeeting Association in order to unite Pop's Clamshell under one landlord: Article 29 passing the West Alton Community Center to the West Alton Fire Association; Article 30 disposing of the house on the newly acquired land for the Library expansion; and Article 31 selling the land on which the Salt Shed was situated. Article 33, approved at the meeting, reconstituted the committee overseeing the operations of the Gilman Museum.

Article 32 was not the usual kind of action put before a Town meeting. A past member of the community, A. William Heidke, had provided in his estate that a trust fund be established "for the purpose of assisting the residents of Alton to remain in their homes so long as reasonably possible despite advancing age and/or health problems." The voters had no hesitation in accepting the gift and

establishing the fund.

The article to adopt a conflict of interest ordinance applicable to all Town officials, whether elected or appointed, failed.

At the beginning of the meeting the retiring Selectman Reuben Wentworth was presented with a plaque and honored for his five years of service on the Board.

Just before the 1997 Town Meeting adjourned at 11:10p.m. the Town Administrator announced that the total appropriations approved during the evening amounted to \$3,391,433.
