THOSE FLAGS ON MAIN STREET

Alton residents awoke on Sunday, May 25, to a Town that had a much greater patriotic and festive atmosphere. For there, all along Main Street through the center of Town and Alton Bay waved Old Glory!

What happened, almost overnight, to bring about this transformation?

It was a concerted effort of many, starting with the Board of Selectmen and finishing with the Boy Scouts of America. Actually, it started with a few citizens of Alton who regularly attend Selectmen meetings and frequently offer their ideas during the "Public Input" portion of the agenda. During the 1996-97 holiday season suggestions were made by more than one person as to whether the Town couldn't be doing more in the way of decorating for the holidays.

Fast forward to the May 19 Selectmen's meeting where the newest member of the Board, William Ryan, noted that Memorial Day was only days away, and this might be a good time to demonstrate that Alton can show its true colors better than the next guy. Chairman Arnold ("Pete") Shibley and Vice-Chairman Stanley Czech were already "on board." All three heads became extremely productive in cranking out ideas.

United States flags along Main Street was an immediate winner.

The more difficult answer was how to pay for them. Selectman Czech noted that the Bicentennial Committee had returned unspent funds to the treasury, and commemorative flags were certainly within the spirit of that budget purpose. With the funding source solved Selectman Ryan moved that a thousand dollars of the returned monies be spent for U.S. flags to decorate Alton. The vote was unanimous.

The original hope was for flags to line Main Street all the way from Alton Circle to the Community Center in Alton Bay. The reality is that would take 80 flags. The money allocated could not go that far. It did buy 36 flags and another 12 were purchased in a later action.

The next challenge was to have all flags flying in time for the observance of Memorial Day on May 26. Town Administrator Scott Dunn moved with dispatch in obtaining the permission of the NH Electric Cooperative to mount the Continued on page 19




A SALUTE TO BOY SCOUT TROOP 53 by Bob Calvert

EAST ALTON TWIN EVENTS ON SATURDAY, JULY26

The East Alton Fire Association (EAFA) is gearing up for another big day on Saturday, July 26. Twin events scheduled are the 23rd Annual Chicken Barbecue and at least the 22nd Flea Market in the last 23 years. The Flea Market, chaired for the second year by Nancy Northridge, kicks off at 9 A.M. in the field by the intersection of Route 28 and Roberts Cove Road (at the blinker). It will run until 2 P.M. Tables can be had for \$10 each by calling Mrs. Northridge at 875-5255. Space for each one is approximately 20' by 15'.

Then, from 5 to 7 P.M. the famous Chicken Barbecue—usually a sellout well before the event—will take place at the East Alton Fire Station. Get your tickets early from any member of EAFA. Both events take place rain or shine.

Irving Roberts serves as "Mr. Outside" at the Barbecue. With many helping hands, he conducts the barbecuing and the potato cooking. A host of members serve "inside" at the dinner, and are coordinated by Judy Fry. So I guess that she could be called "Mrs. Inside."

Profits from the twin events will continue the association's program of improvement to the fire station and grounds as well as a scholarship fund and other community "Good Turns" for which EAFA has become famous.





STEPHANIE TANGUAY IS NAMED **BELKNAP COUNTY POET**



END OF SESSION REPORT CONCORD CORNER

This has been an interesting session. Republicans and Democrats

have been working together, especially in their committee work. Recently the budget, kindergarten, gambling and questions of a new prison were the major issues. House and Senate each had bills concerning all of them.

The resolution comes in "Committees of Conference." This is an interesting process in which the House sends its bills to the Senate, which hears debates and votes on each one. If the Senate amends any part of a bill, that bill is returned to its originating House committee for concurrence. When the House committee does not agree with the Senate amendment, a "Committee of Conference" is appointed (4 House members and 3 Senate members). They meet and attempt to iron out differences. If they can agree, and it must be unanimous, another round of voting in both chambers takes place to finally pass the bill to the governor. When no unanimous agreement can be reached, the bill dies.

Recently passed were:

- 1) A bill to make important data about physicians, i.e., education and practice, available to patients.
- 2) Setting up a college tuition savings plan advisory commission to aid parents in saving for college over time.

Re-referred for study over the summer were:

- A bill to establish a special school district to provide special education for eligible inmates in the state prison system.
- 2) A bill to allow a N.H. resident to obtain a pistol or revolver permit for life.

<u>Killed</u> was a bill putting a moratorium on continued use of private landing strips in towns. Last year a bill was passed allowing such use unless prohibited by local zoning ordinances. A single incident in Brentwood prompted the bill this year.

It is my pleasure to say that my name is now Alice Ziegra Calvert. I married Robert L. Calvert of Alton on May 3. This will be the last column this year. The House and Senate adjourned in June. I can be reached at 875-2151.






GILMAN LIBRARY TAKES ON NEW SHAPE

The exterior frame of the new Gilman Library is taking shape and is giving a new look to Main Street. The distinctive cupola has been framed, to obtain the exact window measurements, which have now been ordered. New roof trusses on the adult wing and children's wing define the new profile of our library. The old entry will soon be replaced by the new handicapped accessible entry and larger portico over the main door. Comments from "building watchers" are that the builders, under Milestone and Brook Design's supervision, are carrying out an excellent construction.

Fund raising to meet our final goal continues, with \$95,253 to go. The Adult wing will be named in memory of Dorothy William's family. A major opportunity still exists for the naming of the Children's wing. The Winnipesaukee Masonic Lodge in Alton recently presented the Gilman Library Trustees a check for \$1,500 for the Building Fund. This significant gift from the Masons represents a recognition by their members that the life of the community is enriched by the resource of a first class library for all ages. The Trustees are grateful for their gift at this time. The actual construction budget including architect's fee stands at \$672,829, with \$606,576 raised to date. A goal for interior furnishings has been set by the architect at \$30,000.

The officers of the American Legion have offered their abutting property to the Gilman Library Trustees for a price of \$30,000. The members of the Legion also see the Gilman



Library Expansion as an asset to the Town of Alton. While their offer is not under the scope of the current fund raising, a major gift towards acquisition of the American Legion property would enhance the Gilman Library for additional Library and Town Hall parking. Foundations and Trusts are still being solicited for support with \$40,500 received to date.

The Gilman Library Trustees urge summer residents, local businesses and members of the Alton community to make an extra gift to the Gilman Library now. Continued support from the Alton community will make the difference to "Help Make The Gilman Library All That It Can Be."




ALTON ARTIST SHARES TALENT WITH FIFTH GRADE STUDENTS

The program was a large success and from the feedback I've been receiving from the women who attended [Editor's note: see accompanying article by Daryl Czech], they learned a lot and had a great time doing it. Don't worry though, there will be another one and the women from this past class have volunteered to help.

I would like to thank two local businesses: McGrath's Grocery Store donated food platters and soda and Dunkin Donuts provided breakfast and coffee at a reduced price. I'd also like to thank the instructors: Sgt. Vinnie Baiochetti from Gilmanton Police Department, Attorney Nolan Koon from the Belknap County Attorney's Office, and Sgt. Tracy Shattuck and Master Patrolman Jamie Hathcock from the Alton Police Department. Ladies, watch for the next one, it's a lot of fun.

Protect and Serve received a letter written in response to our column last month. "Confused" wrote: "Your article in 'Main Street' prompted me to write. I am "confused" [about] "the no parking zones in front of A-Bay Carpet on Main Street." I use the businesses in that area. Where do we park? Does this also apply across the street from A-Bay Carpet on the side of the Telephone Company? No longer is the Post Office there, but the same 'No-Parking' signs apply."

"Confused" brings up a good point. The parking along Main Street in that area is somewhat confusing, not only to you folks, but sometimes even to us police officers. Let me see if I can help. The parking in front of the Telephone Company is still okay. On the side of the street where Jeri's Barber Shop and Village Pizza are, you can park from the corner of the street by the Legion all the way to the telephone pole after Village Pizza. On the other side of the telephone pole is the no-parking spot. The reason this spot is no-parking is twofold; first, State law prohibits parking on crosswalks and within 20 feet of crosswalks located at an intersection. This is technically an intersection as Old Wolfeboro Road intersects Main Street at this point. Second, there is just not enough room to safely park there and be able to see oncoming traffic or pedestrians, or to drive safely past. If you continue beyond that spot, up Old Wolfeboro Road, there are some parking areas next to where the old A-Bay Carpet was located. I hope this helps.






BRENDA MEEHAN RETIRES AS SCHOOL HEALTH TEACHER

TWO ROADS RECONSTRUCTED TOWN HALL NOTES By Scott Dunn,

Hopefully, the reconstruction of Route 11D and New Durham Road is now complete. Two more down and fifty (+/-) to go. Please watch

flags on their poles. Selectman Czech also suggested that Alton's Boy Scouts be asked whether that would be their kind of project. Mike Currid, one of the leaders of Troop 53, was contacted, and the rest is history. (See "A Salute to Boy Scout Troop 53," below.)

The current plan is to display the flags each year from Memorial Day through Flag Day and up to the Fourth of July, and for parades. Depending upon future Selectmen's budgets and Town Meeting actions, the number of flags will be increased each year until coverage is complete. The Selectmen are also giving thought to an "Adopt a Flag" program, which may make things happen faster and achieve more community involvement. Put individual items in a box (no bags). DO NOT MIX OR CONSOLIDATE THE ITEMS. Each participant will be asked to complete a brief survey which helps to improve future collection efforts.

This year the Town of Alton joins 23 Lakes Region communities in sponsoring Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day, which is organized by the Lakes Region Planning Commission. Alton's participation in this effort is coordinated by the Town's Conservation Commission. LAZY DAYS OF SUMMER?

ALTON OUTDOORS

With July bringing the lazy hazy days of summer, what is the outdoor person to do? There is lots to do this month.

First off, the hunting seasons begin in only two months with bear season opening September 1st. One can sight in a rifle this month, scout for bear sign or habitat, and acquire permission for bating or using a tree stand on another's property.

Archery deer hunting begins September 15th, and now is the time to acquire new gear so one can become familiar with it by September. Farmington Fish and Game Club will have their 3-D league shoot every Thursday night 5-7pm at Club Pond in New Durham. Anyone is welcome to shoot. The fee is \$3 for members and \$4 for nonmembers. This is a 15target course, including deer, bear, wild pig, wild boar, coyote, turkey, mountain lion, wolf, bighorn sheep, and mountain goat targets that vary each week. This is very good hunting practice. See you there!

For the fisher person, as of July 1st, bass fishing regulations change. Starting then, one may use live bait, and the daily limit is five bass. Early morning and evening can be productive as the bass will seek cooler water during the hot days of July.

Trout and salmon fishing typically slows down in the local area in July, but one can travel north to the Saco River or even further north to the Androscoggin River. The Connecticut Lakes Region is yet another option to find good fishing at this time.

July is also a time to explore new waters. Most streams can be waded with an old pair of shorts and sneakers since the waters have warmed up this month. Larger streams and small lakes and ponds can be explored by a peaceful row in a canoe. Bring your lunch and your fishing gear, and get out and enjoy!



KIDS — TRY THIS AT HOME! by John Duffek

Take a block of clay weighing 35 grams and some marbles that each weigh five grams. Mold the clay into a shape that will float in water and see how many marbles your clay boat can hold before it sinks.

Each year, students in Richard Kirby's fourth grade science classes at Alton Central School are presented with this challenge. This year's "float-off" was won by Michael Tidd, son of William and Melanie Tidd of West Alton. 

With this issue Main Street has a new editor. Well, actually more than a new editor, because the "team" of Bob and Mary Bee Longabaugh is just that — a highly productive team in every sense of the word, and an outstanding example of volunteerism at its very finest.

In addition to being the unpaid advertising manager for Main Street, Mary Bee is Treasurer of the Friends of the Gilman Library, Secretary-Treasurer of the Gilman Museum, an alternate member of the Alton Zoning Board of Adjustment, and a volunteer with Caregivers of Wolfeboro (serving Alton). Bob has been a star reporter for Main Street, also a Caregiver, Secretary for the Town's Engineering Needs Study Committee, and Secretary of Alton Housing for the Elderly.

This former transportation planner for the State of New York at Albany and Mary Bee came to Alton in 1994. Their first year was rather low key. With a smile they explain that they spent almost twelve months unpacking 409 boxes of their own doing, and some 75 boxes of the movers. But they have been heavily involved and on a fast track ever since.

obvious and now, especially, Alton.

And what does our new editor see as the prime role of Main Street? "It has been aptly called the 'Voice of Alton," he says, "and it is a fine paper. I like to think of it as a chronicle of the good life in Alton." When Bob came to Alton and decided to pick up a glove and "get in the game," he wanted to do something totally different than the planning role he played professionally. Journalism was always an interest, and he had accumulated some experience in writing. Nevertheless, he views his later life conversion into an editor as his most challenging volunteer effort yet.

Bob is highly innovative and we'll see some changes over time. We'll probably notice some experimentation with type faces and logos early on. It's really very reassuring to see people like the Longabaughs move into Alton and work for the common good. We're all extremely fortunate to welcome them as our neighbors and friends who are so people- and service-oriented. All hail to our new editor who follows another great individual in the person of John Duffek.


