DINOSAUR ON THE LOOSE IN ALTON

Starting on Monday, May 18, Altonians will have a chance to see a modern day dinosaur in action. The Town of Alton will be retaining the services of John Brown & Sons to bring in their "Brontosaurus" to chomp up the roadside debris left behind from the January "Ice Storm of the Century." As seen in the accompanying photo, the 20th Century version of the Jurassic period behemoth is smaller and lighter than the 70-foot-long, 30-ton, plant-eating dinosaur of long ago. However, its brush devouring ability is more impressive.

Mounted at the end of a Robex 130LC chassis, the "brush" grinder can extend 30 feet in the air and reduce a tree ten inches in diameter into mere bits of its former self. Not only that, but in a demonstration run of its capability on Prospect

Mountain Road in April, the machine was able to do "its thing" on both sides of the road for .8 of a mile in one day.

Alton Highway Agent Ken Roberts estimates that of Alton's 82.3 miles of Town maintained roads, some 50 miles will merit the attention of the Brontosaurus. At \$1,300 a day this will be a considerable outlay for the Town, but with 87 1/2 percent Federal and State emergency grants picking up a large part of the tab, it could have been worse. Moreover, doing the job by the traditional manner of a road crew equipped with chain saws and chipper would still leave tangling broken limbs out of their reach, and at greater cost.

Town Administrator Scott Dunn reports that the brush clean-up will start on Alton Mountain Road during the week of May 18. The Brontosaurus will be used to grind wood in place between stone walls or otherwise within 15 feet of the edge of pavement. After Alton Mountain, other roads will be done based on the amount of debris.

Relative to the clean-up, here is a list of DO's and DON'Ts for residents:

DON'T put any wood on the pavement or in the road, and especially not in the ditch lines.

DON'T bring your brush to the edge of State Highways or private roads because the Town will only be doing this special maintenance on Town roads.

DON'T stack wood that is larger than 5 inches in diameter

MEMORIAL DAY EXERCISES PLANNED FOR SATURDAY, MAY 30

Memorial Day exercises are scheduled for Saturday, May 30, under the auspices of the Claude R. Batchelder Post 72 of the American Legion. Joining Post 72 in the events are the American Legion Auxiliary, Sons of the American Legion, the Junior Auxiliary, and the Alton-Alton Bay VFW Post 11163.

Parade participants are to muster at 9:30 a.m. in front of the Post on Alton's Monument Square. At 9:45 Father Richard Wegman will give the invocation and at 10 a.m. the parade will step off down Main Street toward Riverside Cemetery. Expected in the line of march, in addition to the Alton High School Band, are the Corps of Volunteer Firefighters, Scouting Troops, and Little League teams.

Ceremonies at the cemetery will include the Veteran's Prayer, decoration of graves, a 21-gun salute to the departed, and the playing of taps. Returning to Monument Square there will be band renditions, the decoration of the five memorial monuments, and the delivery of remarks by guest speaker Executive Councilor Ray Burton. Among other tributes, two more names will be added to the Vietnam Monument, and the ceremonies will conclude with a final playing of taps and the benediction by Father Wegman.

or any stumps — these things will be left behind.

* DON'T stack wood along side Town roads after May 15 — it may be left behind.

DO plan on having to clean up after the brush grinder has finished. There may be a mess of woodchips and the Town will not be removing these.

DON'T ask the machine operators to help you transport

wood or clean your private property.

Town officials also ask that residents *not* use this occasion to clear their yards of unwanted trees and other non-storm debris. This is strictly an ice storm clean-up operation. Everyone's cooperation will be appreciated.

NADEAU IS ICE-OUT WINNER

Alton resident Terry Nadeau won the 1998 Main Street Ice-Out Contest by coming the closest to the actual time and date of ice-out on Lake Winnipesaukee. The prize is a gift certificate for dinner at the William Tell Inn, compliments of Susan and Peter Bossert

Ice-out was officially declared at 1:58 p.m. on Tuesday, April 7, when it was determined that the M/S Mt. Washington could reach each of its ports unobstructed by ice. Veteran ice-out observer Alan Emerson of Emerson Aviation in Wolfeboro made the discovery during a flight over the lake.

The earliest recorded date for ice-out occurred in 1921 on March 28 and the latest ice-out was May 12, 1888, the first year there was an organized contest. Ice-out recording only started the previous year, in 1887.

TOWN TRAIL CLEARED

The Alton Parks and Recreation and Conservation Commissions sponsored a clean up day in the Town Forest on Sunday, April 19. The event was held in conjunction with the national March for Parks and Earth Week specifically to benefit the Loop Trail located in the Town Forest on Avery Hill Road, just off Alton Mountain Road.

The trail was originally started by the late Mike Burke, Town Forester, member of the Conservation Commission, and Parks and Recreation volunteer. After Mike's death in 1994 the Conservation Commission members and Peter Farrell, current Town Forester, all wanted to continue Mike's work on the trail.

The Conservation Commission completed the one-mile trail last fall but the trail needed to be cleared because of damage caused by January's ice storm. Thirteen volunteers participated in the project and cleared the trail by cleaning out brush and hauling it off the path, cutting large trees that had fallen across the trail, and trimming branches with lopping shears for removal.

The volunteers worked well together and completed the majority of the cleanup on Sunday. The one-mile trail is marked with blue double zeros, and loops around to the starting point. The trail is of cross-country character with signs of wildlife and a scenic view of the Lake from the top of the mountain.

Volunteers plan to dedicate the trail in memory of Mike Burke and to post a sign at the beginning of the trail. The trail is open to the public for recreation and educational purposes.

All proceeds will benefit the class' chemical free graduation trip — a whitewater expedition at Lake George, NY.

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
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
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DESIGN-A-ROD CONTEST WINNERS

BALANCING THE BUDGET

The 1998 Town budget, as approved by Town Meeting this year, is \$4,208,992. One of the first tasks of the newly seated, five member Board of Selectmen was to allocate \$2,854,415 of these funds amongst over 400 accounts in the operating budget. The remaining balance of \$1,354,577 was specifically designated by special warrant articles.

Perhaps the most daunting budget issue facing the Selectmen was where to come up with money to provide for pay raises for elected officials, not including themselves. In addition, the Board was faced with choosing whether or not to fund items such as mail-in motor vehicle registrations and keeping the Route 11 Bathhouse open during the winter. Ultimately the Selectmen voted to fund each of these things, primarily by postponing the planned chip sealing of Youngtown Road with an estimated price tag of \$6,700.

Many other accounts had a few dollars subtracted here and there, while others had money added to meet anticipated expenses. None of these decisions will affect the bottom line as approved by the voters and I estimate the 1998 tax rate for Town government will be \$4.50 per thousand, an 8% increase over the 1997 rate of \$4.16.

Ultimately, the job of your Town Officials is to spend this money wisely and get the biggest bang possible for each dollar. Some of the big expenses coming up this year are as follows: purchase of a Police 4x4 (\$30,500); purchase of a highway grader (\$225,000); Town Hall improvements (\$125,000); purchase of a highway pick-up with plow (\$32,000); Gilman Museum repairs (\$50,000); rebuilding Halls Hill Road (\$250,000); and continuing many of the projects that are ongoing from past years while keeping up with the daily chores of running a multi-million dollar municipal corporation.

And now that winter has finally passed ... its time to bask in the warm weather and enjoy those black flies.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Good news! The House is hearing and voting on Senate bills. Education

bills are being heard in both House and Senate. With at least two proposed Constitutional Amendments and two dozen bills, we legislators have much to ponder and make judgments on as we try to solve the "adequate education" definition and funding.

Meanwhile the House PASSED to the Senate bills:

(1) Asking Fish and Game to set up an education program, as well as rules restricting the use of lead sinkers. Loons have ingested the lead and have died.

(2) Allowing towns and cities to adopt biennial budgets. The budgets must be in two 12-month fiscal sections.

(3) Updating the 10-year highway improvement plan. NH has received Federal highway money which has been designated to complete several large projects and fulfill major plans which are needed, i.e., widening I-93 from Salem to Manchester, and the Conway/North Conway bypass.

(4) Creating the educational credentials of a "master teacher," hoping to have experienced teachers act as mentors and educational supervisors. They would remain as active teachers.

KILLED was a bill to create a Commission on the Status of Men, similar to the present Commission on the Status of Women.

Going to the Governor for SIGNING are bills to:

(1) Prohibit triple trailers on New Hampshire highways.

(2) Allow over the water structures to be rebuilt for maintenance purposes. The original dimensions must be adhered to in any repair work.



LET THE BUGS BITE!

As "April showers bring May flowers," May also brings out the BUGS! And when bugs bite, so do the fish. For the fishing enthusiast the bugs mean fly fishing time. As the waters in the lakes and streams warm, insects start to hatch and the fish feed heavily on them. Fly-fishing is the most exciting way to fish as one anticipates a rise or a strike while working the water.

Warming waters also cause the bass to move into the shallows to spawn. Catching small mouth bass on a fly rod will test your skills. These powerful fish fight the line with jumps and deep dives. They are protected during their spawning time. You may use artificial lures and flies ONLY between May 15 and June 15, and any bass caught then must be released at the site where caught. Always be sure to check the regulations.

May 15, 16, and 17 is the 17th Annual Winni Derby on Lake Winnipesaukee with many prizes offered. Entry forms are in the Hawkeye Hunting and Fishing News and local

sports shops.

This season on the Big Lake seems to be good. Many fish are being caught with most nice and "chunky" and displaying very good health. Depending on the water temperature, the salmon fishing should stay good until the end of May; then they will head for deeper, cooler, water.

For hunters, May offers a challenge. May 3-31 is the spring turkey season. The challenge is to call into range the elusive tom turkey by sounding like a seductive female turkey. There are some turkeys here in Alton, although no large flock has been spotted.

Bow hunters can practice their sport at Farmington Fish and Game Club's Thursday night 3-D bow shooting league. Call the clubhouse for details and starting date.





Susan is a fifth generation Gilmantonite. She is a graduate of Gilmanton Elementary School and Belmont High School. Her parents still live in Gilmanton, and her two brothers live locally as well.

Susan graduated from Colby-Sawyer College in 1971, married husband, Neil, and remained at home for nine years raising their two children. She then began working as a secretary for the Gilmanton Police Department. Her interest in police work prompted her training and becoming a part-time, then full-time officer in Gilmanton. Susan worked there until March, 1990, at which time she became an officer in Alton's Police Department. In 1991 Susan became a Corporal and in 1993 she became Sergeant.

Susan speaks enthusiastically about her job. She explains, "We all receive training in the basics of law enforcement and then go into specialty areas, such as traffic management or firearms. My area of specialty is that of Child Abuse and Physical and Sexual Abuse." Susan continues, "Our staff works well together. We respect each other's specialty and go to each other for advice in that area. We work as a team."

Discussing her involvement in special projects, Susan explains that Chief Iwans' goals for the department have been to work closely with the school and community. One of the projects to meet these goals is the "DARE" program which Susan headed for three years. The need for a middle school program to follow "DARE" resulted in the department's creation of a nine-week enrichment program called "You and the Law." Its focus is to keep students in contact with law enforcement and teach them important aspects of the judicial system.

The topics Susan explores are: Student and Parent Rights; Search and Seizure Law; Driving Laws; Domestic Violence; and Alcohol and Drug Laws. The program features lectures, role playing and group discussion, but the highlight of the course is the "hands on" experience of traveling to the Laconia District Court and the Belknap County Superior Court to observe trials. "We go through the entire routine," says Susan, "including passing through the metal detector when entering Superior Court, meeting the judge, the attorneys, the bailiff, and clerk of the court. The kids are fascinated." She says the students are very enthusiastic and that the school is immensely supportive of the program. Susan says, "Grades 7 and 8 seem to be a prime age for interest in the judicial system." Next year she is hoping to have two days with each grade instead of one. The nine weeks just goes by so fast!" she says.

Although finding time for hobbies is a challenge, when possible Susan enjoys reading and working in the yard. She also volunteers for "New Beginnings," a county-wide support group for victims of domestic violence and trains new volunteers on how to react to calls received.
