



HERE'S OUR COVER STORY

What you see on page one of this issue of Main Street is the first time our small town newspaper has attempted to fill all of the first page with one photograph. It took the efforts of more than our usual staff of volunteers to make it happen.

The original photo, taken by the editor from just off Route 11 near Sandy Point, was on 35mm Kodacolor Print Film, ASA 200, using a "bulb" exposure. The next step was to turn the color negative into an 8"x10" black and white enlargement. This was accomplished by Alton Bay photographer Michael Neider (phone 875-2973) in his photo lab, using his darkroom skills to bring out the detail in a color shot that is mostly underexposed with a high contrast illuminated area.

The job was not completed in the darkroom, however. It also took the talents at Alton Printing Company to produce a printing plate and properly inked press run to yield 3,100 copies that were not "splotchy" with uneven areas of black and

The cover fireworks can also be interpreted — with tongue in cheek — as a symbolic celebration of your editor completing his first year on the job. SCHOOL SITE ACQUISITION AND BUILDING COMMITTEE RE-FORMED

The Site Acquisition and Building Committee has been re-formed by the Alton School Board to try once again to resolve the overcrowding and space needs problem at the Alton Central School. This year the committee will be responsible for both land acquisition and the design of the building.

The first meeting was held on June 9 and the Committee decided to pursue first and foremost the acquisition of land before deciding on the design of the building. To that end the Committee has begun to look at suitable parcels of land available in Alton.

Local realtors have been contacted to assist in this process. The Town Planner and other appropriate town board members will also have an opportunity to offer their opinions. In addition to this effort the School Board has also notified area architects of this project, soliciting their interest in submitting a proposal should the project get to the development stage.

Enclosed in the centerfold of this issue of <u>Main Street</u> is a survey form. The survey centers on issues involving the Alton Central School including, but not limited to, the overcrowding and space needs problem. Please take the time to complete the survey an 1 return it. The School Board is most interested in any comments or suggestions you care to make regarding the delivery of education in Alton.

The Site Acquisition and Building Committee is also seeking new members and is particularly interested in public input. The next scheduled meeting of the Committee is July 9 at 5:00 p.m. in the High School Library. Anyone interested in serving on the Committee is welcome to attend. ALTON BAY FIREWORKS "UP IN THE AIR"

Alton Town officials are determined that the show must go on, but at the time of this writing (6/20) there is much conjecture on exactly *where*. Mother Nature has been most uncooperative, starting on June 12, with unprecedented rainfall in the Big Lake region. Laconia's *The Citizen* reported on June 18 that State officials considered Lake Winnipesaukee "out of control" with the water level being almost 12 inches over what they consider "full."

The result, of course, is that Alton's town beach on Route 28A — the customary launching pad for the aerial pyrotechnics display — is almost completely under water. With NH officials predicting that it may take "anywhere from two to four weeks to get it [the lake] back to a manageable level" a search is underway to find a suitable alternate location to set off Alton's fireworks. The primary criteria is that the site must be situated so that viewers on boats in Alton Bay will not see any noticeable difference from prior years.

Come Friday, July 3, and doubt remains on whether the bombs will be bursting in air over Alton Bay, persons should listen for announcements over radio stations WOKQ (97.5 FM) and WASR (1420 AM). The Alton Parks and Recreation Department telephone, 875-0109, will also have a recording on the status of the fireworks. Please do NOT call the Police Department.

If it should be actually raining on July 3, the rain date for the display is Saturday, July 11.

The person most responsible for giving the onlookers a safe and spectacular show is Alton's own Wendell Beck. Beck has been doing the Alton display since "the late 70's, early 80's," and has resided in Alton since 1985, moving here from Gilmanton. He might be termed a "seller and shooter" for what is now American Thunder, which most folks remember as the Rockingham Fireworks Manufacturing Display Company. Whatever it's called, people hereabouts think of Beck as the guy who REALLY lights up Alton Bay at this time of year.



HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE ANNUAL COLLECTION EVENT

Saturday, July 25, from 9 a.m. to 12 Noon is the time when you can dispose of some of your hazardous wastes. This event is organized by the Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) and financed by participating communities and matching grant monies from the NH Department of Environmental Services.

The rules are as follows: Bring ONLY household products; there is a ten-gallon limit per household; DO NOT MIX OR CONSOLIDATE ITEMS; and participants are required to complete a short survey.

What Can I Bring to This Annual Collection Event?

From the house: drain cleaners; oven cleaners; metal polish; arts and crafts supplies; photo chemicals; floor cleaners; dry cleaning fluids; old pills and medicine; radiator cleaners; unbroken florescent light bulbs.

From the garage: used motor oil; antifreeze; brake fluid; old car batteries (limit 2 per family); engine and radiator flushes; gasoline; transmission fluid; old chemistry kits.

From the yard and garden: pesticides in one gallon or smaller containers; herbicides; insect sprays; rodent killers; pool chemicals; muriatic acid; no-pest strips; cesspool cleaners.

From the workbench: rust preventatives; wood preservatives; wood strippers; oil-based paints; paint thinner; solvents; degreasers; sealants.

Items Not Accepted At the Collection

There are some products that you should not bring to the event. They are: latex paint and empty aerosol cans (both of which can safely go to landfill, but the latex paint cans should be thoroughly dry first); tires; gas cylinders (including propane tanks larger than gas grill size); explosive materials; ammunition and fireworks; radioactive materials (smoke alarms); lithium batteries; solid waste; PCBs; asbestos.

Collection Sites and Information

In Alton you can call Justine Gengras at 776-8558. The two closest collection sites are the Public Works Garages at Gilford and Wolfeboro. A phone number for Gilford is Sheldon Morgan, 524-6284 and Wolfeboro, Sarah Silk, 569-2073.


SUBMIT YOUR NEWS AND PHOTOS


Help is Needed in Many Areas

Don't miss the next Friends meeting scheduled for July 29, 10:30 a.m., Gilman Library meeting room. Everyone is







DICK QUINDLEY SUPERINTENDENT OF ALTON WATERWORKS

A familiar face to many of us Dick has been Superintendent of the Alton Waterworks since April, 1993. Born and raised in Middleboro, Massachusetts, Dick attended elementary school there, graduating from Middleboro High School in 1963. Dick's wife, Connie, was a Middleboro High School classmate. There were married in 1964. Dick attended Massachusetts Trade School for two years, completing the Heating Technician Course.

Dick worked in the oil burner repair business and then the construction industry laying water and sewer pipe lines for municipal projects. Moving to Alton in 1974, Dick worked for Ferns Oil Company until 1988, when he went into his own heating and repair business. Since working for Alton Waterworks, Dick maintains his heating business only on a part-time basis.

The Alton Waterworks varies slightly from other departments in town. Monies to operate come from customers who use the town water source, not from tax dollars. Dick explained, "I work for the Water Commissioners who are elected to govern the operation of the department which actually belongs to the town. The Federal Government, under the 'Safe Drinking Water Act,' regulates what we have to do. For compliance the State administrates the regulations and rules of the act; we keep careful records which we send to the State; and Federal officials periodically audit the State


records. It is very important and serious business. If you don't do your job, people could get sick."

As Superintendent, Dick reads meters, monitors the treatment facility daily, and repairs and replaces lines and leaks. He also runs the backhoe and supervises any additional workers hired for large projects. Dick explained, "We're required to have two licenses: a distribution license and a treatment license. It requires 20 hours of training yearly to keep these licenses up to date." He added, "I have to keep track of how many gallons of water are pumped and how much chemicals are used, following a State-mandated ration. We usually pump about 100,000 gallons of water daily in the winter and about twice that much in the summer, although last summer it was about 300,000 gallons."

On a more personal note, Dick and Connie have six children. They are: Richard, Jr., age 33; David, age 27; William, age 24; Tom, age 21; Mandy, age 18; and Elizabeth, age 16. Connie and Dick are also proud grandparents of Sam and Adam. Connie works in the Alton School as a Speech and Language Assistant, instructing about 30 students individually or in small groups. Dick and Connie spend as much time as they can at their camp in Pittsburg where they love to fish. They like to travel and have visited their son in California and enjoyed trips to Florida and Bermuda.





A JULY PLAN OF ACTION


With the long, warm months of summer arriving, July is the month to get out and explore Alton's great outdoors. If you enjoy fishing, go explore some new waters. Most of New Hampshire's waters are warm enough to be waded with a pair of old sneakers and shorts, so pick a stream and fish it.

Locally, there are many streams one can explore. A larger river is the Suncook, which has many access points. The lower Suncook can be explored with a canoe. Bring a lunch and two cars. Leave one down-river; go back up-river and enjoy! With a canoe, one may also explore many small lakes and ponds. A set of diving mask and fins can give one a fish-eye view underwater. I have often found fish hiding cover while snorkeling and later gone back to fish the area with good success.

For the hunter, July is a good month to take a hike. Get a topographical map and hike or mountain bike into your favorite, spots, or explore some new area. Practice your map and compass skills. If you have a GPS (Global Positioning Sensor), you can plot deer trails on access trails on your map. Now is the time to practice your skills, not during the hunting season.

If you were chosen for the moose hunt, this is the time to familiarize yourself with where the moose hang out. Some of the best times of my moose hunt in 1994 were when we were exploring new territory. By the time the actual hunting season rolled around, we were very familiar with the area and had identified five moose and their travel patterns.

So, this month, just DO IT! Enjoy Alton outdoors.

What do you know about the cemeteries located in Alton? For starters, the Town of Alton owns and operates two cemeteries: Old Riverside, located on Main Street, and New Riverside, on Route 28 South. Three elected Trustees are responsible for the operation of these. Currently serving as Trustees are Florence Shaw, Shirley Lane, and Warren Harris.

There are also nine additional cemeteries that are serviced by the Town inasmuch as special trust funds have been set up for their maintenance. To the surprise of many, there are about 116 cemeteries or burying grounds located on private land. Many of these are "family plots."

Monies for the operation and maintenance of the Town's cemeteries are in Trust Funds. Thus it can be said that they are self-supporting and are not reflected in the tax base.



LOCAL STUDENT SPENDS SEMESTER AT SEA

Danielle Decatur of Alton is a junior and one of 23 college students who participated this spring in "SEAmester," a one-of-a-kind educational experience sponsored by Long Island University's Southampton College. The students and professors lived and studied for nine weeks aboard The Harvey Gamage, sailing 3,000 miles along the eastern seaboard.

LOOK WHO CAME TO DINNER... UNINVITED!


