As many citizens of Alton are well aware, the Alton School Board has decided to form a new Site Acquisition and Building Committee this year in an attempt to resolve the ongoing problem of space limitations at the Alton Central School. But, did you know that this new committee is not bound by any of the ideas presented by the previous committee? In fact, the new committee has been given much more input and responsibility for what is presented to the voters this year. This year members will be asked to participate in identifying the best solution to Alton's space problem, to work with the Town Planner to identify the best possible location for a new school, should that be the solution of choice, to evaluate the impact of new home construction in Alton, and to study enrollment history and projections for the Alton Central School.

The goal of this enhanced responsibility for the committee is to increase the participation of the citizens in the process of solving this important, yet difficult, situation. Please remember this is a community concern and the entire community should participate in its resolution. To that end, as the committee continues to evaluate all relevant information and look into possible site development, the committee also asks for and welcomes your participation and opinions.


GET INVOLVED IN SCENIC BY-WAYS

On Monday, August 3, at 7 p.m. in Town Hall, the Alton Ad-Hoc By-ways Steering Committee will be meeting to discuss designation of Route 28 North as part of the Lakes Region Scenic Tour By-way. The purpose of the By-way is to promote scenic, cultural, recreational, and natural amenities associated with major traveled ways in Alton for enjoyment by residents and visitors alike.

The group is expected to delineate the exact location of the by-way corridor and formally nominate Route 11 and, perhaps, other roadways to be part of the project. The committee will also determine which existing amenities and features shall be noted as part of the by-way, as well as plan the preliminary development of additional features, such as bike paths and scenic pull-offs, to be constructed in the future. All roadways designated as part of the by-way in Alton will be part of a 60-mile network of roads running through nine communities around Lake Winnipesaukee.

Anyone interested in helping to plan Alton's future is not only welcome — but URGED — to attend.

VNA-HOSPICE OPENS URGENT FUND DRIVE

VNA-Hospice, the organization that provides visiting nurse and related services to Alton, is facing a serious financial shortfall and is seeking extraordinary community support in order to continue its mission. Imagine being told that as of tomorrow you are limited to 1994 dollars in what you can spend toward the care of a loved one, yet you have to do so at 1998 prices in the medical/health care field.

VNA-Hospice has received that very dictum from its Federal funding source. The biggest dilemma comes from the fact that in 1994 our local VNA agency was one of the most cost effective in the country. The agencies that were least cost effective then are now faring better because they do not have to cut so deeply.

Our group has had to make a 25 percent reduction in operations, including a 9+ percent salary expense cut and a 43+ percent employee benefits reduction. Even so, there is still a significant deficit to be faced.

This is a group that recently had 88 percent of their clients indicate the services received were in the "very good to excellent" category. Their goal is to continue this very high level of care.

GILMAN LIBRARY RECEIVES DONATION FROM ALTON-NEW DURHAM LIONS CLUB

Recently, the Alton-New Durham Lions Club donated a Telesensory color personal reading machine to the Gilman Library.

The Telesensory machine, known as "Aladdin Rainbow," allows people with low vision to view items such as magazines, newspapers, black and white or color photographs, greeting cards, and even medication bottles more easily. For most users it helps to restore "independence" to write checks and letters, read mail, pay bills in private, and shop by catalogue. It also helps to maintain a "quality of life" by allowing one to continue hobbies such as stamp collecting, following favorite recipes, and reading books on the best selling lists. This is a "Must See" item for all low-vision people.

The Aladdin Rainbow is a closed circuit television with a zoom lens that magnifies newsprint up to three inches, as well as an expanded depth of field to permit reading curved surfaced items such as bottles, telephone directories and book spines. It is an unusually easy-to-use reading machine. The learning curve for many users to read and write again is only a matter of minutes. The Aladdin Rainbow was proclaimed the 1995 winner of the American Society on Aging's "Gold Award" for outstanding product design for mature consumers.

THE SHOW WENT ON!

As Main Street went to press last issue, the location of the Independence Day fireworks display was somewhat in doubt. The Town beach, located on Route 28A in Alton Bay, was largely under water and unlikely to be high and dry by July 3. Since the beach is the traditional launching site for the annual pyrotechnic "shoot-off," the Town's Selectmen were under pressure to find a suitable alternative location to light up the sky. It was considered important that the display be visible from boats in the bay.

Selectmen Chairman Stan Czech and Selectman Bill Ryan were instrumental in finding a happy solution. Czech lead the search for a site, and acting on a suggestion that the Lakewood Estates development, high on the bluff to the west of Alton Bay, met most of the requirements for a good

launching site, he asked Ryan to check it out.

Ryan found that Randy Jones, owner of a still undeveloped lot in Lakewood Estates, was willing to make his property available for the shoot. Fire Chief Russell Jones found the site could be made to meet safety requirements, and the Alton Highway Department delivered the requisite sand and otherwise assisted in making the location a safe launching pad.

Alton resident Wendell Beck, the "seller and shooter" for the American Thunder company, found that it took more time to go through the learning curve in setting up the launchers on the unfamiliar terrain, but the spectacular results burst forth over Alton Bay as shown above.

The completion of a public building represents the gift from one generation to the next. The adult wing will be dedicated to the family of Dorothy Williams. The sale of over 100 bricks have made the new shelving possible. Brass name plates giving recognition and honor are now attached to the brick wall in the adult room. The entry plaza flower garden compliments the new perennial gardens and shrubs which contributes to the overall beauty of downtown Alton. The Trustees continue to explore the acquisition of comfortable benches for the plaza thanks to a generous gift from an Alton resident. The significant gift of a Telesensory machine from the Alton-New Durham Lions Club will assist vision-impaired citizens continue to enjoy their love of reading, as well as carry out many practical tasks requiring enhanced vision.

The Gilman Library Trustees continue to develop a plan with the leaders of the Alton Historical Society for a tenyear use of the basement meeting room under the new adult wing. Modest improvements by the Historical Society in this room will include painted walls and floors. The additional costs of \$2,500 to paint the ceiling, make changes to the heat and add trim to the windows are being debated. Your gift would make these improvements possible. SOME ASSEMBLY REQUIRED

The frustrated parents trying to connect "part A" to "part B" in a Christmas Eve frenzied push to have all toys ready for the rapidly approaching grand opening still can't hold a candle to Alton resident Tom Kenney's experience. Kenney, owner of the Wolfeboro Inn, and his business partner Mark Nash, oversaw a 12-day journey to get a 65-foot-long "paddle steamboat" from the Mississippi River to Alton Bay in order to launch it in cruise service on Lake Winnipesaukee. Actually, reconnecting part A to part B was simple compared to getting the 21-foot wide craft over New Hampshire's highways.

The most gripping part of the journey occurred on July 2 when the watercraft, mounted on a "low boy" stretch truck trailer, became "grounded" on Route 28A, just yards short of its re-launching slip in Alton Bay. The route was closed from 5 to 9:40 a.m. while heavy equipment was summoned to unwedge the trailer and its duck-out-of-water cargo from the hump that kept the low boy from proceeding. A good number of Altonians turned out with cameras and camcorders to observe and cheer the efforts to get the "Winnipesaukee Belle" into its new home waters. By late afternoon she was afloat in her former splendor, and looking very much at home in Alton Bay.

Interviewed later Kenney recounted the tribulations of moving the Belle from Wisconsin to Wolfeboro, and the Inn's plans for the future of the boat. In the near-term the Belle will replace the Judge David Sewell in its cruises out of Wolfeboro, which transverse Alton's waters near Barndoor Island before completing its circuit. Kenney also said that they will be pursuing options of adding Alton Bay as a port-of-call in the Belle's regular itinerary.

The history of the Winnipesaukee Belle is worth recounting. She was constructed in 1985 by the same company that built the larger "steamboat" that plies the waters at Florida's Disney World. Early on she did duty on the Snake River in North Dakota, but was most recently homeported as the "Victorian Princess" in LaCrosse, Wisconsin. And how does one get a 40(+) ton vessel from its berth on the Mississippi River to land-locked Alton Bay, New Hampshire?

In this case it was not sailing it down the Mississippi, across the Gulf of Mexico and up the Inland Waterway to Portsmouth, New Hampshire. Rather, the course chosen was by land across Wisconsin to Sturgeon Bay, where she was again placed in the water to transverse the Great Lakes and across New York State by canal, entering the Hudson River and making the voyage around Manhattan into Long Island Sound and through the Cape Cod Canal to Portsmouth. There she was once again lashed to wheels to make a midnight journey (with main roads having to be briefly closed for its passage) to Alton Bay. After freeing her from her brief grounding on the shores of the bay, the wheelhouse, stacks, and other appurtenances from truck "B" were reassembled onto the hull and superstructure, and the Winnipesaukee Belle began her new life in our local waters.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS COMMITTEE **VOLUNTEERS NEEDED**





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
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FROM PLAQUES TO PROGRAMS

LITTLE ROCKS, BIG ROCKS AND STONE WALLS

If anyone knows about New Hampshire rocks and stone walls it is Bob Woodward of Laconia who has retired after many years of forestry work, surveying, and timber cruising. He tells the story of the creation of the New England land mass that began over 400 million years ago. Gigantic upheavals by the shifting earth crust and rising magma from the great depths created our mountains and valleys. The mountains were 20- and 30-thousand-foot peaks.

What the ice ages did to them and how they became the hills and rocks we know today is fascinating.

JUST HOW WET WAS JUNE?

The year 1998 might not only be remembered as the one that brought THE "ice storm of the century" in January, but also as the year that had Lake Winnipesaukee fuller than it has been since the all-time record set in 1984. On June 21 the big lake peaked with the official number registering 14.5 inches above "full."

The excessive high water necessitated a "no wake" ban going into effect on June 18 and continuing until 12:01 a.m. on July 11 when higher speeds were permitted at a distance greater than 500 feet from shore. On July 14 the remaining no wake within 500 feet of shore was lifted to return to the normal boating rules. There were letters to the editors of the Laconia and Wolfeboro newspapers on how nice it was to return to the quite lake of yesteryear, but there was also no doubt that the tourist industry and the local economy took a significant "hit" while the restrictions on boating were in effect.

What is apparent from the data collected both officially and non-officially locally, is how fickle nature was in sprinkling participation around the State. The National Weather Service's official number for Concord was a total of 7.95 inches for June. Yet the Mount Washington Observatory recorded 19.96 inches, which easily topped the previous record of 16 inches for the month set in 1973. Closer to home, meteorologist Bill Swaffield reported a total of 13.81 inches accumulated throughout June in his Wolfeboro rain gauge. In Alton an amateur's rain gauge on Alton Mountain Road recorded 16 1/2" for the month with six inches of that occurring on the weekend of June 13.

In a report published in the *Granite State News* on June 24 Swaffield compared this June's weather experience to

that when a no wake rule was last in effect in 1984 from June 1 through 17. Interestingly, that year the precipitation for the months of May and June totaled 15.52 inches in Wolfeboro, while the big lake crested at 19.44 inches above full on June 4. Interestingly, a letter to the editor of the GSN, published on July 1 from Frederic J. Teichmann, pointed out that the late Chester Fernald had calculated that to raise the level of Lake Winnipesaukee one inch requires 15 billion 400 million gallons of water! Now, does anyone want to multiply that by 14.5 and tell us how many times around the world a string of tank trucks carrying that much water would run?

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
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ALTON WINS SPECIAL HONOR

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

What is an outdoor person to do with the usual hot August weather?

For those interested in fishing, fish DEEP. Local lakes and ponds are at their warmest this month and fish head for cooler waters. Use lures and baits that go deep, or fish early or late in the day while the waters are cooler. The large rivers north of here — Saco, Andrescoggin, and Connecticut — can still provide some trout fishing. Look to the fast water as this has more oxygen and is cooler than the slower moving water.

August is the time for the hunter to ready himself for the coming seasons next month. September 1 starts the general Black Bear hunting season statewide. If you plan to hunt bear, check the regulations closely as they vary by regions and hunting method. With many sightings of bear in the local area this spring, the hunting could be very good. A bear similar to the one pictured in Main Street last month passed through our front yard in June, about eight feet from the house, while my wife watched from the living room windows.

The New Hampshire State Senate recently passed a bill (the first to do so in the country) to ban the sale of lead sinkers for use on inland waters by July, 2000. Lead has been removed from gasoline, shotgun shells used in the hunting of waterfowl, and now, out of our waters by the fishing crowd. As lead is phased out of use, other non-toxic materials are already being offered by some manufacturers. Let's all do our part to get the lead out!
