A SAD DAY FOR ALTON

Thursday, May 11, 2000, is a date that will long be remembered by Alton residents, especially the members of the St. Joan of Arc Parish. Shortly after two o'clock in the afternoon, the heat from a plumber's soldering of pipes in an air conditioner unit ignited adjacent combustibles and a fire ensued that quickly leaped beyond the ability of the few nearby people to put it out.

Rev. Richard Wegman, pastor of the church, was next door in the rectory when he noticed smoke coming from the building. He picked up the phone to get the fire department on its way and then rushed to the burning church to remove whatever he could from harm's way. The statue of St. Joan of Arc was one of the first things he carried out.

The Alton Fire & Rescue Department received the call for help at 2:24 p.m., and five minutes later Ladder Truck 1 was on the scene with Deputy Fire Chief Bob Witham assessing the situation. He called immediately for additional support with the ultimate result being that Barnstead, Gilford, Gilmanton, New Durham, and Wolfeboro all had equipment and firefighters reinforcing Alton's first string in short order. At the height of the fire there were 23 Alton firefighters and

no less than 18 mutual aid personnel on the scene.

Alton's first firefighters to arrive undertook both to remove precious artifacts from the building and squelch the fire. Hoses were brought into the first floor sanctuary which was filled with unusually thick smoke. Great difficulty was experienced in locating the exact location of the fire and where to train the hoses.

When Fire Chief Russ Sample assumed command, it was evident that the church roof was in danger of collapsing, and he evacuated the building. The Alton and Wolfeboro ladder trucks became the main assault units, putting their heavy streams of water onto the flames emitting from the roof, while other hose lines from firefighters on the ground attacked lower hot spots. At 3:55 p.m. the fire was declared under control, but not much remained of the Alton spiritual and physical landmark formerly recognizable as the St. Joan of Arc church.

So complete was the devastation that what remained of the structure had to be demolished the next afternoon in order not to be a hazard. A few things were saved. According to Joanne Towle, Parish Secretary, the mahogany altar rail that was the gift of Al Jolson in memory of his wife Ruby Keeler,



WILL THE 51st BE THE LAST?

The Alton Bay Barbershop Jamboree will convene for the 51st time on June 9 - 11, but it may well be the finale to a half century of summer four-part a cappella harmony in Alton.

Nashua's Granite Statesmen (the 1999 Northeastern District Chorus Champions) has been the S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. organizer of the musical part of the annual event for the last 26 years. Various Alton groups — primarily the Downing family until just a few years ago — have been the local sponsor. Times are changing, however, and the Nashua singers are looking for another Barbershop group to assume the leadership in carrying out the S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. role in the jamboree.

Meanwhile, in Alton, there is no formal group to uphold the host community's part of the bargain.. The Alton-Alton Bay Chamber of Commerce was the last organization to provide the home base logistics, but they are no more. Last year and this year it has been an informal latch up of individuals who have taken care of the support work in Alton to make it all work. Counting on dedicated individuals to come together almost spontaneously and then be efficient in getting the local arrangements accomplished is a heck of a way to run a railroad — or even a single jamboree.

This year Cecile Chase, manager of the Bank of New Hampshire's branch in Alton, took up the cudgel and enlisted a few other good people to take care of Alton's commitments in making the Barbershoppers feel at home. Cecile is willing to be the initial contact point for anyone and everyone willing to carry on Alton's part of the jamboree in 2001 and beyond. Next year and beyond, however, also depends on Nashua's Granite Statesmen finding a S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. group willing to do what they have been doing for more than a quarter of a century.

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HISTORIC ALTON: DELVING INTO THE HISTORY OF ALTON By Judith Pellowe

Perhaps the best known source for information about the history of Alton is the book by Barton McLain Griffin, published in 1965. Copies of this work are still available in the Town Hall at a price of \$8. There are a number of other, less well-known, sources for information on Alton's history. Albert V. Fisher wrote a history of Alton contained in three notebooks, which can be checked out from the Gilman Library.

Additionally, as part of the Alton Bicentennial celebration, a series of essays were written. This was a cooperative effort with many contributors on a number of topics. The Gilman Library has a set of these essays, which can be used in the library but not checked out, and the Historical Society Museum also has a set. The essays cover such topics as Alton's Indian Heritage; Religious Congregations; Farming in Alton; Taverns, Hotels, and Stage Coach Stops; Education in Alton; and many others. There are a total of 21 separate essays that provide a wealth of information about Alton's past and the growth of the town. During the 1996 Bicentennial year some of these essays were reprinted in Main Street.

A REALLY PUBLIC PUBLIC HEARING

On June 1 at 7 p.m. LRPA-tv will be bringing Alton homes with cable TV into the 21st Century. Viewers tuning to Channel 25 at that time will be able to participate in a public hearing from the comfort of their living room. The subject of the public hearing will be the renewal of Metrocast's franchise to serve its area. Metrocast is the cable company serving the town of Alton, among others. If you are a Metrocast subscriber and have a view on whether their franchise should be renewed, or under what conditions, this will be an opportunity for your voice to be heard.

Scott Blair, a student from Alton Central School, attends the Kingswood Regional Automotive Service Technology Program taught by Scott Jamieson. On April 14 Scott competed in the USA-VICA Job Skills Demonstration at Pease Air Force Base in Newington.

He took first place overall for the State of New

Hampshire.

The competition, sponsored by the Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA), consisted of preparing a five-toseven minute performance of an occupational skill explaining a topic through the use of experiments, displays, or practical operations in which the student is training. Scott's choice was performing an oil change.

His first place finish earned him the right to compete in the National Skills-USA-VICA Competition that is to take place at the H. Roe Bartle Conference Center in Kansas City, Missouri, on June 29. Scott will join more than 4,000 students from across the country who are competing in 70

occupational and leadership skill areas.

Skills-USA-VICA is an applied method for preparing America's high performance workers in public vocationaltechnical programs. It provides quality education experiences for students in leadership, teamwork, citizenship, and character development. 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BOATING SAFETY COURSE OFFERED By Joe Harris

The New Hampshire Bureau of Marine Patrol is offering Boating Safety Courses during the summer months as part a nation-wide campaign to promote safety afloat. The courses will be offered in Concord and Gilford during July and August, as the June courses have been filled. Each course consists of two four-hour sessions. The courses offered in Gilford will be held on July 11 and 18 (Tuesday evenings), August 4 and 11 (Friday evenings), and August 9 and 16 (Wednesday evenings).

Classes will also be held in Concord on July 22 and 29 (Saturday mornings) and on August 19 and 26 (also Saturday mornings). Classes are planned for this coming fall at other locations throughout the state with dates and places to be announced.

National Safe Boating Week occurred in May with this year's emphasis on the importance of wearing life jackets. Each year more than 800 people die in boating-related accidents, and the majority of victims were not wearing a life jacket. The goal of the continuing campaign is to promote the use of life jackets and reduce accidents on the water.

MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS **SAY THANK YOU**



WHEN THE WATERS WARM UP

sunfish, etc.) are on the move, as most are spawning.

I particularly look forward to catching small mouth bass this month. They are in the shallows readily protecting their spawning area and will strike anything that invades that territory. They are a blast on a fly rod as they jump out of the water often and may even perform their tail walk for you. One must remember that this is catch and release fishing only, with artificial lures only. As always, be sure to check the regulations.

If you'd like to try your hand at fishing, Saturday, June 3, is free fishing day in New Hampshire. You can give fishing a try without buying a license, but be sure to pick up a 2000 NH Freshwater Fishing Digest. This is the book of rules and regulations, available for free at any store that sells fishing tackle. Even though you do not need a license that day, all the regulations and catch limits must still be followed.

National Fishing Week is June 5-12 with various fishing activities offered nationwide. If you have never fished and want to learn, call 603-271-3512 to find out when a "Let's Go Fishing" course is offered. It is offered free from the NH Fish & Game Department and teaches the basics of fishing. For the kids, Farmington Fish and Game Club is holding the Annual Kids Fishing Day on Sunday, June 4, 8-11 a.m. It is held at Club Pond in New Durham for kids ages 3-12. A

free lunch and lucky number door prizes will be the main highlights, along with the chance to catch some fish. Children must register at the clubhouse and get a "lucky number" tag before they start to fish.

Having had a good salmon season in April and a good turkey season in May, Alton is a great place to enjoy the


May 15 started Teacher Appreciation week. At that time we got the chance to let the teachers know how much we appreciate them taking the time to educate the youth of Alton.

Continued from page 1 was not completely destroyed. The section that bore the inscription placque emerged greatly charred, but recognizable. Another section was not in the church, having previously been placed in storage. The four stained glass windows at the rear of the church, the altar's Jesus On The Cross, and the chalices and blessed sacraments were among some of the other significant items that were saved.

When Fire Chief Russ Sample was asked later about the trial that the Alton Fire & Rescue Department was put through in trying to save St. Joan of Arc, he extolled the dedication and skills of the department's personnel and those of the adjoining mutual aid communities. He went on to say "As the activity simmered down, we all, especially me, contemplated the effect this destruction would have on the congregation of parishioners. However, in the midst of the emergency, the Christian community had already begun to meet the needs of Father Wegman and his church family, truly a testimonial to [his] ministry and the small town of Alton."

Editors' note: St. Joan of Arc's normal schedule of services now held at the Meeting House on Main Street.

On that subject, anyone contemplating running for office should know that June 6 is the last day to change party affiliation and the filing period is from June 7th thru June 16. The primary this year is Sept.12 and election day is November 7. Remember to vote!

JUST HOW OLD WAS ST. JOAN OF ARC?

An intriguing question arose in doing the research for the page one article on the fire that consumed the St. Joan of

Arc church: Just when was the church built?

Other newspaper reports of the fire quoted people saying construction was as early as 1918. One book on the subject is *The History of Alton, New Hampshire* by Barton McLain Griffin, published in 1965. It says (page 64) "...enough [money] was raised to purchase a small lot ... for the erection of a small building. It remained unfinished in the interior The year was now 1931."

The St. Joan of Arc Parish, 1999 booklet contains a photo of the church captioned "Late 1920's." Alton, A Town to Remember (1987), page 30, has the same photo labeled "first constructed in 1931." However, The Historical Churches of Belknap County by David Ruell, et.al. cites newspaper articles which has the building being erected,

shingled, and painted in 1923.

So, to return to our headline: Just how old was St. Joan of Arc? If you have a lead, call 875-5067 with a **final** answer.
