MAIN STREET ENTERS 16th YEAR AS ALTON "FIXTURE" By Bob Calvert, Publisher

This July issue of Main Street marks its 15th anniversary on the Alton scene! Vol. 1, No. 1, appeared in July, 1985, announcing that a grant from the C. S. Mott Foundation represented seed money to launch a monthly newsletter for Alton residents. A working committee of five Alton residents who attended a volunteer program on community-school relations in Concord came home and worked for close to a year preparing for such a launch. The five were Cathy Calvert, Chris Consentino, John Duffek, David McKenney, and Bill Watkins.

The success of Main Street and its continuing life and exuberance is largely due to some outstanding volunteers, supportive advertisers, and such stalwarts as John Duffek and Bill Watkins who made sure that it would survive and become an Alton household word. Today such excellence is shown in people like Co-editors Bob and MaryBee Longabaugh and the many folks who write, prepare copy, and come together to assemble this periodical each month of the year.

IN TOURN NEWSLETTER Over a year ago, four representa-tives of the Alton School attended a conference hosted by the New Hampshire School Volunteer Program on community-school relationships. A number of processls and idease were brought back to be discussed by a gathering of representatives of various organizations and interests in Alton. 

ATTENTION! ADVERTISERS ATTENTION! RATE CHANGES TAKING PLACE JULY 1

<u>Main Street</u> is entering its 16th year of existence. In that time the Board of Directors has not raised advertising rates even though costs to the paper have continued to rise. Reality now has to be faced because while the paper should not be making money, neither should it be losing money.

Therefore, as of July 1 the current <u>basic</u> rate of \$12.50 a column/inch will be THE RATE for ALL ADS. If you wish to take advantage of a 10 percent savings, you must sign a contract for either six months or one year and prepay for that period. The discounts formerly available for an annual contract are no longer offered.

All advertisers who are currently under contract will not be affected by this change until their renewal. At that time those advertisers will have the option of choosing a prepaid six-month or one-year contract or submitting an ad each month with payment enclosed. There will be no more monthly billing.

Along with the above change, the Advertising Manager is requesting all ads go through her. We ask that you put your ad copy and money in the <u>Main Street</u> "mail box" inside the Alton branch of the Bank of New Hampshire or mail them to P. O. Box 210, Alton Bay 03810. Previously you dropped your ad off at Alton Printing and your money at the bank.

We thank you for your cooperation and understanding with these changes in policy.

IA MEMORIAM

GEORGE WINCHESTER STONE, Jr (1907 - 2000)

For the many who knew him and valued his life and many contributions to the culture of Alton and its many town commissions and task forces on which he served, the passing of George Winchester Stone, Jr., is a huge loss in our community. Following a long and distinguished career in the academic community with more honors and awards than any six men or women might hope to earn in a lifetime, he chose his ultimate retirement community here in Alton and began a new chapter in his very productive and people-oriented life.

A strong hand in the United Associations of Alton (UAA) for many years, he served as its president for three terms and was a prime mover in many plans and "campaigns" in that organization that were later adopted by the town. An outstanding example was the campaign to bring zoning to Alton, pushed hard by the UAA who also supplied volunteer workers to help. He was a key player in the Gilman Library expansion fund-raising campaign and a familiar figure in the annual East Alton "Unofficial" Independence Day parade, as well as a key role in the Alton Bicentennial as coordinator of several priceless mini-histories of Alton.

Alton was, indeed, fortunate to have "Win" Stone in its community and its community life for an extended portion of his highly productive years.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE DAY By Joe Harris

The annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day will be held on Saturday, July 29, 9 a.m.- 12 noon. It's that time of year to check your house, garage, barn, and workshops for any hazardous items you would like to dispose of, but were not sure how to do it. Alton residents and taxpayers are encouraged to bring waste items to any of the nine locations throughout the Lakes Region. Collection sites closest to Alton are the Gilford Department of Public Works on Route 11A and the Wolfeboro Public Works Garage on Route 109A.

Residents should be reminded that only household products will be allowed; no commercial waste will be accepted. Households are limited to ten gallons apiece.

What should you bring? Look around the house for old cleaning fluids, polishes, pesticides and insect sprays, pool chemicals, and rodent killers. Check the garage for old motor oil and transmission fluid, antifreeze, brake fluid, old gasoline, and used car batteries (limit two per family). Wood preservatives, stains, oil-based paints, sealants, and paint thinners from the workshop will also be accepted. Don't forget that the Alton Recycling Center also accepts some of these items year round, but call ahead (875-5801) to be sure.

Participants will be asked to complete a brief survey to help improve future collection efforts. We all should thank the Alton Conservation Commission for coordinating the

THE PATH LESS TRAVELED By Joe Harris

Any hiker who has attempted to climb Mt. Major during a spring, summer, or fall weekend knows just how congested the trail can be. With a summit at 1,130 feet of elevation, Mt. Major offers hikers of all ages and abilities a great day trip to one of the area's most scenic peaks. The recently completed Brook Trail now offers a relaxing and scenic alternate route to the summit.

Beginning at the parking lot and following the main trail for 3/4 mile brings you to the trailhead for the Brook Trail. Bear to the right, leaving the main trail, and you begin a loop around the base of Mt. Major. The trail crosses the Minge Brook twice as it meanders through the forest. There are caves to explore along the way. The trail also crosses open ledges offering spectacular views of the lakes region. It joins the trail from Straightback Mountain to complete the trip to the summit. Descending by way of the main trail offers hikers a loop without having to retrace the path.

The Brook Trail (2.35 miles) is about a 1/2 mile longer than the main trail but has fewer steep grades and is a peaceful alternative. The Mt. Major Club has placed topographic maps at the beginning of the trails, and both are well marked. The next time you feel like taking a hike, why not choose the path less traveled? Happy trails!

HOW OLD WAS ST. JOAN OF ARC

In the last issue of <u>Main Street</u> (page 22) the question was asked as to when the church building that was consumed by fire on May 11 was built.

Various sources placed the date anywhere from 1918 to 1931. We invited readers to supply us with information that would lead to a final answer. Town Welfare Officer Pat Rockwood sent <u>Main Street</u> a copy of pages 12-14 of *The Historic Churches of Belknap County, 1791-1940* by David Ruell, published in 1995.

On page 14 it is stated "Little is recorded of the actual construction of the church beyond a few items in the area newspapers. By late June of 1923, the Farmington paper could report that work had begun on the church." A few excerpts on progress are cited from "a Laconia paper," and the coverage concludes that the Farmington paper had a news item in early November [1923] that the church "was being painted."



All were in full dress uniforms and were joined by Mr. Carl Hoitt, owner of the pavilion, attired in a Revolutionary War dress uniform complete with tricorn hat.



#### TRACK AND FIELD CONTENDERS By Kristi Getz






#### VFW POST HONORS ROBERTS By Nancy Mooney Hebert

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
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STUDENTS PLANT TREES AT LEVEY PARK By Denise Lachance, Science Teacher






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#### **TOWN DOCK EXPANDED**
