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# FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK By Donald E. Parks Superintendent of Schools

LAZY SUMMER? NOT REALLY!

Often I hear people say I will be on vacation for two months because the students and faculty have left for the summer to recharge their batteries and, on the part of faculty, to participate in in-service activities. Actually, the summer recess is a very busy time for the superintendent and high school principal, both of whom are employed for 12 months of the year, as well as the School Administrative Unit's (SAU) office personnel.

The administrative assistants at both the SAU office and at the school building level are very busy ordering supplies and materials, updating student and faculty handbooks, processing purchase orders and the payments thereof, assisting with the hiring of faculty and staff, and notifying unsuccessful candidates for jobs. The Business Manager is likewise busy closing out all financial matters for 2000-2001, preparing for an audit, and opening up the budget for the next fiscal year 2001-2002.

As Superintendent of Schools I also serve as the SAU's personnel officer. By the opening of school the district will have hired 13 new teachers, one new assistant principal, and six new staff members. The new teachers will be (or have already been) hired for special education, math, science, elementary music, pre-school special education, kindergarten, first and third grade, high school English, home economics, and computer instruction. In the staff area there will be four new educational assistants and two custodians, one of whom is the new Director of Buildings & Grounds, Peter MacBrien. I also write part of the federal grants and entitlement program in the district and do some of the evaluations of the programs which operated during the 2000-2001 school year.

The gym floor is being refinished again because it was not done properly last summer. Roofs are being replaced in three different areas. The roof and gym refinishing began the week of July 16. Another major task is the refurbishment of the new SAU office. Because the district received no bidders, I will be acting as the general contractor for the district. The district will hire a number of sub-contractors to complete the work. Occupancy is anticipated this September.

I choose to write this article for the purpose of dispelling the myth that not much happens in the education business during the months of July and August. It is not written for the purpose of justification or to embellish the position but simply to indicate these two months are very productive.

The opening day for students will be August 27 and the first day for teachers will be August 22.

TRASHING OUR TOWN

Over the years Main Street has devoted space on our pages to reminding our readers of the importance of keeping Alton looking neat and tidy. But then, why would anyone live in New Hampshire unless appreciation of nature and trashfree landscapes was important to them? So, it's probably pretty close to preaching to the choir to bring the subject up

A reason to bring it up now, however, is that there may be GOOD news. The situation may be improving!

Several observers around town, who are part-time "picker-uppers" of roadside litter, have reported to Main Street that they believe the amount of trash that they are seeing is less than in previous years. Alice Ziegra Calvert, who has many years of experience in roadside picking-up along 2,000 feet of New Durham Road south from McDonalds, says that this year she is gathering less than one bag of road trash per "patrol" while previous years have seen her bring back four large burlap feed bags from each outing. Richard Doerre of Lakewood Estates, who was featured in the January, 1999, issue of Main Street for his clean-up efforts along Rand Hill Road, also has noted a lessening of roadside litter in his area.

The trend is not town-wide, however. MaryBee Longabaugh and her spouse, who look after the lower section of Alton Mountain Road, claim that the number of beer cans

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

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

#### **VOTERS CHECKLIST BEING PURGED**

Please be aware that in accordance with RSA 654:39 the Supervisors of the Checklist are in the process of "purging" the voters registration list which we maintain. Every ten years the state mandates that the supervisors send out letters to anyone who has not voted within the past two years. Therefore, anyone who did not vote in any election (national, state, local) from the Presidential Primary in February 2000 on to the Town Ballot Vote in March 2001 has received a letter asking if he/she wishes to remain on the list.

The last date for you to see the supervisors to let us know you wish to continue on the voters list will be on Saturday, August 25, 11 a.m. - 1 p.m., in Alton Town Hall. After that date all people who have been designated as non-voters will be deleted from the list.

You can always re-register by going to see the Town Clerk or the supervisors at election time. Be aware that you must have two forms of identification, one being proof of a physical residence in Alton — a Post Office Box is not a physical residence.

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#### SUMMER IS FAST AFLEETING

The summer season starts to wind down this month. If you haven't done any of your summer activities, this is your last chance. Otherwise, it is time to get ready for the fall.

Fishing this month means going deep as lakes and ponds are at their warmest temperatures. Trout and salmon are way down deep now. Bass are most active early and late in the day, holding in deeper, cooler water in the daylight hours. A full moon on the fourth will provide enough light for some exciting night fishing. Surface lures that are noisy, such as the Jitter Bug or the Hoola Popper, are best for fishing after dark. There is nothing quite like hearing a bass slurp down your lure while your senses are on full alert. Once your eyes adjust to the dark, it is fairly easy to see. Keep the use of flashlights to a minimum since the light will ruin your night vision for a while.

For the trout angler head north this month. The cooler Connecticut and Androscoggin Rivers can still provide some good fishing. They are at their lowest flow rates, and the fish will be concentrated in pools and deep runs. Terrestrial fly patterns (grasshoppers, ants, caterpillars, etc.) are best as aquatic insect hatches (mosquitoes, may flies, etc.) are winding down. The trout will be easily spooked, so a careful approach will be needed.

For the hunter this is the month to prepare for the upcoming seasons. The bear hunter should obtain written land owner permission now to establish bait sites or set up stands. The archer must also obtain written land owner permission to set up tree stands. Gear should be prepared and sighted in, clothing aired out, and supplies gathered.

To help the archer prepare this month, Farmington Fish and Game Club will host its last 40 target 3-D shoot on August 26. This is realistic practice with targets set up in the woods at different distances, uphill shots, downhill, and around trees and bushes. The archer's foot must touch a colored stake, determined by his shooting classification, and shoot one arrow only from an unknown distance for scoring. Most targets are full-size deer targets, with an elk, wolf, coyote, turkey, or bear thrown in to challenge the shooter. Registration is from 7 - 11 a.m. at the New Durham clubhouse; trophies will be given for all classes. For more information, call 859-FISH.

The committee's work will be done over about a six-week period in the September-to-October time frame.

Site Reviews

Any proposed non-residential use of property or proposed multi-family dwelling units must undergo Planning Board "site review." The purpose of the site review is to make sure that common sense items have been properly addressed, i.e., parking, appropriateness of a business type for the location, adequate visual buffering, snow storage, lighting, abutters concerns, and so on. Site review is required for any proposed commercial/business use which is either: a new use for that property, an expansion of an existing approved use, or a change of type of use (say from retail sales to professional offices). If your proposed use is a home occupation, you may be eligible for the simplified "minor site plan review" process. You can pick up a copy of the Site Plan Review Regulations or the Class I & II Home Occupation Regulations at the Land Use Office on the second floor of Town Hall.

#### AND THE ROAD WORK **CONTINUES**

Don't turn those air conditioners off yet! The humidity is still hanging around.

The excavator arrived on July 23 and will be here through September 21 for the projects on Coffin Brook Road, Chamberlain Road (both ends) and Prospect Mountain Road.

The reconstruction of Alton Mountain Road is on its way, starting from Avery Hill Road to Alton Shores. Please expect delays and possibly the road being closed during this time.

#### PURPLE LOOSESTRIFE INVASION

The Grade 4 enrichment students have been studying Purple Loosestrife. They have learned many things, including it is called an alien or exotic plant which means it is not native to New Hampshire. This project started last October when Megan Farrell, Cory Dudman, Michael Jensen, Stephanie Roy, Brittany Dwyer, Casey Barenger, and Emily Donahue, two Conservation Commission experts, two parent volunteers, and the Enrichment Coordinator went to the Alton Traffic Circle and with skillful guidance cut the tops of the plant stalks so that the seeds would not spread. The team returned to the circle early this past June to finish pulling Purple Loosestrife roots and planting native New Hampshire plants.

Purple Loosestrife spreads like wildfire and chokes out our precious native plants. It can be up to five feet tall and has spike shaped leaves with many brilliant purple flowers. One plant can produce millions of seeds. The next time you see this plant, remember, it is not just a flower; it is an alien!

Many thanks to all who helped make this project a success. The team will continue their conservation project in the fall with a different approach to controlling the spread of the dreaded plant. We will keep you posted as to the development of this new fascinating strategy.

The warm weather is here, and the summer folks have settled in. We've

been getting calls about the use of off-road vehicles, including golf carts and motorized scooters. To set the record straight, golf carts cannot be used on public roadways. This means that even a private road which is maintained for public use is considered a public roadway in the context of OHRV or other motorized vehicles.


With regard to motorized scooters these are considered "mopeds" under New Hampshire law, and anyone who operates them on a public way must be licensed. This means that the kids who have these scooters CANNOT ride them except on private property.

One last reminder from last summer. There are "rules of the Bay," and they are found in the Town Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Relative to the Regulation of Town Property and Prohibiting Disorderly Conduct in Certain Public Places." In a nutshell this covers what CANNOT be done in the Bay — including using obscene language or gestures, playing your car stereo too loud, riding a bike or skateboard in certain areas, squealing car tires, or riding a wheelie on a motorcycle.

I would like to take this opportunity to let everyone know that if there are any questions on these issues or any other issue, please call the police department (875-0757), and we will be more than happy to assist you.


