## SAFETY FACILITIES COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS EXPANSIONS By Richard Cunningham

The Alton Safety Facilities Committee is composed of Residents, one representative each from the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, and Budget Committee, the Police Chief, Fire Chief, Town Planner and the Town Administrator. After hundreds of hours of research and meetings the Committee has compiled their findings and recommendations in a report to be presented to the Board of Selectmen.

Recommendations in the report address the immediate needs of Alton, based upon the rapid population growth of both year round and seasonal residents, highway traffic, school growth and commercial growth. Projected growth through 2020 results in future safety services growth and the need for expanded facilities.

The Summary Report below, along with a detailed Needs Report and a Demographic Prospective will be presented to the Selectmen at their regular meeting on November 3, at 6pm at the Town Hall. All concerned citizens should make every effort to attend.

## Summary of Findings and Recommendations Safety Facilities Committee

### **Findings**

- Alton's year 2003 estimated total population ranges from 7,269 in winter to 17,465 in summer. (These totals include second home and seasonal residents)
- Alton's year 2020 estimated total population ranges from 11,892 in winter to 27,485 in summer.
- The current Central Fire Station is in critical need of space for equipment and personnel which needs to be addressed immediately.
- The current Police Station is cramped and overcrowded and can go no longer than five years without becoming a critical and immediate need.

- A new Joint Safety Facility would be the ideal solution offering optimum joint operations management and sharing of assets. The 20,500 square foot facility would require 5 to 7 acres of land. The joint facility probably could be constructed on the existing Central Fire Station lot at the expense of relocating the tennis and basketball courts.
- Two new separate facilities would require: (a) an estimated 14,000 square foot facility on 3 to 5 acres for Fire/Rescue and (b) an estimated 9,000 square foot facility on 2 to 3 acres for Police. This appears to be the most expensive solution.
- It appears that both the existing Police Station and the existing Central Fire Station are expandable to meet future needs to 2020 and beyond. While there are issues to be dealt with in both cases, realistic options are available. This appears to be the least expensive solution.

## **Suggested Timeline**

- Add a bay to the Central Fire Station in 2004
- Contract for Engineering Design Services in 2004
  - 1. Preliminary design and cost of rear two story addition to Central Fire Station.
  - 2. Preliminary design and cost for Police Station expansion
  - 3. Preliminary design and cost for Joint Safety Facility
- Final decision on solution(s) in 2005
- Contract for construction of selected design(s) in 2006 or 2007

#### **Recommended Selectmen Actions**

- Support a 2004 warrant article for an expansion to the central Fire Station that would add an additional 20'x40' bay.
- Support a 2004 warrant article for engineering services to develop preliminary design and cost estimates for the expansion and joint facility options.
- Support a 2004 warrant article to create a capital reserve fund for expansion of the existing Central Fire Station and the existing Police Station or construction of a Joint Safety Facility.

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## NEW RESIDENT MV REGISTRATIONS By Lisa Waterman, Alton Town Clerk

New residents to Alton from another state have 60 days to register their vehicle(s) and obtain a NH driver's license. The registration process is done at the Town Clerk's Office in the Town Hall. The following documents are required:

current driver's license current registration

vehicles 1989 and newer need an original title, not a photocopy, with the current odometer read ing if there are two owners listed on the title, both people must be present to sign the title application

two pieces of mail with an Alton <u>street</u> address such as an electric bill, oil delivery receipt, rent ers receipt, lease agreement....

cash or two checks, we do not accept debit or credit cards

A New Hampshire driver's license can be acquired at any licensing office. You will need to bring your current driver's license, birth certificate and proof of residency (car registration).

Vehicle registrations for new residents from another town in New Hampshire are due in your renewal month. You need to bring:

current driver's license

current registration

two pieces of mail with an Alton <u>street</u> address such as an electric bill, oil delivery receipt, rent ers receipt, lease agreement...



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
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## SENIOR CITIZENS CORNER By Nancy Mooney Hebert



ALTON OUTDOORS By Jack Miller The month of November means only one thing to the outdoor person—deer hunting! Though archery deer hunting

season has been open since September 15, November 2nd opens the muzzleloader season. Any deer may be taken Nov. 2-4, but Nov. 5-12 is antlered deer only. Muzzleloaders must be single shot with a minimum of 40 caliber. With only one shot, one must be sure of their target, shoot accurately, and limit shots to standing or slow moving deer only. Quite the challenge! Good luck.

Nov. 13th opens the firearms (rifle) deer hunting season. In the Alton area (J2 WMU) any deer may be taken on the 13th or 14th. Only antlered deer may be taken from Nov. 15-Dec. 8. If you hunt different parts of the state, be sure to check the regulations as they vary depending on which WMU you hunt.

The wet weather we had this summer was good for the mast crop (acorns and beech nuts) Deer are feeding on them heavily and should be able to fatten up for the winter. Find where oaks and beeches have dropped lots of nuts and you should find deer near by.


There are still people who hesitate to use Alton's outdoors during the hunting season. Hunting is a safe sport. All hunters must take a hunter education course. There were 78,500 licensed hunters in NH last year, and only 5 hunting incidences with no fatalities. NH had 8 straight years of Triple A rating for safe hunters by the National Hunter Education Organization until 2001 when there was 1 fatality involving hunters in the same hunting party. It did not a involve any non-hunter out enjoying the woods.

If you are worried about hunters in the woods surrounding your home, the Fish and Game Department will give you "Safety Zone" signs to be posted around your house to notify hunters that they are approaching an occupied residence. ## FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT By Donald E. Parks

The first quarter student report cards will be going to parents in early November along with individual student results on the New Hampshire Educational Improvement and Assessment Program (NHEIAP) and the Stanford 9 Achievement Tests. I am proud to tell you the results on both assessment instruments are excellent. I am very pleased with the results on the NHEIAP tests, particularly at grade 6 and grade 10. The percentage of students scoring basic (acceptable progress) improved significantly as demonstrated on the charts below. We (teachers, administrators, staff and School Board) attribute this growth to a number of factors, but the most noteworthy one was the alignment of Alton's curriculum to the NH Curricular Frameworks. By doing so, there was greater awareness on the part of the faculty of what should be taught at each grade level. A special thank you to the faculty, staff, building principals and School Board for their commitment, focus, and effort, and in particular, the teachers who provide the instruction.

Many of you are familiar with the federal government's passage of a law called No Child Left Behind. This is the most significant and important legislation passed in the history of American education other than state laws for compulsory education. The focus of this legislation is on school accountability and that is done by looking at the assessment of student achievement. Each state in the United States has had to submit a plan to the U.S. Department of Education as to how that state would hold schools accountable by way of an assessment program that demonstrate schools are making Acceptable Yearly Progress. In the State of NH, students will be rested in reading, writing and math in grades 3-8. At the present time, students will continue to be tested in using the NHEIAP tests until the new tests are developed. In addition to looking at student achievement, schools must also demonstrate that they are testing at least 95% of the eligible number to be tested including disabled students, have a high graduation rate (expect 90-95%), and have a high attendance rate. (expect 95% or above) These new additional requirements will not create a problem. Alton's current percentages in these areas exceed the ones being proposed.

The 12<sup>th</sup> Annual Zonta Holiday House promises not to disappoint!

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


## BRIGHTEN THE HOLIDAYS! SUPPORT MRS. SANTA FUND





#### HOW YOU AS A VOTER WILL BE REGISTERED By MaryBee Longabaugh, Chair Supervisors of the Checklist

Your three Supervisors of the Checklist (voter registration list) attended a workshop in October presented by the New Hampshire Department of State and the Attorney General's Office. The focus of the four-hour session was to make sure all people involved with voting procedures know all the new rules that have been instituted.

One thing that was brought to our attention concerns the terminology of a voter who does not wish to be listed either as a Republican or Democrat. The program we inherited into which we place the voter information obtained on the registration card, was set up as Republican (R), Democrat (D), Independent (I), and Libertarian (L).

According to RSA 652:16-a the voter who does not show either Republican or Democrat automatically becomes Undeclared (U). Therefore, the supervisors will be working towards revising the list of nearly 3,000 names to either insert a "U" in place of the "I" or we will leave a blank space if "U" is not allowed.

Scott Baumgartner, a 2003 graduate of Alton Central School, has earned the designation of AP Scholar by the College Board in recognition of his exceptional achievement on the college-level Advanced Placement Program (AP) Exams.

The College Board's Advanced Placement Program offers students the opportunity to take challenging collegelevel courses while still in high school, and to receive college credit, advanced placement, or both for successful performance on the AP Exams. Almost 15% of the more than one million high school students in more than 14,000 secondary schools worldwide who took AP Exams performed at a sufficiently high level to merit the recognition of AP Scholar.

Students took AP Exams in May 2003 after completing challenging college-level courses at their high schools. The College Board recognizes several levels of achievement based on the number of year-long courses and exams (or their equivalent semester-long courses and exams).

Scott qualified for the AP Scholar Award by completing three AP Examinations, with grades of 3 or higher. Scott is currently attending Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut.
