PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS COMMITTEE PLANS RECREATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Parks and Playgrounds Committee has embarked on an ambitious project: to connect Alton and Alton Bay by a series of recreational facilities along the Merrymeeting River.

CONFERENCE RESULTS IN TOWN NEWSLETTER

Over a year ago, four representatives of the Alton School attended a conference hosted by the New Hampshire School Volunteer Program on communityschool relationships.

A number of proposals and ideas resulted from this meeting and these were brought back to be discussed by a gathering of representatives of various organizations and interests in Alton. Among the proposals, one stood out as particularly applicable to Alton — a newsletter consolidating information on events of general interest and importance to school and community alike.

It was evident to members of the Alton Committee that because of the geographic spread of the Alton communities, no single news source of local events was available. A decision was made to begin working toward the development of such a newsletter for the town of Alton and a grant was received from the C. S. Mott Foundation to seed the program.

A working committee of five persons was formed: Catherine Calvert, Christine Consentino, John Duffek, David McKenney, and William Watkins. This committee subsequently became incorporated as a non-proft organization, Voice of Alton with the purpose of publishing a newsletter for Alton.

courts are now available for public use. According to Parks and Playgrounds Committee Chairman Jonathon Downing, "Further development in that area will consist of an ice skating rink, jogging and walking trails, a picnic area along the river, basketball courts, and fishing access areas."

"This is being paid for entirely by donations from individuals, businesses, clubs, and associations and donated services - all of which is matched by a grant from the Land and Water Conservation Fund Program," said Downing. The grant is administered by the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development.

"What we need now are people to form committees. People who have an interest or expertise in areas of recreation and can serve as advisory committees to our committee," Downing added. "For example, we need people to help us in the design of trails for jogging, walking, snowmobiling, cross country skiing, and bicycling."

GILMAN LIBRARY IS MORE THAN BOOKS

Come browse in the Gilman Library and see for yourself the variety of resources the Library has to offer. books go home with you for three weeks and our collection includes best sellers as well as many interesting nonfiction books. A special section reserved for New Hampshire history. Our children's books are plentiful and books featured on Reading Rainbow have been gathered in a separate place ease in finding them.

If books are not of particular interest to you at the moment, perhaps you will find something among our other services.

For children, there are books with cassettes and video cassettes that can be viewed in the Library or checked out for home use. A Polaroid Sun camera is available and you supply only the film. For the musically-inclined, we have a 49-Key Casiotone Keyboard with bar code reader and sheet music that may be borrowed for a week.

Local newspapers can be found in the magazine rack and the Boston Globe and Boston Herald are on the reading table. Over 30 periodicals are also on the magazine rack and may go out for one week.

A photocopier that will reproduce standard or legal size copies is available for 10 cents a copy.

The big treat of the summer are the two computers being lent to the Library by the Alton Central School for public use.

Of course, our librarians are eager to serve you and help with any questions you might have.

TOWN HISTORY; TO BE COMPUTERIZED

Town Historian, Al Fisher, and his wife, Dorothy, are transcribing their vast historical files to computer disks using computers loaned to the Gilman Library by the Alton School for the summer.

The project was started eight months ago and will consist of information on over 3000 residents of the town from 1760 to 1880.

Alton will he unique among stowns and cities of Neω Hampshire in having a computerized record of its heritage available to its residents and others interested in the history of the town.

Other members of the Parks and Playgrounds Committee are Barbara La-Pointe, Herbert Persan, John Streeter, and Nancy Zappone.

The committee, in addition to its development program, is responsible for the Town Beach, docks and boat ramp; the Bandstands; Levy and Harmony Parks; and the swim instruction program and lifeguards.

Phase II of the development program has already been funded by another grant from the State matching the value of land donated for recreational purposes by Bradford Jones and Nancy McGuirk. This land is along the river in the area east of the Town Garage on the Letter S Road.

This second phase, now in the engineering stages, will include a multipurpose field, a combination Softball/Little League-type field, picnic area, tot playground, fishing access, small boat launch, parking, and a pedestrian bridge across the river.

The final phase will complete the connection from Alton to Alton Bay with a series of trails through the State Forest.

The design of the recreational development program has emphasized the need to maintain the natural state of the sites. Downing stated that "the project will have no impact on fish and wildlife or the air, water or geological state of the area."

Downing explained that "Alton has long neglected the recreational potential of its natural resources. We hope to correct this situation with our development program."

Donations may be sent to the Farmington National and Savings Bank in Alton for the Sheila Griggs-Ryan Fund.



GILMAN LIBRARY READING PROGRAM


"BE A BOOK TRAVELER" is the theme for this summer's reading program at the Gilman Library.
