## REGISTRATION REMINDERS By Lisa Waterman, Alton Town Clerk

Here are a few reminders about the car registration process:

- 1). Renewals you MUST bring in either the current registration or renewal letter
- 2). Multiple renewals add town amounts together for one check payable to the Town of Alton add state amounts together for one check payable to the St. of NH MV
- 3). When renewing by mail a self-addressed, stamped envelope is REQUIRED
- 4). New registration 1990 model year or newer title, certificate of origin, or blue title application from NH dealer
- 5). New registration 1989 model year or older bill of sale and <u>one</u> of the following:
- a. A previously issued or expired NH registration (or copy) b. A valid NH or out-of-state title; or c. A verification of VIN (TDMV19A)—this form can be picked up at the Town Clerk's office
- 6). Transfer original current registration is needed to transfer a registration from one vehicle to another first owner must be the same on each registration
- 7). We cannot take credit cards, cash or checks only

If you have an aqua-therm (water bubbler) it's time to renew your permit.

Hopefully these hints will help you save time when registering your vehicle. If you have any questions, please call the Town Clerk's office at 875-2101 Monday - Friday from 8:30 to 4:30.

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### HIGHWAY HAPPENINGS By Ken Roberts Highway Agent



Here it is already December pretty mild for the this time of year but don't let old man winter fool you, he could start snowing at any time.

I would like to remind you to please mark your mail boxes with bright orange or red flags, something that is high enough and above the mail boxes that will stand out. This would help the drivers as they plow, but please bear in mind we are not out to hit your mail boxes, sometimes the snow is so high that the visibility is not always clear, and anything in the Right of Way may get during plowing, we do apologize for this.

Speaking of visibility for the mailboxes, we have noticed a lot of your E911 numbers attached to rocks, poles, stands, and other low objects, they are to low to the ground, with not knowing how deep the snow will get, it will make it impossible to see your numbers should you need E911 for rescue, your numbers should be on your house and on a well secure post, approx. 10' in alongside your driveway, and your numbers should be reflecting and appear approx. 5' high ion the post. this ensures the rescuers that they are at the right place.

Also I would like to correct an error that was made in lasts month's issue of Main Street regarding winter sand; Merrill Excavating will not be delivering winter sand to the highway shed, North East Mechanics will be delivering the winter sand for the year 2005 and 2006.

The construction on Old Wolfeboro Road has ended for the winter, they have paved to Powder Mill Rd, and have hydro-seeded the embankments, and also installed the guard rails where needed. They will resume in the spring, there is no scheduled date at this time.

In the mean time we have been changing summer tires over to winter tires, setting up the plows and sanders, we are ready for old man winter any time he is.

Once again PLEASE yield to any emergency vehicles, please stay back 200 'behind the plow trucks, these trucks make wide turns, and have such tremendous weight that not only the visibility is difficult, but the road conditions make it very difficult to maneuver, keeping this in mind will ensure the safety of both you and the driver.

As we continue our daily routines of cleaning the ditch lines, sweeping the paved roads, grading and raking the graveled roads, and flagging our culverts. We ask you to keep your calls coming in as you make the difference and help make Alton a better place to live. The phone number is 875-6808.



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### FROM THE ASSESSOR'S OFFICE By Tom Sargent

In our continuing series on the three differenct approaches to property valuation that the assessor can use we will focus this month on the second, which is the Income Approach. The income approach is a capitalization process of converting a series of anticipated future payments (income) into present value. Capitalization transforms net operating income produced by a property into property value.

The income approach is used when: 1) there is no reliable sales data available for an income producing property; 2) it is a valid check on the value indicators provided by cost and sales comparison approaches in value.

We would also like to advise the residents of Alton of a change in the a deadline for the filing of any Veteran Tax Credit or Elderly Exemption Application starting on January 1, 2005. Both of these must be filed no later than April 15th of any given tax year. There will no longer be an abatement of a tax credit or refunds if these are filed after April 15th for any given tax year beginning on January 1, 2005.

The Assessors Office hours are from 8:30am to 4:30pm Monday through Friday.

With winter and snow on its way we would like to take this opportunity to remind you of the E911 ordinance, please double check and make sure that the numbers that are near your driveway or entrance will be visible to an emergency vehicle in the event of a heavy snowstorm or from plowing. Make sure that the numbers on your home are also easy to see. This is for your safety and for Police, Fire and Ambulance to find your home in a timely manner.

- 1. December 8, 2004 is the last day for the Selectmen to accept petitions to amend Zoning Ordinances.
- 2. The Supervisors of the Checklist will meet Tuesday, January 18th between the hours of 7:00 and 7:30pm at the Town Hall to accept new voter registrations.
- 3. The filing period for any registered voter interested in a Town Office is January 19 - January 28, 2005. A list of the vacacies will be in the January issue of Main Street.
- 4. February 1, 2005 is the last day to petition Selectment for a warrant article.
- 5. The deadline to register to vote at the Town Clerk's office is February 25th at 5:00pm or with the Supervisors of the Checklist on Saturday, February 26, 2005 between 11:00 and 11:30am.
- 6. The town election will be held on Tuesday, March 8th with the Annual Town Meeting the following night. Absentee Ballot applications are available at the Town Clerks Office for the town and school elections.
- 7. It's also time to renew your Aqua-therm permit. The cost is 50 cents and will expire on July 1, 2005.
- 8. We will be closed on December 24th and 25th for the Christmas Holiday and December 31st for New Years.


### Senior Bingo Co-Sponsored by Profile Bank

### ALTON FIRE/RESCUE DEPARTMENT By Mary Jane Dascoli, Secretary

Calls for service for the month of October totaled 45. These calls included 10 Fire related, 34 Medical Emergencies of which 5 were motor vehicle crashes, and 1 Service call. Emergency calls remain significantly higher than last year at this same time especially amidst the Forestry Season. Remember permits are required for any outside burning as long as it is not too windy or the level of fire danger is not too high.

We've been busy recently with Oil Burner and Wood Stove inspections. If you recently had an oil burner installed or replaced, you must have it inspected by the Fire Chief. This is especially important to new home builders/buyers; before the Building Inspector will issue a certificate of occupancy, you must have the oil burner inspected. Residents are also reminded as we transition into the heating season to have your chimney cleaned and your furnace serviced. Don't wait until the cold weather to realize you have a problem; for your safety, check these things out early.

We'd also like to remind residents to be sure your new 911 number(s) are visibly posted in accordance with the Town Ordinance relating to the E-911 System so as to avoid violation penalties ranging from \$10.00-\$300.00. If you have not already done so, post your E-911 numbers to enable us to locate you if an emergency occurs. If you occupy rental property and your E-911 numbers are still not posted, please notify your landlord, then the Fire Department; we will work with you to see that this situation is rectified. Additionally, per New Hampshire State Fire Code "Smoke Detector Requirements for Multi-unit Dwellings, Section Saf-C 6018.02 Installation and Maintenance", any rental property must contain working hard wired, 110 volt smoke detectors. Any battery operated fire warning devices installed in multi-unit dwellings shall be replaced by automatic fire warning devices that are powered by the house electrical service. Please call the Central Station if you require additional information or if you are in need of a copy of the changes made to this State Fire Code.

Keep your eyes open and maybe some residents have already seen the new engine to arrive at the Central Fire Station; Engine 2. If you see this truck going down the road without its emergency lights operating, be assured that we are probably in the process of driver training with this new vehicle. Any resident interested in checking out this new truck up close and personal is encouraged to visit the Central Fire Station. We are more than happy to show off this new piece of apparatus. This specialized Engine carries 2500 gallons of water with a 2000 gallon per minute pump plus 30 gallons of Class A & B foam.

The Alton Firemen's Association will be selling Christmas trees again this year. The Association members will be set up and open for business once the trees arrive to the Aubuchon Hardware Store (Formerly Alton 5 & 10) lo-

cated off the Alton Traffic Circle. Keep a look out for our Christmas trees and stop on by.

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### A VOLUNTEERS PERCEPTION OF HOSPICE By Susan Lampron

My initiation into the Hospice program began nearly fourteen years ago with my father-in-law's diagnosis of terminal lung cancer. At the time I never suspected how much Hospice would affect my life, not only on a personal level but a professional one as well.

On a sunny, warm Florida day, John was given a prognosis of three months to live and within a short time of that day Hospice became a part of his life. On a few occasions I went down to visit, offer support and help in any way that I could. During that time I watched as the Hospice nurses and others on the team would come in to take care of his personal needs, medications, diet, and answer questions and offer other services including Reiki and spiritual counseling, as well as support and counseling for the family members.

I was impressed with the kindness, consideration and gentle ways in which the team handled not only John but the family as well. It was during my last visit that I realized that vollunterring for Hospice might be my niche. Three months later I signed up for the Hospice training with VNA-Hospice of Southern Carrll County & Vicinity, Inc., and became a Hospice volunteer.

Hospice work taught me that the unexpected can happen, that in a matter of moments life as we know it can be irrevocably altered, leaving us reeling and struggling to make sense out of a world that has suddenly been turned upside down. That death is a part of life and that it doesn't have to be experienced alone.

As a Hospice volunteer, I learned that there are so many ways in which I could help. That each person, each family has different needs. Some families need time to run errands, finish chores, visit with friends, while I sat with a loved one. Others needed help with household chores, a child taken care of, companionship, someone to listen. Each patient having their own unique personality has left me acknowledging that while we may all be different, that although our paths in life may vary, our basic needs are very much the same. To be respected, to have someone listen, to just sit quietly, to be accepted and loved for who we are, to maintain our dignity at the end of life, to not be alone.

The rewards of volunteering are great. The number of peole I have met through this program, who have openly and willingly shared their toughest times have given me a gift. To appreciate life on it's simplest of terms, to understanding the complexity of emotions within each of us. However, the greatest gift of all has been that of friendship and a bond forged that will never be forgotten.

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

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

## TIME TO SIGN UP FOR SNOWMOBILE SAFETY CLASSES

Snowmobile enthusiasts are gearing up for a safe season on the trails by signing up for free snowmobile education classes across the state. To operate a snowmobile, any person over the age of 12 must have either a valid Motor Vehicle Driver's License or have successfully completed an approved OHRV Safety Education class taught by Fish and Game-trained volunteer instructors. Many classes end up with waiting lists, so sign up early. Parents are encouraged to sit in on the classes.

"Snowmobiling is a great way for folks to get outside and have fun," said Maj. Timothy Acerno, who heads up Fish and Game's Off-Highway Recreational Vehicle (OHRV) Education Program. "But riders have a responsibility to obey the rules of the trails, to be courteous and — most of all — to ride safely. Our Conservation Officers will be out on the trails all winter long using radar to enforce

speed limits and setting up sobriety checkpoints as a visible reminder of those responsibilities."

Snowmobile safety education classes, taught by Department-certified volunteer instructors, are offered to the public free of charge. The courses are completed in a single day. They are useful refreshers for any snowmobile operator and are required for youths 12 and older who don't have a driving license and want to drive a snowmobile across public ways. Please note that all children under the age of 14 must be accompanied by a licensed adult when operating a snow machine off their parents', grandparents' or guardians' property.

Many of the trained volunteer instructors teaching the safety classes are affiliated with one of the more than 100 snowmobile clubs in New Hampshire. "Joining a snowmobile club is a great way to learn about safe riding and help maintain trails for your own and others' enjoyment," Acerno said, noting that club membership also gives riders a \$30 break on snowmobile registration fees.

The New Hampshire Snowmobile Association (NHSA) and its member clubs have actively promoted safe and responsible riding since 1969, according to NHSA President Lucy Ford. "Our enthusiastic members continue to work with the state to manage over 6,800 miles of trails and provide safety education to more than 2,500 children each year," Ford said.

This winter, Fish and Game Conservation Officers will continue to use innovative enforcement patrols to detect and apprehend impaired snowmobile operators, including use of Preliminary Breath Test machines provided by the New Hampshire Highway Safety Council. These ongoing initiatives will help to keep the state's snowmobile trails safe for all outdoor enthusiasts during the upcoming season.
