DOWNTOWN REVITALIZATION COMMITTEE PRESENTS PLANS FOR PARK By Judy Fry

The Downtown Revitalization Committee came together last fall following a Charrette held October 2000. The committee was formed in September 2003, and is now comprised of Bonnie Barsanti, Judy Fry, Marty Cornelissen, Nancy Merrill, Deanna O'Shaughnessy, Elizabeth Varney, Planning Board Rep. Thomas Varney, Board of Selectmen Rep. Patricia Fuller, Town Planner-Advisor Peer Kraft Lund, and Town Admininstrator Russell Bailey.

We have been holding monthly meetings working toward a selected project in the village area, one that would be multi purpose for the enjoyment and benefit of townspeople and visitors alike. Revitalizing the former Boston & Maine Railroad yard, located next to the Alton Police Station, offered such an opportunity and has been selected as the committee's first project.

The vision for this area includes a park incorporating and celebrating the railroad history of the Town of Alton by saving the old railroad freight building. It was part of the B & M Railroad, which was vital to the growth of the village, Bay, and the Lake Shore Railroad line to Lakeport.

The park will not only be historic, but will also be a place where parents with young children can walk to a small playground, a gazebo where families can gather to visit and picnic, and where townspeople may take a walk along a mini path towards Old Wolfeboro Road. The plans also include additional parking for Town Employees and visitors.

As mentioned above, the project includes the restoration of the 1896 B & M Freight Building, which is held by the Alton Historical Society under a ninety-nine year lease from the Town of Alton. The members of the Historical Society will be actively participating in the future plans for this building - which include such possibilities as a historical museum or railroad museum - and they will have final approval on that buildings future use.

The funds for this revitalization project will be raised through grants and future fund raising. At the March 11, 2004 Town Meeting, townspeople generously approved \$5,000.00 to be used for matching funds for a grant (half the amount) and half the amount to be used toward a town wide Round Table Discussion/Charrette to be held in July or August (more details next month). Townspeople, including Alton Central School students will be invited to share their ideas and thoughts about the area. We urge everyone in town to celebrate the Town's histroric past and help us build this vision of a multi use park for everyone to be proud of and enjoy.

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
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The weight limit ban has been lifted and the signs are down. We are priming the plows, cleaning the sanders, changing the snow tires to summer tires, all a good sign winter is over.

The crew has been out continuosly cleaning culverts and ditch lines, we ask you to check your driveway culverts, as this will help keep the ditch lines open and the water flowing freely. The paved roads have been swept, the catch basins will be scheduled soon to be cleaned out, we ask for your patience during that time.

The excavator is coming in june 1st. There will be blasting on Stockbridge Corner (Dudley side), Dudley road ditching, grinding and paving.

The second phase of Old Wolfeboro Road will start approximately the third week of June.

A Reminder: Driveway permits on graveled and paved roads require that they are tapered back 2% from the road way. Pavement requiress 1/2" per foot, gravel 1/2" per foot. When a driveway is pitched too steep, where does the water go? Over the traveled road way, causing a hazard, especially in the winter, when it creates ice. When the driveway is tapered back the water then can run down from the roadway, into the ditch line and then into the continued culvert. This keeps the water flow controlled, which keeps the roadway from undermining.

Remember public safety is our number one concern

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June is a fishing month; actually, fly fishing month. The bugs are out and at their peak, and that is what the fish feed on. Both warm water species (bass, perch, sunfish and crappie) and cold water species (rainbow, brookie and brown trout) will be in shallow enough water to be catch-able with fly fishing gear. If you have never used fly fishing equipment, this is the month to give it a try.

The state has many fly fishing only ponds that are well stocked with trout. These are usually small lakes or ponds well suited to fishing from a canoe, kayak, or float tube. Some are remote and some are easily accessible. They are usually less crowded and more peaceful than other bodies of water. The closest one to Alton is Cold Rain Pond in New Durham. As always, be sure to check the regulations for the body of wate you wish to fish on.

The state's rivers and streams are at their best now--not too high, not too low. They also provide some great fishing. Flies, spinners or worms will all catch fish in the moving water.

If you fish bass waters, don't forget that only artificial lures and flies may be used, and all small mouth and large mouth bass must be released at the site of the catch through the 15th of this month. From the 16th to the 30th you may choose what you wish to entice the bass, and you can keep two fish if you want to.

Saturday, June 5th is a great day to give any kind of fishing method a try. It is NH's Free Fishing Day. No license is required, but all the other rules must be adhered to. Take a kid fishing, or your spouse. Have fun and you might get a new fishing buddy.

June is the month of days with the longest daylight of the year, so catch some fish while the sun shines.

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ALTON RESIDENTS ON STATE UNCLAIMED PROPERTY LIST

State Rep. Michael Whalley (R-Alton Bay) recently announced that the New Hampshire State Treasury has identified the following Alton residents as having unclaimed property in custody of the state. Residents should contact the state's Division of Abandoned Property at (800) 791-0920 for further information and to obtain a claim form.

Abandoned/unclaimed property consists of money and other personal assets that are considered lost or abandoned when an owner cannot be located after a specified period of time. The New Hampshire Unclaimed and Abandoned Property Law (RSA 471-C) & Administrative Rules Tre300 require all "persons/holders" to review their records annually to determine whether they are in possession of properties which have become dormant and are presumed to be abandoned. Holders are required to report and remit such properties to the state.

Examples of unclaimed/abandoned property include, but are not limited to savings/checking accounts, gift certificates, wages, uncashed checks, dividends, bonds, refunds and paid-up life insurance policies. Unclaimed and abandoned property law in New Hampshire does not apply to land, buildings or other tangible property.

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JUNE HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION By Sarah Silk

May 15th started the household hazardous waste collection season. Of 80 households represented, 6 were from Alton, 9 from Sandwich, 4 from Tuftonboro, and 61 from Wolfeboro.

Passes and brochures listing what to bring are available from the solid waste facility in Alton. Bring the pass to the collection at the Lakes Region Household Hazardous Product Facility at 404 Beach Pond Road in Wolfeboro. From Rt 28 in Wolfeboro Falls, bear left onto 109A just after the Army tank at the Wright Museum. Follow 109A to the cemetary on the right and turn right onto Beach Pond Road. The Facility is about a mile and a half on the left (just before the solid waste faciiity). On collection day sunny yellow signs grace both sides of the entrance.

New this year, drop off your bag phone, cell phones, pagers, or PDA (palm pilots). They are recycled at no cost through a return program. Also pick up free envelopes to mail spent printer cartridges for recycling at no cost through a mail-in program. You don't even need a stamp!



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ITCHKAVICH-LEVASSEUR PART OF AWARD-WINNING TEAM From UNH Press Release

A team of six University of New Hampshire (UNH) engineering and business students, won first place at the 14th annual Environmental Design Contest, held April 4-8 in Las Cruces, New Mexico. Environmental engineering majors Ryan Andersen of West Caldwell, N.J., Thomas Callo of Centerville, Mass., Maureen Lewis of Rindge and Patrick Smart of Farmington developed the technology as their senior design project. They worked for months with Whittemore School of Business and Economics students Brandon Lavertu, a senior accounting major from Epsom, and Briahna Itchkavich-Levasseur, a junior from Alton studying entrepreneurial venture creation, making a business plan to commercialize it.

The team of UNH undergraduates took top honors in its chosen task of removing carbon dioxide (CO_2) from the atmosphere with an approach that so wowed the judges that UNH also took home the competition's Intel Environmental Innovation Award for the second time in three years.

"The Department of Energy people were all over this. They were stunned," said team advisor Kevin Gardner, UNH research associate professor of civil engineering. "They were shocked and amazed. They'd never heard of anything like this."

Starting with an idea hatched by Gardner and Thomas Seager, a project engineer with UNH's Environmental Research Group, the environmental engineering students invented a technology for removing CO_2 - the chief culprit of global warming - that achieves significant reductions in atmospheric carbon at a fraction of the cost of current technologies. The students have already received a provisional patent for the technology and plan to submit a full patent application within a year.

"This is a very promising technology that does not appear to have any known competitors," said Robert Dalton, director of the UNH Office of Intellectual Property Management. "This is a really exciting project. It could be the next spin-out business for UNH."




A FUTURE IN PHARMACY By Carol Murtagh

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FAMILY DISASTER PLAN By Dick Cunningham

Do you have a family disaster plan? A disaster can strike quickly and without warning. It could come in the form of a fire, hurricane, flash flood, hazardous materials spill, earthquake, tornado, or a winter storm. All these events have occurred in New Hampshire and in Alton. It could strike when you are at work, at school, or in your car. How will you find each other? Will you know if your children or other family members are safe? A disaster can force you to evacuate your neighborhood or confine you to your home. What would you do if basic services like water, gas, electricity or telephones were cut off? Police, fire and relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster but they might not be able to reach everyone right away.

Families can and do cope with disaster by preparing in advance and working together as a team. Your plan should include two meeting places. One should be right outside your home, and one outside your neighborhood. You should designate an out of town contact. You should have a Family Emergency Contacts List in addition to everyone being familiar with calling 911. You list should include the names of all family members and a neighbor or relative's name and number. In addition it should include telephone numbers for the Telephone Company, Gas Compnay, Electric Company, Doctors' names and numbers and Veterinarian's number.

You should have a Family Disaster Supplies Kit that should contain a 3-day supply of water for drinking, washing and preparing food and a three-day supply of nonperishable foods. In addition, your should have medicine and supplies for First Aid, and tools such as a radio, flashlights, oil lamps, manual can opener, utility knife and extra batteries. You should also have supplies to stay comfortable, safe and entertained, such as games and books, paper and pencils, blankets and hygiene supplies.

Be sure to consider special needs equipment such as a cane, baby bottles, wheelchair and medical maintenance supplies. And don't forget your pets. Where are they going to stay safe? What are they going to eat?

Your American Red Cross, Greater White Mountain Chapter, located in Laconia, has a great planning sheet for your completion and use along with a Family Disaster Plan Kit. Call them at 524-5414 or stop by their office at 21 Lyford Street.

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENTS DESK By Donald E. Parks

At recent Alton School Board meetings questions have been raised as to whether the Pre-K-8 school will be top heavy with building level administration and guidance counselors when school opens next fall. As the community knows, but it bears repeating, Prospect Mountain High School will open in September, 2004, and the 9-12 students from both Alton and Barnstead will be attending this new facility. Alton will become a PreK-8 school only.

The State Board of Education of the State of New Hampshire has established Minimum Standards For Public School Approval. Changes to all New Hampshire Minimum Standards for School Approval have been mandated by the federal government under *No Child Left Behind*. The Minimum Standards for School Counselors will be undergoing a change. The proposal is as follows:

- *1*. The counseling load in each elementary school shall not exceed the equivalent of one full-time counselor for 300 students. Present law states 500 students.
- 2. The counseling load in each middle-junior high school and each high school shall not exceed the equivalent of 225 students enrolled. Present law states 300 students. A conservative estimate for the fall of 2004 at Alton Central School will show an enrollment of 650 students. Based on the new proposed standards, Alton will need two counselors and that is the number of counselors the district will have in the 2004-2005 school year. The NH State Board of Education has already started the review process of adopting the Minimum Standards. All information received to date indicates these standards for guidance counselors will be adopted.

With respect to an Assistant Principal, Ed Law 306:15 (c) states the following: "The local school board shall ensure that each school with an enrollment of 500 or more students provides the services of an assistant principal to carry out administrative duties assigned by the superintendent in accordance with local school board policy." It is projected Alton Central School's Pre K-8 enrollment will be 650 students and therefore, it is necessary for the district to provide an assistant principal. When school opens in late August, Alton Central School will employ a principal and an assistant principal, which will make the district in compliance with State of NH Minimum Standards. It is hoped this information is helpful to community residents when questions arise as to whether Alton Central School is overstaffed in these two areas.

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ST. KATHARINE DREXEL CHURCH NEARING FINAL APPROVAL By Dick Cunningham

On May 10, 2004 a development team headed by Project Architect Dennis Keefe, Tyler Carlisle, Project Electrical Engineer and The Rev. George Ham, paster presented a site plan for the new Catholic Church that will be serving the Alton/Wolfeboro area to the Alton Planning Board. Although the Board Members were very supportive of the project several issues concerning driveways, Department of Transportation and Wetlands permits have still to be addressed. Town Planner Peer Kraft-Lund felt that remaining issues were minor but did not feel comfortable recommending approval for a project of this size until all issues were finalized. All were confident that everything could be completed for the May 24, 2004 meeting. The property located on Hidden Spring Road in a Rural Zone just off Route 11 North will contain a 26,000 sq. foot, 500 seat church and one additional building with three associated parking lots.

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
