39th ARMY BAND IN CONCERT **By Muriel V. Stinson**

On Wednesday, July 14th at 7:30pm, the 39th Army Band, New Hampshire Army National Guard, will perform at the Alton Bay Bandstand. The public is cordially invited to attend this popular summer concert, sponsored by the Bay Church. In case of rain the concert will be held in the tabernacle at the Alton Bay Christian Conference Center across the street from the Bandstand.

The 39th Army Band can trace its lineage back 124 years to its inception in Manchester in 1879. When activated for the Mexican-American War, it was known as the Band Section, 1st Infantry, New Hampshire National Guard. During World War I, the unit became known as the Band Section for the First Army Headquarter Regiment. During World War II it was known as the band for the 172nd Field Artillery, New Hampshire. Since 1947, it has been known by its current designation 39th Army Band.

There are approximately 40 musicians representing many communities throughout our state. Many of the soldiers are professional music educators as well as leaders in their respective towns and cities. The band is under the command of Chief Warrant Officer Thomas G. Fisk.


AUXILIARY CRAFT FAIR

DOG LICENSES By Lisa Waterman

Dog licenses expire every year on April 30th. The license has expired if your dog has a green tag dated 2003. As of July 1 a \$2.00 late fee will be added to the regular cost of a license. You may renew by mail by sending a self-addressed, stamped envelope, updated rabies or neutering certificate (which will be returned) and a check made payable to the "Town of Alton" in the appropriate amount which includes the \$2.00 late fee (**required**) to the Town Clerk's Office, PO Box 637, Alton, NH 03809. The regular fees for a dog license is: Male/Female, \$10.00; Neutered/Spayed, 7.50; 1st Animal of Sr. Citizen over 65, 2.00.

A police officer may visit your residence by mid-July with a civil forfeiture which carries a fine of \$25.00 per dog. This fine is added to the regular cost of a license. If you have any questions or do not have your dog please call the Town Clerk's office at 875-2101.

The "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" arrive in July with the longer days and warmer weather, which makes it a perfect month to get out and do some fishing. To bring this point home, the Fish & Game Department says, July 1st, you may keep 5 bass per day and use any legal method (bait, lures, jigs and/or flies).

Most fishing in the Lakes Region this month is for warm water species; bass, pickerel, perch (white and yellow), sun fish and horned pout. Any method of fishing will take these fish. The New Hampshire Fish & Game Dept. (NHF&G) on line will tell you what ponds, lakes and streams are stocked with trout. They also tell you what species are in our waters.

If you want to find out more about our lakes and ponds, you can purchase the NHF&G biological survey books. There are 3 books covering all of NH. Survey #8a covers Coos, Grafton and Carroll Counties; Survey # 8b covers Sullivan, Merrimack, Belknap and Strafford Counties; and Survey #8c covers Cheshire, Hillsboro and Rockingham Counties. The books contain a history of the ponds, their depts., clarity, type of bottom and shoreline information. They were printed in 1977, but are still a great starting point when looking for different places to fish. Contact the NHF&G for ordering information.

For trout, most fisher people head north to the remote ponds and streams in the White Mts. and above; the Androscoggin and Connecticut Rivers; or the Pittsburg area. I am going to spend more time this season learning about the striped bass fishing in the Piscataquog River and NH's short seacoast. This fishing is getting better each year and I'm going to try out some saltwater fishing. Maybe I'll have a bit more to report to you soon.

A VAN FOR RYAN Ryan Donnelly Fund By Arthur W. Hoover for Alton/New Durham Lions Club

Like many 18 year olds, Ryan Donnelly, a June honors graduate of Alton High School, is headed to college. Ryan will begin his freshman year at the University of New Hampshire in August.

Unlike those other 18 year olds about to begin their college experience, Ryan has never walked a day in his life. He is afflicted with "Osteogenesis Imperfecta", commonly referred to as a brittle bone disorder. As a result of this rare disease, Ryan's growth has been restricted; he has suffered several bone breaks during his lifetime and is confined to a wheel chair. Ryan and his trained golden lab, Megan, who assists Ryan in managing his daily tasks, will be living in a dormitory on campus.

His perseverance and resolve to achieve are compelling and set a positive example for people of all ages.

Ryan spent two months last summer learning to drive at the Crochet Mountain Rehab Center in a specially equipped van which is utilized by Crotched Mountain Center to assist disabled people in learning how to drive. Ryan successfully completed that course and obtained a driver's license.

Ryan requires a van which will allow him to travel to and from the University of New Hampshire and also navigate around the campus at the University, where he will major in English journalism. The van will give Ryan the mobility he lacks and better enable him to pursue his education. There is a program available that will modify the van as needed by Ryan at a cost of approximately seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000.00), which will be funded by that program. What Ryan and his family require is the base van that can be modified, the cost of which is estimated to be between twenty five thousand and thirty thousand (\$25,000 and \$30,000). It is an expense that neither Ryan or his family can manage as Ryan's medical needs and expenses have been extreme. The Alton/New Durham Lions Club has taken on the project of securing a van for Ryan. The Club currently is sponsoring a raffle for a Bose Wave Radio/CD and has dedicated the proceeds to this project. Information concerning the raffle can be obtained by contacting Charles Greeley, the President of the Lions, at 776-3282 or Susan Hoover, the Lions Club Treasurer, at 875-2800. The Club has also dedicated the proceeds from its mini golf night and car show for this cause. The mini golf night was held on June 23 at the Blue Jay Mini Golf Course in Alton Bay. The car show will be held on August 28, 2004 at the New Durham Railway Restaurant property in New Durham.

The Lions Club has established a special account for Ryan's Van at the Bank of New Hampshire. Any person or any organization, at any branch of the Bank of New Hampshire, can make a deposit to this fund by informing the teller that the money is to go to the fund. As all contributions will be made through the Lions Club they are tax deductible. Donations can also be made by mailing the contribution to the Alton/New Durham Lions Club at P.O. Box 331, Alton, New Hampshire 03809.

This project gives everyone in the Alton community the opportunity to support a worthwhile cause, which will benefit a deserving young resident of the Town who has, and continues, to overcome enormous odds.




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
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ALTON STUDENT TOPS IN STATE By Theresa Servetas

As you prepare for the 4th of July picnics and celebrations, check for common household products that may pose a safety hazard to all those summer guests and relatives, especially the tiny visitors. Automotive fluids, oil base paints, paint thinners, stains, pesticide, weed killers, household cleaners, charcoal lighter fluid, products marked: danger, poison, caution, flammable, should be set aside in original containers in a sturdy cardboard box for disposal at the Lakes Region Household Hazardous Product Facility (LRHHPF).

Get your LRHHPF pass at Alton Transfer Station prior to attending, bring it with you the 3rd Sat of the month at 404 Beach Pond Road in Wolfeboro. The Facility is easy to locate, there are 2 yellow signs at the entrance on collection day. Follow Rt 28 to Wolfeboro, turn right at the center of town headed to Wolfeboro Falls. After the Wright Museum, bear left at the fork in the road onto 109A. Proceed to the intersection of Beach Pond Rd. 

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THE ALTON B & M RAILROAD PARK **Downtown Revitalization Committee By Judy Fry**



AUTHOR TO PRESENT SLIDE SHOW By Judy Fry

Julie Boardman, author of the recently published book When Women and Mountains Meet: Adventures in the White Mountains, will present a slide show based on her book at the Oliver J.M. Gilman Library on July 20th at 7pm.

When Women and Mountains Meet traces the rich history of the White Mountains of New Hampshire through the lives of about three dozen remarkable women. Some of the women whom Boardman will discuss in her slide show are Lucy Crawford, an early-nineteenth-century innkeeper who wrote the first history of the White Mountains; Lucia and Marian Pychowska, a mother-daughter team who explored the White Mountains region when it was still an untracked wilderness; Emilie Klug, an endearing character who spent her vacations wandering along on the Presidential Range, and Miriam Underhill, who developed her climbing skills in the White Mountains and went on the become the worlds foremost woman mountaineer.

Although When Women and Mountains Meet deals with many hikers and mountaineers, it also covers women who enriched the region as writers, artists, scientists, and conservationists. In deciding whom to include in her book, Boardman said she chose women who "had a special feeling for the mountains. They loved being in the mountains, were curious about them, and looked to them for adventure, inspiration, or solace."

Boardman is a professional writer whose work has appeared in *Appalachia* (the journal of the Appalachian Mountain Club), *Sierra* (the magazine of the Sierra Club), *Connecticut Audubon*, *Connecticut*, *Ford Times*, and many other publications. Since moving to New Hampshire in 1990, she has hiked extensively throughout New England and climbed all the peaks in the region that are over 4,000 feet high.








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THE CHECKOUT DESK By Holly Brown Librarian

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
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ALTON FIRST GRADERS COMPLETE RISK WATCH PROGRAM By Mary Jane Dascoli

LIVE THE LIFE By Cindy & John Duffek

FORT DAVIS

We were camped in Fort Davis, the highest town in Texas, located in a small mountain range at 5100 ft. above sea level.

We drove over to Ft. Davis National Historic Park, about 1/2 mile from our campground. This fort was active from the Civil War until 1891, being a stop on the Overland Trail, which ran from St. Louis to San Francisco. Ft. Davis is located between San Antonio and El Paso, in the Davis Mountains. All the references here are to Jefferson Davis, Confederate president. Even the county is called Jeff Davis County. The county had only 2 towns - Ft. Davis, and Valentine, which is becoming a ghost town.

The National Park was the original fort, some buildings recreated to their original use, others just foundations. Most of the officers' quarters were still standing. The commandant's house had been restored and furnished to the period. The houses were very comfortable. All were lined up in a neat row, and each had a separate kitchen out in back, along with a walled in yard. Despite popular thought that forts were enclosed with logs, this is not true of western forts. First, there were not enough large trees to make a stockade fence. Most of the buildings were made of adobe (brick) or local quarried stone, which were available in the area. The enlisted men slept in long buildings, with a kitchen out back also. One had been restored and was furnished with beds, chairs, clothing, and even decorations. It looked fairly comfortable.

In the middle of the fort was a large parade ground. While we walked around, the bugle was sounded periodically and announcements made that would have been heard while the fort was open. The fort also had a church, school, court, meeting house, and dance hall – all in one building! The fort was backed up against some rocky hills, and looked out onto the Limpia Creek (which is now dry).

According to its website it is "one of America's best surviving examples of an Indian Wars' frontier military post in the Southwest. From 1854 to 1891, Fort Davis was strategically located to protect emigrants, mail coaches, and freight wagons on the Trans-Pecos portion of the San Antonio-El Paso Road and the Chihuahua Trail, and to control activities on the southern stem of the Great Comanche War Trail and Mescalero Apache war trails. Fort Davis is important in understanding the presence of African Americans in the West and in the frontier military because the 24th and 25th U.S. Infantry and the 9th and 10th U.S. Cavalry, all-black regiments established after the Civil War, were stationed at the post."

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
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
