Friends and neighbors began lining up along Roberts Cover Road, Lake Side and Cedar Cove communities in anticipation of the eleventh Annual Unofficial Parade. The twenty-three entries began gathering at the north end of Roberts Cove Road at 2:30 PM. At the start of the parade each driver received a patriotic dash plaque commemorating this annual holiday event.

At 3:00 PM Unofficial Parade Organizer, Irving Roberts, and Unofficial Parade Navigator, Russell Jones, set the pace with Irving's bright red calliope providing continuous music along the parade route. Never has there been such a large group of winners assembled for the Unofficial Fourth of July Parade.

A variety of vehicles passed along the parade route this year including two vintage military Jeeps, several colorfully decorated Golf Carts, and a Dune Buggy. There were several colorful convertibles; a Mustang, Porsche, Corvette, and Cadillac. There were antique cars and trucks, a 1930 Maxim Fire Truck, WWII Army truck, Model A Pickup Truck, plus a restored 1939 McCormack Deering Tractor. A modern fire truck rounded out this lively group of entries. A bright yellow Electric Car colorfully represented 'fuel saving cars'. Floats were patriotically decorated with American flags and bunting, including Lake Sides, Breeds Hill Battle complete with Patriotic and British dressed soldiers, a Volkswagen Transporter displaying a Camp Alton sign, 'Constitution' Electric truck and the Roberts Knoll Campground float.

The parade ended in the field near Route 28 where Mark Northridge was serving hot dogs, homemade cookies and drinks to the enthusiastic paraders. It was a fitting conclusion, all unofficial, or course, to a day celebrating our nations 228th Birthday. Special thanks goes to the NH State Police.

MORE AND MORE LOCAL VIDEOS ON CABLE AND AVAILABLE AT THE LIBRARY By Bob Longabaugh

The amateur journalists who co-edited Main Street for six years have switched their form of reporting from the print media to television. Viewers of Metrocast Cablevision's Channel 25 and 26 may have noticed an increase in Alton shows over the last few months. More and more school board meetings are appearing on Channel 26, and lately even the Alton-Barnstead Joint ("J.M.A.") School Board meetings are starting to show up on Channel 26.

On Channel 25 the meetings of the Alton Historical Society and the Friends of the Gilman Library are appearing with regularity. The July 13 meeting of the Friends featured Dartmouth Professor Allen Koop presenting a slide show on "The White Mountain Huts -- History and the Future" that contained photos going back to the late 1800's, as well as contemporary scenes of the Appalachian Mountain Club's present operation. The July 20 Historical Society meeting had Julie Bordman relating "When Women and Mountains Meet."

Alton residents do not have to have cable TV to see these shows inasmuch as they are also available for checkout at the Gilman Library. In fact, when the Longabaughs are the producers, the videocassette is available at the library even before it is shown on LRPA-TV.

STATE PRIMARY ELECTION **TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 2004** by Lisa Waterman, Town Clerk

The State Primary Election will be held at the Alton Central Fire Station on Route 140 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Tuesday, September 14, 2004. Republican and Democratic candidates will be chosen for the following positions: Governor, United States Senator, Representative in Congress, Executive Councilor, State Senator, County Officer, State Representative and Delegate to the Republican State Convention.

If you are not an Alton registered voter, you can register at the polls. You may also register at the Town Clerk's Office until September 7th or between 7-7:30 pm with the Supervisors of the Checklist at the Town Hall. You must present a photo I.D. and 2 pieces of mail with your name and Alton physical address on it such as a utility bill, car registration, or lease agreement.

Absentee ballots are available at the Town Clerk's Office. A registered voter must complete an application before a ballot can be mailed or handed to the applicant. The Town Clerk's Office will be open until 5:00 p.m. on Monday, September 13th to accept any absentee ballots. Absentee ballots will be accepted by Mail Only on the day of the election.

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TIME FLIES SEASON HALF OVER FOR HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION By Sarah Silk

Have you postponed attending the HHW Collection because it's open 6 times? Time flies and the season is already half over. The remaining 3 dates are August 21, September 18, and October 16. It is best not to wait until the final collection which had long lines last year. Placing commmon household hazardous products such as automotive fluids, cleaning products, garden supplies and pool chemicals, in a cardboard box in the truck speeds up removal by the waste haulers.

Get your LRHHPF pass at the \ Alton Transfer Station prior to attending, bring it with you the 3rd Sat of the month May through Oct. at 404 Beach Pond Road in Wolfeboro. The Facility is easy to locate, there are 2 sunny yellow signs at the entrance on collection day. Follow Rt 28 to Wolfeboro, turn right at the center of town headed to Wolfeboro Falls. At the Army tank, on the right at Wright Museum, bear left at the fork in the road onto 109A. Proceed on 109A to the cemetary on the right at the intersection of Beach Pond Road. Turn right and the Facility will be on the left just before the Wolfeboro Solid Waste Facility.

..The Alton Board of Selectmen voted to join the coalition of towns and cities proposing to sue the State of New Hampshire on account of the revised school funding plan it adopted.


..Korin L. Eagles of Alton was named as a Samsung American Legion Scholarship National Finalist.

August is a fishing month and a "get ready" month. Local waters are at their warmest this month, so the warm water species are the fish to go after. Largemouth bass, perch, pickerel and sun fish are all found trying to "beat the heat". Early morning and late afternoon are the prime times to find these fish active. They will hide in deep structures, under docks, in weed beds and along the shaded side of the shore line. Lily pads are hard to fish, but provide some excellent action. Use of weedless lures is a must! When the fish (usually a bass or pickerel) hit the lure, you get a quick jolt of adrenalin. The upper (northern) part of the Big W is the best area to find plenty of suitable habitat for these fish.

Smallmouth bass will be seeking cooler waters in the depths of our lakes, so one must fish deeper for this species. Crawfish are a favorite food of the smallies. I have been using plastic imitations of crawfish on an ultra light spinning rod with good success. The best imitation crawfish I have found is by YUM lures. They are a soft plastic tube lure in which you insert a weighted tin jig (no lead please). They do work well! Give them a try.

This month, one can also "get ready" for the upcoming fall seasons. Black bear hunting season starts September first (1) and archery deer season starts Sept. 15th. Now is the time to practice to be ready for these hunting seasons. Farmington Fish & Game Club in New Durham has a 15 target archery range and a 100 yard rifle range. Join the club, meet new people, have a place to practice and support the sports of hunting and fishing.

This is the last month of warmer temperatures, so go enjoy Alton's great outdoors.


MYSTERY SOAP LABEL By Christine Elliott

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VNA-HOSPICE GERANIUM FUNDRAISER BRINGS SMILES TO AREA YOUTH

The School Smiles Program, a school-baed oral health program, is the recipient of this year's proceeds from the VNA-Hospice of Southern Carroll County's Annual Geranium sale. The Geranium sale is a community fundraising event for the VNA-Hospice. Each year the proceeds go for a special project or need of one of the many programs and services that the agency provides to the community.

The funds will be used for eligible children to help pay for dental treatment. The School Smiles program provides preventive oral health services to eight elementary schools in the area. The program targets children in grades K-3 and provides oral health education to all children in those grades. In addition, the Registered Dental Hygienist offers an oral health screening to all children. For those children not currently seeing a dentist for regular care, the hygienist will provide a cleaning and fluoride treatment

The geranium fund will be utilized for children needing further treatment at a Dental office. Some of these families lack sufficient insurance or means to access that treatment. The program screened 799 children last year and cleaned the teeth of 166 children. Of those children, 21 had significant dental health problems that required treatment from a Dentist, Oral Health Surgeon or Pediatric Dentist.

Perhaps the most telling story about this event was the requests we heard asking us to repeat this event! In response the ACVT team plans to schedule this event annually on dates to be announced. Other comments we heard was that the event was informative, revealing and lively. We heard comments like "I never knew you did that"!

We look forward to expanding the number of presenters and public audience at our next Information Exchange. Alton Fire/Rescue Department by Fire Chief Alan Johnson

The Alton Fire/Rescue Department wishes to reminder residents to please be sure and post your new E-911 numbers so that in an emergency, we will be able to locate you. If you are not sure of your new E-911 number, you may inquire at the Town Hall.

Calls for service for the month of June totaled 65. These calls included 13 Fire related and 52 Medical Emergencies of which 21 were crashes; 12 involving motorcycles, 7 with motor vehicles, 1 with an ATV, and 1 on a moped.

The Town of Alton has appointed a committee to develop a Hazard Mitigation Plan for our community. This committee is represented by a wide variety of local interests including the Town Administrator, Emergency Management Director, Public Works, Fire Department, Police Department, and the Water and Sewer Department. The committee's focus will be on the natural and manmade hazards that put Alton at risk, and the development of recommendations to protect the safety and well being of Town residents. The committee will begin holding meetings August 11, 2004 at 1:30pm at the Town Hall. This is an open meeting and the general public is encouraged to attend.

Hazard Mitigation Planning is as important to reducing disaster losses, as are appropriate building codes and land-use ordinances. The most significant areas of concern for Alton include perennial and flash flooding, potential for wildfires, and snow and ice storms that produce power outages. With the development of the Alton Hazard Mitigation Plan, community leaders will be able to identify goals and actions to reduce the impacts of these hazards. Alton community leaders want the Town to be a disaster resistant community and believe that the development of a Hazard Mitigation Plan will bring Alton one-step closer to that goal. The new "Pumper" Fire Truck will be arriving to Alton sometime in August. This new truck will be designated as Engine 2, carrying 2500 gallons of water with the ability to pump 2000 gallon per minute when needed. It will have a six man crew cab whereby providing for extra personnel. The new Engine 2 will be housed at the Central Fire Station; Engine 5 will be moved to the West Station which will provide for better fire protection in the West Alton area.

Five new Intern Students will be arriving this Fall living at both the West Alton Station and the Central Fire Station. These new Students will be entering our Intern Program with EMS and Level 1 Firefighter certifications. We are looking forward to their arrival.

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

The municipal web-site process is ongoing, and will be available for viewing in the very near future.

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



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LEADERSHIP TRAINING FOR BELKNAP COUNTY PARENTS

A leadership training series open to parents who reside in Belknap County will begin on Saturday, October 16th and continue for four additional Saturdays through March 19, 2005. Called the P.A.L.S. Program (Parents As Leaders in Society) and modeled after Leadership New Hampshire and the New Futures Community Leadership Institute, this interactive training provides non-partisan information and skill development for parents interested in the problems and challenges facing children and families in Belknap County.

The P.A.L.S series, funded in part by a grant from the NH Children's Trust Fund, is sponsored by a collaboration of parents with the Belknap County Citizens Council on Children and Families, UpStream, Youth Services Bureau, P.A.C.T., Laconia Project EXTRA, the Laconia Human Relations Committee, and the Center for Civic Engagement. "We are looking for parents from throughout Belknap County to apply," says Alan Robichaud, Executive Director of the Citizens Council and the Chair of the P.A.L.S. Steering Committee. "Ideal applicants are those parents who are interested in boosting their leadership abilities and in applying their new skills right in their own neighborhoods and communities."

Robichaud explains that the long-range goals of the program include building local networks of parents and community citizens who are knowledgeable and comfortable as advocates for children and families.

"Grassroots community activity that comes from the unique strengths of each community is a far more effective change agent than top-down edicts," continues Robichaud. "We have numerous parents throughout this county who want their communities to be safe places where children and families can thrive. And, these are the folks we hope will enroll," he says, explaining that applicants don't have to be "super famous leaders in their communities", but rather "just regular citizens interested in helping out where they can."

The P.A.L.S. Series begins on the third Saturday of October with the UpStream-sponsored, parent conference, "Strengthening Families and Communities", at Memorial Middle School in Laconia. The afternoon P.A.L.S. session will begin immediately following the conference luncheon break.

Led by more than a dozen presenters from around the Lakes Region and New Hampshire, the five-session seminar will cover such topics as community-building skills, the political process, family dynamics in the 21st century, communication skills, an overview of child development, available resources for children and families, and leadership skill development. Participants will have ample opportunity at every session to share their experiences and reactions as they carry out these tasks.

There are no registration or tuition costs for participants and lunch will be provided. Limited childcare assistance is also available.

According to Robichaud, "We do not want any motivated parent to pass up this opportunity because of unmet childcare or transportation needs or due to any reason that we may be able to help resolve."
