The annual freshman initiation of Alton High School was held in assembly hall Wednesday evening and occasioned the usual amount of amusement and comedy. The freshman class is unusually large this year, numbering 35. Many children attend from Gilmanton I.W., New Durham, Barnstead, and other nearby towns.

Nearly 100 people attended, including many parents, alumni and several of the teachers. The affair was in charge of the sophomore class advisor, Raymond Martin.

After the usual initiation ceremonies, the freshmen were called on individually to perform on a programme. Herbert Jones of the sophomore class acted as master of ceremonies. Many of the pupils did not care to participate, so several names of freshman are omitted.

The list as played follows: George Bickford, pantomime; James Smith, recitation, "How to Drive Through Traffic;" Nelson Wentworth, song imitation of Kate Smith; Jeannette Davis, imitation of Ed Wynn; John Cass as Fred Astaire; Margaret Barr as Ginger Rogers; Katherine Trickey, pantomime; Madolyn Edison, tap dance; Curtis Mineot, broadcast of Louis and Sharkey fight; Betty Cooley as Gracie Allen; Vernon Sanborn as George Burns; Eleanor Hackett, tap dance; Crosby Scoville, imitation; John Clough and Rollin Dore as cooking experts, "How to make a Lemon Meringue Pie;" Barbara Plastridge, imitation of Fannie Brice.

At the conclusion of this entirely impromptu affair by the freshmen, refreshments of punch and cake were served by the sophomore class and the evening's entertainment was declared a decided success.



TWO DATES REMAIN FOR HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION By Sarah Silk

Saturday, Sept. 18, from 8:30am-noon will be the next to last collection for this season at the Lakes Region Household Hazardous Product Facility. Please place items in their original container in a sturdy cardboard box for safe transport and easy removal from your vehicle.

Oil-base paints are accepted as well as automotive fluids, cleaning solvents, pesticides, fertilizers, and pool chemicals. Products marked: danger, flammable, caution, caustic, and poison can be brought for safe disposal.

Alton is a member community. Get a pass from the Transfer Station and bring it with you to the collection (a 'dump sticker' is not the same). The Station has brochures with an expanded list of products and other information. Also offered are a cell phone collection program, free mailing envelopes to recycle ink jet cartridges, and a battery recycling program (cell phones, hearing aides, power tools, etc.)

From Wolfeboro Falls, bear left onto 109A. Turn right on Beach Pond Rd just after the cemetary. The facility is on the left. Look for 2 yellow signs at the entrance.


ALTON HAS A NEW ASSESSOR By Kathy Currier

Alton now has a full time Assessor. We welcome Tom Sargent, who comes to us from Laconia where he was the Assistant Assessor and Interim Assessor for ten years. Tom is a certified NH Assessor as well as a Designated Department of Revenue Appraiser Supervisor. He is a welcomed asset to our town.

Alton is scheduled for a certification by the Department of Revenue in 2005. The certification includes that all property must be as close to market value as possible. For tax year 2003, the town was at 67% of market value. Tom will be updating values in house for 2005. He will also be out in the town gathering data for this purpose and looking at sales from April 1, 2004 through June 1, 2005. Based on his findings your new assessed value will be reflected in the values as of April 1, 2005 and should affect your last bill for 2005.

We will try to give you monthly updates and information so you can better understand the Assessment process. Please feel free to contact Tom or Kathy to answer any of your questions or concerns. If you would like to set up an appointment, Tom would be more than happy to meet with you to review your property assessment, as it is his primary concern that the correct information is reflected in our records.



September is the month that winds down summer. To the outdoor person, September is the close of some of the fishing seasons. The 30th is the end of lake trout and landlocked salmon fishing. Alton is lucky though because Alton's section of the Merrymeeting River will still be open from October 1-31, from the lower dam on the Letter S Road to the Route 11 bridge at the Bay. It is catch and release, fly fishing only, with barbless hooks. Fishing in the river will rely on cool rains to raise the water level as these fish prepare to spawn in November. As the fishing seasons end this month, the hunting seasons begin.

September 1st opens the general Black Bear hunting season. The baiting season runs from Sept. 1-21. Black bears have been spotted all around Alton through out the summer. One was even seen roaming near the Back Bay area!

A new regulation allows the earlier hunting of gray squirrels starting September 1st in all WMU areas except A, B and C1. (northern counties). With a growing population of squirrels, the hunting season has been lenghtened a whole month. Hunting gray squirrels is a great way to introduce new hunters to the sport. It helps develop good hunting skills including game spotting, stalking, patience, and shooting skills. A 22 rifle is a challenging way to hunt these wary creatures, but remember be aware of the background and where that bullet will go if you miss. A 22 bullet can travel more than a mile if there are no trees to stop it. Squirrels can also be hunted successfully with a small gage shotgun, and is a safer alternative than a rifle for beginners. Wild game cookbooks offer many tasty squirrel dishes.

September 7-25 is the resident goose hunting season. This special season was open a few years ago as the population of resident geese was on the rise. The numbers are still rising and they are becoming nuisances in some places, so this year the limit has increased from 3 to 5 geese daily. All waterfowl regulations must be followed.

NH offers the longest archery deer/turkey season of any of the New England states. These 2 game animals are huntable with a bow from Sept.15 - Dec.15. This is a challenging form of hunting that will test your skills to the maximum.

September is a great month to be out in Alton's outdoors. The weather can still be warm, and with the summer we have had, we should be due for an "Indian Summer". Get out and enjoy before Old Man Winter arrives.

BELKNAP COUNTY COUNCIL OFFERS A SEMINAR TO PROMOTE PARENTS AS LEADERS IN SOCIETY (PALS) By Dick Wallace

PALS offers a unique learning opportunity for parents who want to make a difference on their community. The seminar will prepare parents to take an active leadership role in their neighborhoods and communities.

The PALS program is offered through the collaborative efforts of several civic organizations and is funded in part from the NH Children's Trust Fund. The PALS program is **offered at no cost** to participants whose application has been accepted and is being made available to parents from all communities in Belknap County.



If you are a resident of Alton and wish to vote in the September Primary on Tuesday, September 14, 2004, you must be registered. If your name is not on the voter registration list (posted with the Town Clerk, in Town Hall, at Alton Central School, and in the Alton Bay Post Office), see below.

The Way To Register

Go to the Town Clerk's Office during office hours up until Wednesday, September 8;

Drop by Town Hall Tuesday evening, September 7, from 7 - 7:30 p.m. when the Supervisors of the Checklist will be in session; or

Register at the primary.

To register you need a photo ID and two pieces of mail which shows your physical address.


If you register at the Town Clerk's Office on September 8, your name will NOT be on the checklist. You will have to see the supervisors at the polls on primary day to be certified.

To vote in the primary you must take a ballot of the party with which you are registered, Republican or Democrat. If you are registered as Undeclared, you step up to the table and state which party ballot you wish to vote. At that moment you become a member of that party. To revert to your Undeclared status, see the Supervisors of the Checklist AFTER you have voted and deposited your ballot in the box.

IF you did not change your status back to Undeclared after the Presidential Primary, you MUST vote as you are listed. The last day to change your status was June 1. It is your responsibility to fill out the form after voting. This is a state mandate, not an Alton supervisors' rule.

SO. WHERE WAS THAT BRIDGE?

The bridge shown in last months Main Street is the predecessor to the bridge that spans the Merrymeeting river at the base of Alton Bay. 
BLOOMING FUNDRAISER FOR CONSERVATION DISTRICT By Jan Hooper

Solomon's Castle

When you think of Florida, you envision warm sunshine, sandy beaches, orange juice and theme parks. What about castles? What about a castle in the heart of a central Florida swamp?

Solomon's Castle is in Ona, Florida, about 45 minutes from the Gulf Coast beaches, a two-hour drive from Tampa, two hours from Orlando, and three hours from Miami.

Howard Solomon is a self-educated sculptor who began building his castle in 1972. The structure is now three stories tall with 8,000 square feet. More than 80 stained glass windows depict a variety of subjects from nursery rhymes to philosophy and the entire exterior is "finished" with discarded printing press plates that give the castle its shiny aluminum look.


Howard and family members conduct tours of the castle and the grounds that are littered with whimsical sculpture among the tropical flowers and foliage. His sculpture is almost exclusively created from discarded treasures or someone else's "junk".

If anyone is interested in a really unique getaway, Solomon's Castle offers the Blue Room, a fully equipped efficiency apartment on the top floor of the east wing for only \$99 a night.

On our visit we especially enjoyed a delightful lunch served in a full-size replica of Spanish Galleon that sits in the moat surrounding the castle. The "Boat in the Moat" also serves meals in an adjacent outdoor garden under a huge Live Oak tree.

The castle is closed July, August and September but if you can't wait to see it, you can always buy it. Howard claims it has gotten too big for him and he's looking for an investor with \$2.5 million.



HISTORIC ALTON

Editors Note: Harry Bickford was a lifelong resident of New Durham. His farm was located in New Durham and Alton, and is currently owned by his grandson, Robert Bickford, Jr. Harry worked as a mailman for many years. He kept a farmers diary, detailing the goings-on of the farm and around the Town. Main Street has received permission from George Bickford, Harry's son, to publish excerpts of the diary. It is an interesting look at daily life on a farm. The diary was compiled by Elaine Bickford. September, 1940:

Sun. 1: Showry. We went up to the Bay to see the Mount come in, then George took us to Wolfeboro and around the Lake and when we got over to the Weirs the boat was just arriving.

Tues. 3: Fair. We cut bushes over by the Railroad. George and I went to Jones' store (*the hardware store on Monument Square* $\sim ed$.) and bought a bush scythe for \$2 and a snathe for \$1.85...seems like an exceedingly high price.

Wed. 4: Fair. George and I went to the Pittsfield Fair. Had a very good fair. Harold Cilley was there and drove his tractor on the track in the parade. The admission price was 50 cents and 25 cents for parking and 25 cents for the grandstand.

Tues. 17: Fair. There was a man here by the name of Hurd from Farmington looking after squashes. His game is to haul squashes to Boston and sell them at Faneuil Hall Market for a 10% commission.

Thur. 26: Cold and windy. Gathered in the squashes this PM. We have got bigger and better squashes than last year, lots of them weigh up to 50# and we have picked one that weighs 52#.

EARLY MIGRATORY GAME BIRD SEASONS SET From NH Fish and Game Department

Upcoming hunting season dates and bag limits for early season migratory game birds have been finalized by the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department. Changes this year include an increase in the daily bag limit for resident Canada geese from three to five birds a day during the September season, as well as changes in the season dates for both crows and sea ducks. No changes were made to woodcock and common snipe. The youth waterfowl weekend remains the last weekend in September (September 25 and 26, 2004).

Following are the early migratory game bird seasons and bag limits for 2004:

*RESIDENT CANADA GEESE: The bag limit has been increased to five birds per day during the September season, which extends from the day after Labor Day (September 7) through September 25, 2004. Previously the limit was three birds per day. New Hampshire's resident Canada goose population continues to grow and has a statewide distribution.

*CROWS: The fall 2004 crow-hunting season will begin two weeks earlier this year, running from August 15 to November 30, 2004. The spring crow-hunting season has been shortened to two weeks; next spring's crow season will be March 16-31, 2005.

*SEA DUCKS: October 1, 2004 - January 15, 2005; bag limit is 7 birds per day, with no more than 4 scoters, 4 eiders or 4 oldsquaw. The season was changed from the previous September 15 opening at the request of sportsmen who attended the public hearing.

*WOODCOCK: October 1 - October 30, 2004; bag limit is 3 birds per day. (Unchanged.)

*COMMON SNIPE: Sept. 15 - October 30, 2004; bag limit is 8 birds per day. (Unchanged.)



*YOUTH WATERFOWL WEEKEND: Last weekend in September (Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 25-26, 2004).

Hunters of all migratory game birds must have a 2004 New Hampshire hunting license and are required by law to register for the National Migratory Bird Harvest Information Program (HIP). In New Hampshire, this includes all who hunt waterfowl, snipe, woodcock and coots. Harvest information provided through this program is critical for the management of migratory game bird populations. Separate permits are needed in each state hunted. Licensed hunters should call 1-800-207-6183 to receive a permit number. Write this permit number on your license. Hunters also may register at <u>http://www.nhfishandgame.com</u>. There is no charge for an HIP permit.

Waterfowl hunters must also obtain a federal and a state duck stamp. Hunters are asked to report all banded birds using the toll-free phone number, 1-800-327-BAND. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will send a certificate with information about the bird.

As the guardian of the state's fish, wildlife and marine resources, the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department works in partnership with the public to conserve, manage and protect these resources and their habitats.
