ALTON OUTDOORS By Jack Miller

Happy New Year!

As January starts the new year, it also starts the new seasons for the outdoor person. Stream fishing opens the first of January, along with lake trout season. The general ice fishing season for all species starts this month at "ice in'—when (or if) the ice is safe. Safe ice for one person is 4" of black ice (no snow mixed in). Ice 8-10" thick is safe for snow machines or four wheelers. 12 " of black ice MAY be safe for vehicles, but NO ONE advocates driving cars and trucks on the ice. If you do, be aware, keep the seat belts off and the windows open for easy exit.

Ice fishing is a great way to get through the long winter months. It can be an enjoyable family outing as long as every one stays warm. If you fish the "warm water" lakes, you can use 5 tip-ups per person. Lake trout and salmon lakes are limited to 2 ice fishing devices per person. As always, be sure to check the regulations for the body of water you wish to fish.

Bait for ice fishing is usually some type of shiners, smelt, night crawlers, whole or cut-up sucker. Fish can also be caught by jigging small, shiny lures, spinners or jigs. A "bob house" or ice fishing shack can provide a warm shelter as you wait for fish to bite.

For the hunter, January first starts the night hunting season for coyotes. You need written landowner permission if you night hunt on private property. This is a different type of hunting where you call the coyote in and you become the "hunted". Other species that may be hunted this month include cottontail rabbit, snow shoe hare, fox, mink, muskrat and raccoon. Again, check the regulations before you go out hunting.

Hospice is a special kind of caring for people of all ages who are living with life-threatening illness. Becoming a Hospice volunteer requires 21-28 hours of this training. It includes discussion of death & dying, exploring spirituality, the role of the hospice staff, palliative care, interacting with the hospice family, and the art of listening. Hospice volunteers work with the CH&H Hospice team to provide care, comfort, and support to persons at the end of life and to their families and caregivers.

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
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AMERICAL LEGION FAMILY, POST 72 NEWS By Ray Nadeau

QUILTS DONATED TO ALTON POLICE By Bob Longabaugh

Last month an informal group of quilters presented the results of their labors to the Alton Police Department. One might wonder how quilts could be used in police work. The answer lies in a project originally conceived by the Ladies of the Lake Quilting Guild. Although -- thankfully -- it does not happen that often, there are times when the police are called to an accident site or dwelling fire where children are involved and the extra layer of warmth that a quilt provides can be put to extremely good use.

Each Alton police cruiser is now equipped with at least two quilts, thanks to the group of busy hands who meet at the Alton Central School every Monday evening. Quilters Shirley Lane and Shirley Bishop on December 6 formerly presented 12 quilts to Lieutenant Chuck Anderson and Corporal Ryan Heath who accepted them with thanks on behalf of the entire Alton police force. As the two Shirleys pointed out, these are utility -- not heirloom -- quilts because they are intended to be kept by the child benefiting from their comfort. As the quilts are depleted from the police cruisers, the group will be replacing them.

The 20-minute presentation ceremony was videotaped and shown later on local cable Channel 25. If you missed seeing it, a VHS copy can be borrowed from the Gilman Library.

With the renovations under way a major portion of the collection was appraised for the first time and plans were made to establish a cataloging system. When the work was complete the Museum re-opened in 2001 and a museum consultant was hired to catalog the entire collection and design exhibits that would engage the community. Their work gave life to a new vision for the Harold S. Gilman Museum.

December 4, 2004 was also Alton's Annual Light Up Night. Visitors to the Museum were treated to a display entitled "Windows on Christmas" and rooms decorated in their best Victorian finery that included a Victorian Christmas tree and popular tunes from the 1890's played on a Regina Music box. ALTON FIRE/RESCUE DEPARTMENT By Mary Jane Dascoli, Secretary

Calls for service for the month of November totaled 42. These calls included 24 Fire related, 18 Medical Emergencies of which 5 were motor vehicle crashes. Emergency calls remain significantly higher than last year at this same time. By now we hope to have had enough snow to cover the ground significantly allowing for outside burning without a written permit. All we ask is that residents call in to the Central Station at 875-0222 and if we are out on a call please leave your name, location of burn, and telephone number (cell phones especially) where you may be reached. If you do not have snow cover in your yard, call in anyway and we'll let you know the status on permits.

We remain very busy with home inspections, more specifically oil burners and wood stoves. If you recently had an oil burner installed or replaced, you **must** have it inspected by the Fire Chief to assure your safety. And remember, before the Building Inspector will issue you a certificate of occupancy, the oil burner must be inspected.

If you have not already done so, check out your chimney and have it cleaned if needed. This just might save you from having a chimney fire that then spreads into your walls.

We're reminding residents again this month to be sure and display your new 911 number(s) in accordance with the Town Ordinance and avoid any violation penalty fees. If you occupy rental property and your E-911 numbers are still not posted, please notify your landlord first, and then call the Fire Department. We will work with you and your landlord to see that this situation is rectified for your safety.

The New Hampshire State Fire Code relating to smoke detector installation and operation in multi-unit dwellings has changed. Any rental property must contain working hard wired, 110 volt smoke detectors; any battery operated fire warning devices installed in multi-unit dwellings shall be replaced by automatic fire warning devices that are powered by the house electrical service. If you require addi-

tional information or if you are in need of a copy of these changes please call us.

We'd like to wish everyone a safe and healthy New Year and to thank all those that helped support our Christmas Tree fundraiser again this year. Thank you to Aubuchon Hardware (Formerly Alton 5 & 10) for allowing us space to continue to sell our Christmas trees. Don't forget to keep your Christmas tree well watered if you have a fresh tree. If you leave your home be sure and unplug your tree lights as it doesn't take much to ignite a dry fresh tree.

The first phase was the Boot Drive held on Main Street Saturday, November 27th which raised approximately \$1,400. Our thanks go out to everyone that stopped to donate. Sharon Hannafin presenting the check to Chris Ialuna of WLNH. Perhaps some of you were watching or even bidding on some of the wonderful items. 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

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FROM THE TOWN PLANNER By Kathy Menici

The Planner's column has been missing from Main Street since mid-summer. It was at that point that the former Town Planner, Peer Kraft-Lund, left for the first of his long-planned hiking adventures and I came on board as the Town's full-time planner. The last few months have been exciting as I renew old friendships and acquaintances. But it has also been a little overwhelming. No longer the sleepy little town of my childhood, adolescence and young adulthood; Alton has become a booming community that is growing in leaps and bounds.

2004 has been an amazingly busy year for the Planning Board. The first question everyone asks me: What's going on with the new supermarket? It is happening. At its October 2004 meeting, the Planning Board granted conditional approval to Bahre Alton Properties to construct a Hannaford's Supermarket on Route 28 just north of the traffic circle. State approvals for the supermarket are in process, but should be completed soon. Then construction can begin.

In addition to the new supermarket, there was also a new carwash approved this year, two new banks (one of which will be located adjacent to the supermarket), a new Catholic church, expansions of existing businesses, a new business or two, and residential subdivisions with anywhere from 2 to 19 new house lots. Alton is growing, there is no doubt about that.

During 2004, the Planning Board reviewed a total of 63 applications, compared to 41 applications in 2003. Eleven of those applications were for residential subdivisions and will create 87 new house lots in town. In 2003, the Planning Board received 13 subdivision applications that created 32 new house lots. While neighboring communities issued an average of 47 building permits for new homes in 2003, Alton issued 100. The Town's Building Inspector expects building permits for new homes to reach 100 again in 2004.

Because of all the new growth that is taking place, the Planning Board has decided that the Board must make time to review and revise its regulations, the Zoning Ordinance and Master Plan, so that the Town can better address growth that is being experienced in the community. Much of the new development that is occurring in town is taking place in wetlands areas or on steep slopes. The Town's regulations do not adequately address development in those types of areas. Nor do the Town's regulations address the type of commercial development that brings us a new supermarket or carwash or new banks. And this is why it can take so long for an application to get approved.

To allow itself the time to review and revise the Town's Master Plan, Zoning Ordinance and other land use regulations, the Planning Board has proposed in Interim Growth Management Ordinance, or an IGMO. The IGMO has been written to allow for the continuation of smaller scale,

lower impact types of residential and commercial development. While the IGMO is in place, the Planning Board with the help of citizen volunteers will review the Town's Master Plan, Zoning Regulations and land use regulations with the goal of revising these documents so they will be a better guide to both the Planning Board and landowners who want to develop their properties.

The Planning Board will hold its first Public Hearing on the IGMO on Tuesday, January 11, at 7pm at Town Hall. In case of snow, the Public Hearing will be held on Wednesday, January 12, at 7pm at Town Hall. Please plan to attend to learn more about the IGMO and how you can volunteer to help shape our community's future.

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
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HISTORIC ALTON

Editors Note: Harry Bickford was a lifelong resident of New Durham. His farm was located in New Durham and Alton, and is currently owned by his grandson, Robert Bickford, Jr. Harry worked as a mailman for many years. He kept a farmers diary, detailing the goings-on of the farm and around the Town. Main Street has received permission from George Bickford, Harry's son, to publish excerpts of the diary. It is an interesting look at daily life on a farm. The diary was compiled by Elaine Bickford.

January, 1940

Mon. 1: A nice winter day. Temperature zero this morning. Worked at the lower barn in the PM.

Thur. 4: Cold. We helped clean the ice off in PM. Willis and Albert cut 78 cakes in PM. We went to Merrymeeting to see George Lambertson about borrowing his ice tongs and pick. Ice about 13" thick and fine quality.

Fri. 5: Fair. Finished cutting ice. 320 cakes, 5 layers, 64 cakes in a layer. Last load left the pond at 2:30. Nelson and George packed it in the ice house. Paid Willis Corson \$9.20 for cutting ice. Paid Nelson \$3.00 for labor.

Sat. 6: Snowed about 2" last night. Had good luck getting around (the mail route). Wind blew hard. Jim's car skidded and turned over. Damaged it very bad but he escaped injury. Sun. 14: Cloudy and snowy. Went to Alton Bay in the PM to see the tractor races. George broke his transmission so he as unable to participate in the races. Nelson also had hard luck with his tractor. He got water on his wires but he got one dollar for his gasoline. Tracy Laney won seven dollars.

Mon. 15: Rainy. Hard traveling today. Got back 12:45. Nellie and I went to Farmington this PM.

Tues. 16: Cold. Had good luck today. Got back at 11:15. Went over in the woods this PM with Mr. Allen and marked

out a line of trees where he is to cut the lumber. The boys have gone to Farmington tonight to see Alton play Farmington. Fri. 19: Fair and cold. Pat and I cut wood in the afternoon. The boys and Nelson went to the Basketball game in Alton. Sun. 21: Fair and cold. Went to Alton Bay in the afternoon to attend tractor races. Very good attendance. Nelson was second in one race, also was first in the reverse race.

Mon. 22: Fair and cold.Pat and I cut wood in the afternoon. Killed 6 hens for the supper Thursday night.

Tues. 23: Fair and cold. Killed 5 hens in the evening for the Parent Teachers' supper Thursday night.

Wed. 24: Fair and cold. 18th Wedding Anniversary. We celebrated by attending the pictures and having ice cream.

Fri. 26: Fair and cold. The supper was a huge success. Everything passed off OK but they forgot to serve the biscuits. Sun. 28: Fair and cold. The boys and I bagged up about 50

Sun. 28: Fair and cold. The boys and I bagged up about 30 bags of dry shavings this morning down to the mill. Went to the tractor races in the Bay. After the races we went to Wolfeboro on the ice. Had a nice ride on the ice. Had 2 ice cream cones apiece in Wolfeboro. The boys, Nelson and George W. went to the pictures at Farmington in the evening.

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DON'T GET YOURSELF ON THIN ICE From NH Fish and Game

Recent storms may have transformed parts of New Hampshire's landscape from fall to winter overnight, but that doesn't mean it's safe to venture onto ice-covered waters just yet. The New Hampshire Fish and Game Department warns that thin ice conditions currently prevail statewide. While early snowstorms have left most of New Hampshire's small ponds and the coves of larger lakes covered with an inviting layer of snow, in most cases that snow is covering a THIN layer of ice — much too thin to support a person's weight. In fact, the presence of snow may actually slow the formation of thicker ice, because it has an insulating effect.

How can you tell if ice is safe? Always consider ice potentially dangerous, but the best way to assess safety is to use an ice chisel to chop a hole in the ice to determine its thickness. Make sure you do this as you venture further out on to the ice, because the thickness of the ice will not be uniform all over the pond or lake. Information from the Cold Region Research Laboratory in Hanover shows that as a "rule of thumb" there should be a minimum of six inches of hard ice before individual foot travel. There should be eight to ten inches of hard ice before snow machine or ATV travel.

"It is critical to NEVER allow children to go out on the ice by themselves," said Maj. Tim Acerno of Fish and Game Law Enforcement. "And you should never let children venture onto the ice on rivers and streams, because the current makes the ice so unpredictable."

There are always areas of danger on ponds and lakes as well, according to Acerno, because in areas where there is current, such as inlets, outlets and spring holes, the ice will be dangerously thin. If an object such as a rock is imbedded in the ice, the ice will be thinner around the rock because it absorbs the sun's warmth. Other areas for caution are around bridges, docks and between islands. Wind and wave action on bigger lakes can break ice up.

"Snowmobile enthusiasts should be especially careful to keep ice safety in mind," Acerno said. "The unofficial opening of the snowmobile season is coming up December 15, when many large landowners begin to open their land for snowmobiling. Riders should remember to check local conditions before heading out on snowmobile trails or on the ice. Don't assume a trail is safe just because it's there!"
