March 7 is the last day for the Town Clerk to accept absentee ballots filed in person. Ballots may be filed until 5pm.

March 8 is Town Election Day. Voting will take place at Prospect Mountain High School from 7am to 7pm. A list of candidates for the School elections is listed below, along with a copy of the Ballot for the Town Elections.

Town Meeting takes place March 9th, beginning at 7pm in the auditorium at the Prospect Mountain High School.

March 11 is the last day to request a recount of votes cast at Town Election.

ARTICLES

Article 2: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Interim Growth Management Ordinance (IGMO) proposed by the Alton Planning Board? The proposed IGMO shall be in effect until December 31, 2005. The IGMO limits the Planning Board's review to the following classes of applications: 1) subdivisions of three lots or less with no internal roads; 2) commercial site plans for existing commercial uses that want to expand or change use; and 3) new commercial uses with minimal impact to wetlands and no impact to steep slopes and aquifer protection zones. There is no limitation on the issuance of building permits for lots of record during the effective dates of the ordinance.

The purpose of the ordinance is to allow the Planning Board to address rapid growth in the town by reviewing and updating the Master Plan, Zoning Ordinance, Subdivision Regulations and to allow the Planning Board to prepare a schedule of development impact fees. (Recommended by the Planning Board. Majority vote required.) Yes/No

Article 3: Are you in favor of amending the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Alton Planning Board. This amendment merely clarifies the existing setback requirements by simplifying confusing language. (Recommended by the Planning Board. Majority vote required.). Yes/No

Article 4: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 (known as SB2) to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town of Alton on the second Tuesday of March? (Submitted by Petition.) (a 3/5 majority is required) Yes/No

March is a "get ready" month for the outdoor person. This is the month you should get ready for the upcoming seasons, especially the salmon season, which begins April 1.

One can still get some ice fishing in this month, but be very careful. Ice thickness in a lot of places, has not gone much over 12-14 inches thick as of mid February. Warm rains this month can change the ice conditions quickly. Maybe we will have an early ice out?? Don't forget that all bob houses must be removed from not only the ice, but from public and private property as well, before April 1.

As the day light gets longer and days get warmer, the outdoor person will be dreaming of open water. As the winter's ice recedes and the waters warm up, salmon, lake trout and rainbow trout will move into the shallows to feed on the smelt. Smelt come into the shallows to lay their eggs, and the cold water fish will be right behind them. Any method of fishing will catch these fish next month, so this month is the time to get your gear ready. You want to be ready to fish the first open water, not be getting things prepared while others are catching the fish.

To catch fish, you have to be able to hook them. To do this, you must have sharp hooks. One of the preparations I do this month, is to sharpen the hooks on all the flies and lures I will be using next month. All new flies I tie are on a newly sharpened hook. I make mine sharp enough so when I drag it across my finger nail, it digs in or catches. One of the best sharpeners I have found is the EZE-LAP diamond sharpener. It is the size of an ink pen and has a groove for fish hooks, a flat side for flat edged knifes and a curved section for serrated knife blades. For under \$5.00, I keep several around. One is always in my fly tying bench, my fly fishing vest, tackle box and the kitchen knife drawer. Sharp hooks catch fish and sharp knifes fillet them.

Get ready now for the seasons to come. See you out there.



APPALACHIAN MOUNTAIN TEEN PROJECT PRESENTS PROGRAM AT ACS By Purr Whalley

Later this month, the Appalachian Mountain Teen Project will increase its presence in the Alton Central School with a new program focusing on social and character education for 7th and 8th graders.

Is is often the case that residents who don't have children in the school system seldom know about or appreciate the many programs available to the students in Alton. Let me tell you how and what I have learned about the wonderful program known as the Appalachian Mountain Teen Project.

I spoke with Donna San Antonio, co-director of the AMTP, which is based in Wolfeboro. Donna, the author of a book released in May titled Adolescent Lives in Transition: How Social Class Influences the Adjustment to Middle School, has been involved with education for three decades. She explained the mission and the history of the AMTP.

The Appalachian Mountain Teen Project (it has no affiliation with the Appalachian Mountain Club) started as a summer program with outdoor activities in 1984 and by 1987 had become a year round project. The focus of AMTP is to help students struggling emotionally, academically and socially through one on one mentoring after school activities and adventure training. Their goal is to help young students with school issues and with relationships with their peers. Such students are referred to AMTP by their teachers, parents and counselors and are often students who have seen tragedy or have experienced a personal loss. Sometimes these children may have health issues which make it hard to fit in with their peers. The AMTP mission is to work closely with these referred students to provide emotional and academic support on a weekly basis and while keeping in contact with their parents, teachers and guidance counselors.

The AMTP has had a presence in the Alton Central School since 1988 with a focus on health education, alternative education and individual support of students. Later this school year, the program will widen its focus in Alton to implement a character education program in the middle grades. By working in small discussion groups, the program will eventually reach all 7th and 8th grade students by addressing a range of issues pertinent to the life of a middle school student.

The Appalachia Mountain Teen Project is funded through local donations and grants and works in collaboration with other groups with a common focus on children's mental health and well being. As a resident of Alton, I am pleased to know we have a group of this caliber working with our middle school students.

Think back to your life as a 7th or 8th grade student. Those were pretty awkward years for most of us. The AMTP is there to make the lives of our local children that much easier! For more information on the Appalachian Mountain Teen Project, you may call 569-5510.

HISTORIC ALTON

Editors Note: Harry Bickford was a lifelong resident of New Durham. His farm was located in New Durham and Alton, and is currently owned by his grandson, Robert Bickford, Jr. Harry worked as a mailman for many years. He kept a farmers diary, detailing the goings-on of the farm and around the Town. Main Street has received permission from George Bickford, Harry's son, to publish excerpts of the diary. It is an interesting look at daily life on a farm. The diary was compiled by Elaine Bickford. March, 1940

Sat. 2: A lovely day. Boys hauled 3 loads of wood across the pond in the AM and George and I hauled 3 loads across in the PM. One load of this was 4 1/2 ft. long and went in the other pile. Boys have gone to the pictures in Farmington tonight. The Sportsman's Show is also going on down there but they are not interest.

Sun. 3: Fair and quite warm. The boys finished the snow plow today and it works very satisfactory considering the heavy snow that they plowed.

Mon. 4: Cloudy. Pat and I hauled 4 loads of wood across the pond this PM. The boys and Nelson took the Model T motor down to Nelson's tonight. He is going to overhaul it and make a sawing machine to saw 13 cords of slabs for Nelson and for us to saw our wood with.

Tues. 5: Snowed about 8" last night. Went to Birch Hill, New Durham Corner, Bill Flint's and Grover Miller's in the AM. Had dinner, then Nellie and I started for the South. Nellie snow shoed down to Alma's and Charlie Chamberlain's and I snow shoed to Gray's, Page's and Fowle's. We then came back to the Ridge where the road had not been broken and went down across the Ridge and had very good luck.

Sat. 9: Fair. The boys hauled 4 loads of wood that we had yarded at the shore of the pond and Reilley and I hauled 9 loads across in the PM which cleaned up all we had yarded at the shore of the pond and made 6 1/2 cords of wood that we piled in the barn yard yesterday.

Sun. 10: Fair and cold. Went to Alton Bay in the PM to see the tractor races. There were 30 tractors there. This was the championship meet of New England. There were a number of tractors from East Jaffrey, NH. There was a mob of people there yesterday. They ran out of hot dogs in the station. There was a trailer on the lake selling Gordon's Fried Clams, 20 cents a half pint, 35 cents a pint. Harry Nutter was first in one race and Raymond Grenier second.

Mon. 11: Fair, windy and cold. Mr. Huckins of Merrill's Corner was here today in the interest of the soil conservation program and said I was entitled to 6 bags of fertilizer and 2.6 tons of lime. 52 bags at a cost of \$1.50 for lime and \$1.14 for fertilizer. Used 200# of fertilizer to the acre.

Tues. 12: Fair and cold. The boys and I hauled 5 loads of wood across the pond in the PM. Town Meeting today. The most exciting thing was the Town voting to refuse letting the Town Hall for dances. George set the incubator tonight, 375 eggs.

Tues. 19: Snowy in the morning. Got bothered this AM on Dealand's corner, had to put on chains. Pat and I went over in the woods and shoveled a path up to the logs and hauled out three logs to the shore of the pond. Mr. Mifflin, the insurance adjustor for my insurance company was here tonight and gave me a check for \$28.25 for damages done to my car in an accident with Emerson of Farmington Dec. 1939.

Wed. 20: Fair. Pat and I worked in the woods this PM getting out logs. George came over after school and helped us get out a load.

Thur. 21: Had a snow squall last night that handed us about 3" of snow. It drifted quite badly on the Ridge and on the Chamberlin Road. Pat and I worked on logs across the pond this PM.

Fri. 22: Snowed and blowed hard. Snowed in the PM. The boys and girls went to Farmington to the movies in the evening. Sat. 23: The roughest day of the winter. The snow blew a gale all day. I made Birch Hill, New Durham Corner, Flint's and Joe Berry's. The tractor was on the Ridge and it was blowing in as fast as they could plow it out. Nellie, George and I went to Rochester this PM to get a set of cross chains for the car. Went to Wyman's and had a thermostat put on the engine. The other one went fluey so that we could not get any heat from the heater. The boys went to the library in Alton tonight.

Sun. 24: Easter Sunday. Cold and windy. At home all day. Nothing exciting happened. Nellie, George and Robert went down to the Easter Play at the Town Hall this evening. It seemed more like Christmas today then like Easter, it was so cold.

Sat. 30: Rainy. George and Pat shoveled a path down to the brooder house. The boys and Betty went to Farmington to the movies in the evening.

Sun. 31: Fair & warm. We took the Holtzbergers up to the ski jump in the PM, then went to Laconia and over to the Weirs, then down along the lake home.

March has been a very tough month - cold and stormy.

Our next meeting is Sun March 6th at 6pm in the basement of the Gilman Library. Please feel free to join us.


CAN YOU IDENTIFY THIS BUILDING?
