NEWS FROM THE TOWN PLANNER - YOUR INPUT NEEDED! By Kathy Menici

The town elections and Town Meeting brought many changes to planning in Alton. The Planning Board gained three new members. Cynthia Balcius was re-elected for a three-year term; Bruce Holmes was elected for a three-year term; Jeanne Crouse was elected for a two-year term and Jeremy Dube was elected for a one-year.

The voters of the town also voted to adopt the Interim Growth Management Ordinance that was proposed by the Planning Board in December 2004. With the IGMO in place, the Planning Board is now turning their attention to the revision of the town's Master Plan.

One of the first steps in the Planning Board's revision of the town's Master Plan is the Community Survey that is included in the center of Main Street. The survey allows you an opportunity to inform the members of the Planning Board about issues of interest and concern to you. The results of the survey will be used to identify issues for discussion throughout the coming months during work sessions and Citizen Planning Forums. The input that the Planning Board receives from the residents of the community will be used to formulate a plan to effectively manage the future development in our community. If there are members of your family or household who have different opinions, you can request additional copies of the survey from the Planning Department by calling 875-2162.

When you complete your survey, you can either drop it off at Town Hall or you may mail it to Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC). LRPC is assisting the Planning Board in tabulating and analyzing the responses to the survey. If you choose to mail your survey to LRPC, please be sure to tape your survey closed (a single piece of tape at the bottom of the survey should be enough). You will also want to be sure to put the appropriate postage on the right-hand corner above the LRPC mailing address. We will report the results of the survey in a future issue of Main Street.

In addition to the survey, the Planning Board will schedule a number of work sessions and Citizen Planning Forums. As the Planning Board goes through this process, work sessions will be scheduled for discussion of specific topics – such as roads, recreational facilities, natural resources – while the planning forums will be more general in nature. There will be the opportunity for public input at all of these meetings. All residents of town are encouraged to attend any or all of these sessions or forums. On Wednesday, April 13, the Planning Board will host another Citizens Planning Forum. The forum will be at Town Hall beginning at 7pm. There will also be a Master Plan work session beginning at 6pm on Tuesday, April 26. The citizen Master Plan committees will make their first reports to the Planning Board at this session.

Lastly, if you are interested in volunteering for one of the citizen Master Plan committees, there is still plenty of time. Committees have been formed to develop specific goals and objectives for the Master Plan. These committees include: Land Use, Transportation and Population; Community Facilities and Recreation; Cultural and Historic Resources and Community Design; Economic Development, Housing and Public Utilities; and Natural Resources and Natural Hazards.

ALTON RESIDENT TO THROW FIRST PITCH AT FENWAY By R. Trevlac

The Boston Red Sox announced today that life-long Alton resident Mrs. A. Phule, widow of the late Ernest Phule, will throw out the first pitch at Fenway Park on opening day, April 11, 2005. The honor was bestowed on Phule in memory of her late husband who is now a cult figure among Red Sox "Curse of the Bambino" fans.

The late Ernest Phule was born May 1, 1920, the day that Babe Ruth, AKA the Bambino, hit his first home run as a New York Yankee (and against the Boston Red Sox). Mr. Phule died on October 27, 2004, just hours before game four of the 2004 World Series in St. Louis, thus leading many local fans to believe that Phule's life was connected to the infamous curse. The last time the Red Sox won the World Series was in 1918 when Ruth was with the club.

The Widow Phule said, "Ernest loved the Red Sox as we all do, but I now believe the curse lived and died in him. I never thought much about the curse and Ernest until he died. I still can't speak of it. I get goosebumps just thinking about it."

Phule reported that the Red Sox approached her about throwing out the first pitch this past winter and she readily accepted the offer. "Heavens yes! Who wouldn't?" Phule exclaimed. "I'm trying to get a date with Johnny Damon thrown in, but they haven't confirmed that. I miss Ernest, but he was no Johnny!"

Turning appropriately somber, the Widow Phule confirmed that her late husband's remains had been donated to the Red Sox. "Ernest's ashes belong to Boston," she said solemnly.

There have been reports that the Red Sox would secretly scatter Phule's ashes in Yankee Stadium April 3, 2005, at the Yankee's home opener against Boston. Red Sox officials denied the charge, but the Widow Phule wouldn't object. "Ernest never really liked New York City, but he believed in the Red Sox. If they want to scatter him in Yankee Stadium, I know Ernest would accept that." Phule added, "I plan to watch the game on TV and I sure hope I get to see him dumped in the Yankee's dugout, but I'll be satisfied if they put him out by those memorials!" Yankee officials had no comment.

Mrs. Phule is looking forward to commemorating her late husband by throwing out the first pitch at Fenway, but is concerned about transportation to Boston. "I don't drive," she explains. "Ernest never let me get behind the wheel again after...um, that incident back in '43." Anyone willing to provide Mrs. Phule with transportation to and from Boston should call 875-2151. Unfortunately, the game is already sold out, so no ticket is included; however, Mrs. Phule has kindly offered to provide her driver with a transistor radio, and promises to save some peanuts for the ride home.

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
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HOSPICE VOLUNTEER TRAINING TO BE HELD By Betty John

April is the month of the salmon, my favorite month. The open water fishing season starts April 1 for landlocked salmon and lake trout. Did you read "open water"? How much fishing we get to do depends on Mother Nature and Old Man Winter. As of now, (mid-March) the Old Man is winning. Cars and trucks are still driving on Alton Bay's ice cover! Mother Nature will win eventually, but when?

I started a log book in 1980 of my fishing adventures. I record weather, water conditions, depth fished, flies used, and our successes. It's a book I refer to quite often. Thought you might enjoy reading my notes about the amount of "open water" on opening day for the last few years. 2004: Ice out to middle of beach (Alton's sandy beach in the bay), 36 degrees, no salmon. First fish caught (by me) April 7th. 2003: Ice out to end of beach on the right side only, all other edges iced in. April 2, 32 degrees, 5 inches of snow, school canceled. First salmon April 14th. 2002: Heavy rain and wind have broken ice into big, shifting sheets. Whole bay blocked by ice jam at Echo Point. Fished Black Point in canoe and caught a 19" and 20" salmon in am. Cindy caught 22" in the pm. Saw a double rainbow and watched black clouds pouring rain crossing over Winni. 2001: 36" of snow on the ground. No one can fish anywhere, including the bay bridge. First salmon caught April 19th. 2000: Big chunks of ice floating around the bay. Fished for first time from a float tube at Beaver Brook inlet. FROZE. A 20" salmon. 1999: Ice out to band stand. More open water in Wolfeboro. 2 salmon on April 2nd.

So far, this year is looking fairly average! Mid April usually seems to be the best open water, so you still have some time to get ready. My flies are ready, now I just have to clean my rods and reels and dig out the canoe. Where ever there is troll-able water, I'll be there.

FROM THE ASSESSOR'S OFFICE By Tom Sargent

This is the last of the three articles on the different approaches to property valuation. This month we will focus on the cost approach.

The cost approach is based on a comparison between the cost to develop a property and the value of the existing property on a similarly developed property. The cost approach usually works best for newer improvements, because construction costs are easier to estimate and there is less depreciation. This approach is especially useful for appraisal of properties for which sales and invome data are scarce. Such data are often difficult to obtain for special purpose properties.

Backyard Compost Bin Sale in Honor of Earth Day

The Parks and Recreation Department is sponsoring a Backvard Compost Bin Sale in celebration of Earth Day 2005. In an effort to reduce household leftovers from preparing food in your kitchen from being thrown away, the Alton Parks and Recreation Department has joined a statewide effort to recycle the table scraps into rich, soil amendment. It is estimated that 25% of the average household's waste consists of yard trimmings and kitchen scraps which can easily be composted. Think of the space and money that would save in filling the landfills and reducing trash disposal costs. Through May 7, a home compost bin and how-toguide with a combined retail value of \$80 can be purchased for \$35. The bin is black, has a ten-year warranty, and is made of recycled plastic. It is approximately 33" high and 33" wide, or large enough for a family of five. New this year to help collect the kitchen material is the Kitchen Waste Pail which is \$10.00, it has a hinged lid which snaps securely to the pail and comes with a mount to hang on the inside of a cabinet door, it is white and beige with a 7.5 liter capacity. The pail width easily accommodates the shape of plates for "mess free" scrapings. Look for order forms at the Parks and Recreation Department, Town Hall, Gilman Library and Alton Home and Lumber Center. CONSERVATION INNOVATION GRANTS AVAILABLE IN NEW HAMPSHIRE By Jan Hooper

Tessa Chadwick, State Conservationist for the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has announced New Hampshire is making \$213,000 available for Conservation Innovation Grants (CIG). The deadline for proposals is April 11, 2005.

This is a grant competition for farmers, State or local governments or non-governmental organizations and others who have innovative ideas for addressing some of New Hampshire's most pressing natural resource conservation needs. Projects may be from one to three years in length.

"These grants offer an opportunity to promote innovative technologies and approaches to environmental solutions on working agricultural lands," said Chadwick. Grants will fund projects targeting innovative on-the-ground conservation, including pilot projects and field demonstrations.

Applications should demonstrate the use of innovative technologies or approaches to address at least one of the five natural resource concerns identified by NRCS in New Hampshire: soil, water, air, plants, and wildlife.

A request for proposals (RFP) has been posted at www.nh.nrcs.usda.gov/ programs/cig.html. Selected applicants may receive grants up to 50 percent of the total project cost. The federal CIG contribution for any individual grant may not exceed \$75,000 for a project.

The 2002 Farm Bill established these grants as part of the Environmental Quality Incentives Program, the first national grants were awarded in 2004. This year, New Hampshire along with 12 other states, will offer a statewide grant competition.





ALTON FIRE/RESCUE DEPARTMENT By Mary Jane Dascoli, Secretary

Calls for service for the months of January and February are as follows: January totaled 50 which included 14 Fire related, 35 Medical Emergencies of which 9 were motor vehicle crashes, plus 1 service call. February totaled 62 which included 26 Fire related, 32 Medical Emergencies of which 6 were motor vehicle crashes and 3 were crashes involving snowmobiles, plus 4 service calls. Emergency calls for service remain significantly higher than last year at this time; January incidents increased by 12 and February incidents increased by 14.

Two members of the Ambulance Truck Committee (EMS Lieutenant Sharon Hannafin and EMT Mary Jane Dascoli) accompanied by Fire Chief Al Johnson traveled to sunny Florida in early February to do the mid-build inspection on Alton's new ambulance being built by American LaFrance of Southern New England. Some additional modifications were made during this inspection that will allow our emergency medical responders to better prepare and handle each ALS emergency. The final inspection was conducted March 10th and 11th by Chief Johnson, Deputy Chief Richard Brown and EMS Lt. Hannafin – Alton's new Ambulance is due to arrive in early April.

If you are interested in burning a brush pile, please call the Central Station at 875-0222 and if we are out on a call please leave your name, location of burn, and telephone number (cell phones especially) where you may be reached. With the ground still covered in snow, permits are not yet required.

The Business Office at the Central Fire Station is open Mon.-Fri. from 8:30am–4:30pm. Call or stop in with any questions or concerns you may have; our door is always open.

The Club has been talking to Michael Green of the New England Revolution Soccer team of the Major League


Soccer (MLS) with a view to attending the REVS home games. The New England Revolution start their home game schedule on April 9 with a visit from the Columbus Crew.

HISTORIC ALTON

Editors Note: Harry Bickford was a lifelong resident of New Durham. His farm was located in New Durham and Alton, and is currently owned by his grandson, Robert Bickford, Jr. Harry worked as a mailman for many years. He kept a farmers diary, detailing the goings-on of the farm and around the Town. Main Street has received permission from George Bickford, Harry's son, to publish excerpts of the diary. It is an interesting look at daily life on a farm. The diary was compiled by Elaine Bickford.

Mon. 1: Fair & cooler. We heard this evening that Mr. Smith was going to take the census of this town, much to the sorrow of everyone who has heard about it. George and Nelson are working on the sawing machine tonight.

Tues. 2: Fair. Pat and I went across the pond this PM and broke a road out towards Jenkins Factory then around the pond. The snow was 4 ft in some places. I had to go in front of the horse and tread the snow down so that the horse could get through. I was soaking wet when I got around to the main path. We came home across the pond and picked up the wood Robert had cut on the island and brought that home.

Wed. 3: Fair. Went up to Alton after I got through at the office to see Ansel Emerson, who was shoeing a horse at Elliott's. He came down in the PM and shod Betty and Duchess. Paid him \$3.50. Took 280 chickens out of the incubator this PM.

Thur. 4: Rainy. Got back in time to after the boys. 'Census Enumerator' Mr. Smith called this PM and took our pedigree.

Sat. 6: Fair & windy. Louie, Ernestine, Nellie, Robert and I went to Dover this PM. Robert and I purchased new suits at \$20 each, also a new felt hat and whip cord jacket #42 and two shirts. Jacket cost \$4. The wind terrific this evening. Blew.

Sun. 7: Fair. Around home all day. We got a good view of the eclipse of the sun this PM. The boys and Nelson went to the pictures in Farmington.

Mon. 8: Cloudy. Began to snow after I got home from the mail. Helped Louie shingle on Louie's house over the ell. Walter Thurston called up about 5 o'clock saying that the horse was sick and for me to come up right away. Robert and I went up and found her much better than we expected. Gave her a dose of Raleigh liniment and came home.

Tues. 9: Showry. Rained hard all night and showry this AM. The horse was all right this AM.

Sun. 14: Fair. We went cow hunting this PM. Took Leon Dore with us. We bought a good looking heifer that calved Saturday. Gave \$70 without the calf. Got back home 4:15.

Wed. 17: Cloudy. Had to take a special delivery letter up to Lafayette today and got stuck in the mud coming back. Got Erwin Brackett to help me get out. Lost an hour. Burnt the field this PM, had very good luck. Nellie took George Laney and Robert down to Farmington tonight to the pictures. Hear frogs peeping tonight.

Sun. 21: Snowy. A very disagreeable day, snow and sleet. At home all day. Had a nap in the PM. The boys went to the pictures in Farmington tonight.

Mon. 22: Snowy. George went with me today, found the roads drifted and had to shovel on the Ridge to get through. The Chamberlin Road was drifted badly. Nellie went to Alton tonight to hear the 'New Hampshire University Glee Club' under the auspices of 'The Women's Club'. I bought a sledge hammer handle down to Voyer's for 50 cents.

Tues. 23: Cloudy. Nellie and Robert went to Rochester this afternoon. Nellie had her hair cut and waved. She also got a black straw hat \$2.98. George worked on a beehive this PM. I showed George how to rope the heifer tonight so she could not kick.

Sun. 28: A lovely day. At home all day. We went over in the field and pulled out some rocks with the tractor, had excellent luck. The boys and Nelson have gone to the pictures in Farmington tonight. Mr. M came up and paid his milk bill and made us a visit out in the yard which kept me from eating with the rest of the family on time. Set the incubator this morning again for George (383 eggs I think).

Mon. 29 Å lovely day. Pat and George Lambertson blew rocks on the squash piece. Nellie got 24 blasting caps @ 3 cents apiece and 50 ft of fuse @ .01 ° cents a foot. I got 3# of dynamite @ .50 cents a pound at Jones' store.

Tues. 30: fine day, warmer. Worked on the rocks. Mel Drew was dragging the Alton Road. I took the tractor over in the field this PM and pulled out some rocks that we didn't have to blast.


