#### **CAMPGROUND BOARDING HOUSE, 1906**

The postcard below is from the collection of Mr. Richard Jones of Wolfeboro. It is postmarked 1906. The card is labelled 'Campground Boarding House, Alton Bay, N.H.'The note reads 'Dear Dottie - This is where we buy some of our dinners. We come three miles on a boat to get it.'

The campground referred to is currently the location of the Alton Bay Christian Conference Center. Nearly half of the original buildings were destroyed in a fire in 1945. The Alton Bay Campmeeting Association celebrated its' 140th anniversary in 2003.

#### LRHHPF HAZ WASTE SEASON BEGINS By Sarah Silk

Spring has finally arrived and with it the opportunity to dispose of your household hazardous waste. The 3rd Saturday of the month from May thru October at 8:30am-noon, you may bring your common household hazardous waste products to the Lakes Region Household Hazardous Product Facility at 404 Beach Pond Road, Wolfeboro.

Alton is a member community. To attend, please pick up a PASS at the local Solid Waste Center. The passes are free to residents of Alton. Bring the pass with you to the hazardous waste facility. For speedy drop-off, place products in their original containers in a sturdy cardboard box in your trunk. You will be asked to participate in a brief survey to help us improve our collection effort. A comprehensive list of eligible items is in the brochure available at the Solid Waste Center (latex paint is not a hazardous waste). We also collect NiCad batteries and cell phones for recycling, and offer free mailing envelopes for printer cartridge recycling.

Participation in 2003 was 97 households, there was an increase to 140 in 2004 from the town of Alton (for reference, Wolfeboro increased from 231 to 308 in 2004). You may want to attend May to August as attendance is higher the last 2 months.

Take Rt 28 to Wolfeboro, turn right on Center St, then bear left onto Rt 109A. Turn right onto Beach Pond Rd. The facility has 2 bright yellow signs at the entrance from 8:30AM to noon when open. 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# BIG LAKE HALF MARATHON RETURNS By Keith Jordan

Last year, The Big Lake Half Marathon continued it's tradition of New Hampshire running excellence, with more than 1300 entrants. Race Director and Series founder Keith Jordan is looking for bigger and better things this year, when the race returns to Alton on Saturday, May 7. "We're increasing the field to 1400 runners. We want to make sure the quality of the race is extremely high, while giving the biggest number of runners the opportunity to race." Jordan has been working hard with the town and Police to make the race even better than last year. "We're adding more live entertainment, bigger and better aid stations, and some surprises. We're going to have digital clocks at every mile for the runners again, so everyone can accurately check their splits every mile. Of course, we'll have the post-race band and pizza party for all of the athletes. Our goal is make this the premier Half Marathon in New England and the country."

Jordan is looking for volunteers for the event. Last year, there was a competition for the best aid station on the course, with the winner being awarded \$250. This year, all groups will be given a \$200 donation for their charity, along with the chance to win the \$250 for the best aid station. If you have a group who'd like to help out, please call 293-8353. "We're also looking for entertainment on the course, so if you're a musician, let me know. We'd love to have you and really make this a great Alton event. We're also looking for volunteers to help out with the finish line area and registration," says Jordan

The course will remain unchanged, starting on Letter "S" road at 9:00am. It will continue on Routes 11 and 11D, before returning to the finish line in Alton Bay.

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
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Welcome to May! Finally some warm weather - it was a very wild winter, and we're glad to see the snow gone.

#### DOG LICENSES Lisa Waterman, Alton Town Clerk

To all dog owners who have not yet licensed your dogs, you will be fined \$1.00 per month after May 31st. Also, you will be in violation of RSA 466:1 and a civil forfeiture will be issued carrying a fine of \$25.00. Don't add to the cost of a dog registration, come in soon. License fees are: Male/Female-\$10.00, Neutered/Spayed -\$7.50, 1st Animal of Citizen over 65 -\$2.00.

You may renew your dog license by mail. We require a self-addressed, stamped envelope, updated rabies certificate, neutering/spayed certificate, if applicable, and a check made payable to "Town of Alton" for the appropriate fee. The certificates will be returned to you with the new license.

Please call us at 875-2101 if you have any questions or no longer have your dog. Our office hours are 8:30 to 4:30 Monday through Friday. Thank you.

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May is a special month to the outdoor person. It is a month when the hunting and fishing can be great, and you can do both in the same day.

May 3rd is the opening of the spring turkey hunting season. With an abundance of wild turkey in the Alton area, one does not have to go far to hunt. Winter was not harsh to these big birds this year, so quite a few survived in good health. Only Toms may be hunted with bow and arrow or with shotgun. Legal hunting hours are 1/2 hour before sunrise until 12:00 noon thru May 31. It is exciting when you try to call the male ("Tom") turkey to you using sounds of a lusty female turkey. Good calling techniques and total camouflage are needed with these sharp eyed birds. What a beautiful sight a strutting, gobbling tom is.

Salmon fishing can still be good this month; as long as the water does not heat up too fast. The state Fish and Game Department says we are fishing over "tons of fish" in Winni. There could be some excellent fishing for the 24th annual Winni Derby held May 13, 14 and 15. Entrance fee is \$40.00 and there are 4 boat, motor and trailer packages as prizes for: Adults-1st and 2nd largest salmon; Junior (15 or under)-largest salmon; and anyone-largest lake trout. #### **Backyard Compost Bin Sale in Honor of Earth Day**

The Parks and Recreation Department is sponsoring a Backyard Compost Bin Sale in celebration of Earth Day 2005. In an effort to reduce household leftovers from preparing food in your kitchen from being thrown away, the Alton Parks and Recreation Department has joined a statewide effort to recycle the table scraps into rich, soil amendment. It is estimated that 25% of the average household's waste consists of yard trimmings and kitchen scraps which can easily be composted. Think of the space and money that would save in filling the landfills and reducing trash disposal costs. Through May 7, a home compost bin and how-to-guide with a combined retail value of \$80 can be purchased for \$35. The bin is black, has a ten-year warranty, and is made of recycled plastic. It is approximately 33" high and 33" wide, or large enough for a family of five. New this year to help collect the kitchen material is the Kitchen Waste Pail which is \$10.00, it has a hinged lid which snaps securely to the pail and comes with a mount to hang on the inside of a cabinet door, it is white and beige with a 7.5 liter capacity. The pail width easily accommodates the shape of plates for "mess free" scrapings. Look for order forms at the Parks and Recreation Department, Town Hall, Gilman Library and Alton Home and Lumber Center. Calls for service for the month of March are as follows: 12 Fire related, 24 Medical Emergencies of which 7 were motor vehicle crashes or rollovers; plus 4 service calls that included a flooded oil burner, tree into a garage, a motor vehicle that rolled into another in the same driveway and a Fire Drill at the Central School.

Our new ALS Ambulance has arrived and we expect delivery of the new Rescue Truck in the next few weeks, maybe even by the time of this publication. Anyone interested in seeing these new pieces of equipment is encouraged to stop by the Central Fire Station. As long as we are not out on an emergency call, we'll be glad to assist you.

Any outside burning **NOW** requires a Fire Permit. Come in to the Central Fire Station at 65 Frank Gilman Highway to obtain a permit Monday through Friday 8-4PM; Saturdays or Sundays call first (875-0222) as we may be out on an emergency.

We'd also like to remind residents and visitors if and when you see an emergency vehicle, drivers are required to **pull safely to the right side of the road and stop**. There are many misconceptions regarding this law; the more room you can give to these large emergency vehicles the better. We want to respond to your emergency and arrive safely to assist you.

We wish to thank the Alton Police Department, Alton Highway Department, and other mutual aid departments that assist us with both Fire and Medical emergencies. We appreciate your continued assistance and support.

Parents of elementary students will want to attend a free parenting program at Laconia's Memorial Middle School on Thursday, May 5 from 6-8pm. Adjusting to Middle School—Helping Your Child in Transition will help parents support their early adolescents as they they move from elementary to middle school. Join other parents to learn about and discuss: How to address concerns about peer pressure and academic success, recognizing the effects of social class, race, ability and gender biases and learn tips to better manage this school transition.

The program will start at 6:00 with Mexican food to celebrate Cinco de Mayo, sponsored by Project EXTRA! From 6:30 to 8:00 p.m, Donna San Antonio, Ed. D. and Lecturer on Education, Human Development and Psychology, Harvard Graduate School of Education, will share information based on her book "Adolescent Lives in Transition: How Social Class Influences the Adjustment to Middle School." San Antonio studied how social class background affected 30 young students as they transitioned from their home town elementary school to a regional middle school in a NH school district. She discovered some surprising results as students went from grade 6 to grade 7 from vastly different economic backgrounds and community cultures. There is much to be said about making NH schools welcoming and encouraging to students from all social class backgrounds.

Performances will be on Friday and Saturday, May 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> at 8:00 PM at All Saints Episcopal Church on South Main Street in Wolfeboro, NH. On Sunday, May 15 this concert will be presented at the Opera House in the Wakefield Town Hall in Sanbornville, NH at 3:00 PM.

Hallelujah is the word used by the ancient Hebrew psalmists to praise God. All of the music in this, our springtime concert, was composed so that choirs could lift their voices in praise to God. Beethoven was commissioned to write the *Mass in C* in 1807 by Count Nikolaus Esterhazy of Hungary in honor of the name day of his wife, Countess Maria Hermenegild. The talents of this mighty genius of music were now brought to the work of composing a mass. The completed work was, of course, quite a departure from the masses of Beethoven's predecessor, Haydn. It was not well received at its premier performance. Today, nearly 200 years after it was composed, we have a better perspective from which to appreciate this towering masterpiece.

Genius comes in many forms and from many places. The poem *Rejoice in the Lamb*, was written within the walls of an insane asylum. The poet, Christopher Smart, was possessed of a kind of religious compulsion to pray continuously, even dropping to his knees on the street to pray. Benjamin Britten has set this peculiar and delightful text to music that is vibrantly rhythmic, and both forceful and charming. Listen for the repetitive motif in the organ part that illustrates the movement of Smart's beloved cat, Jeoffry. The arias will be sung by 12 year old soprano, Ben Sigler.

Also on the program will be Mozart's Laudate Dominum, Franz Joseph Haydn's The Heaven's Are Telling, Vaughn William's O Taste and See, Stainer's God So Loved the World, Thomas Tallis' If Ye Love Me, and the first movement from the Vivaldi Gloria. We are blessed to have the composer of Ode to Spring, Barry Lockard, as one of our own members!

The Clearlakes Chorale is an 80 member chorus made up of local residents and directed by Andy Campbell, music director at Brewster Academy. 
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#### LOCAL MAN CLIMBS KILIMANJARO

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#### ASHES TO BEAUTY By Nancy Pritchard

On the evening of March 22<sup>nd</sup>, Ruth Sylvester of Alton Bay arrived home to find her house on fire which destroyed her home. A futile attempt to enter her home was soon abandoned as smoke and flames engulfed the rooms. She fled to her neighbor, former Fire Chief, Russell Sample, for help which soon brought the Alton Fire Department, followed by neighboring fire companies from Gilford, Gilmanton and Barnstead, and the Red Cross. As word spread lodging for the night was provided by a friend, and in a few days a work party of family members set out to winterize a summer cottage where Ruth could soon stay. Hot coffee and sandwiches for the workers suddenly appeared from members of Ruth's Friendship Bible Coffee group and Amilyne's Corner Market donated a boxful of cookies. Meanwhile Ruth picked through the rubble and found her mother's ring and her own engagement ring covered in melted-down plastic of a ring holder at the kitchen sink. She also found her late husband's Purple Heart.

In spite of the many losses Ruth is grateful to be alive and not to have been in the house at the time of the fire. She is also thankful for the support of the community and The Bay Church where se attends. Ruth has lived in Alton Bay for 35 years and worked as a caregiver. She also worked for the Heidtke Foundation, a support program for the elderly to remain in their homes.

It is ironic that Ruth, who is an elder widow herself and still working independently as a companion, is now without a home. However, she refuses to dwell on her losses and has a hopeful heart. Ruth's recent reading from the book of Isaiah reminds her, "He will give beauty for ashes, joy instead of mourning, praise instead of despair."

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
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#### LIONS CLUB NEWS



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eginning with its formation in the fall of 2003, the Downtown Revitalization Committee (DRC) has been working toward its goal of selecting a project where improvements would revitalize the village for the benefit of the townspeople.
