ON THE ROAD AT LAST! By Ryan J. Donnelly

The feeling is amazing. What can only be described as an adventure has at last reached its conclusion. Years have been spent in an effort to acquire a modified van that I, a young man with a physical disability, can drive independently. It's still hard to believe at times, rolling out into the driveway in my wheelchair, looking at this machine, and realizing that it is mine.

It is a testament to not only my personal effort, but the effort put forth by everyone who had manifested a hopeful idea into the striking-blue vehicle now parked outside my home. My family has offered much help and guidance along the way, driving with me during training sessions, and helping to brainstorm ideas for funding sources. We had sent out letters to all parts of the country, asking for assistance in my hopes for greater independence, through the ability to drive about freely.

The results were not looking good. Many of letters went completely unanswered. Frustration began to take hold of me at the though of 'How in the world are we going to be able to raise this kind of money?' Not long after, we received a call from the Alton/New Durham Lions Club, which would prove to be one of the greatest contributors to this cause. They had organized several fund-raising events in the town, had put out news of their efforts in *Main Street*, and even helped to work with Ride-Away, the providers and installers of most of the van's modifications. It was a surprise and a blessing that the Lions Club was able to work with us, and has shown me how outstanding the community of Alton can be.

Vocational Rehabilitation also played a large part in the realization of my goal, paying fully for the incredibly costly modifications that made up the bulk of the van's total cost. Though the approval process for the modification funding was a long wait in itself, I can say now that it was certainly worth it. This is only the technical and financial aspect of course. What good is a vehicle if I didn't know how to drive it? I was able to take Driver's Ed through the school, but only the classroom portion, not the driving one. It was through Crotched Mountain Driving School that I would get behind the wheel of a special van with components that could be swapped out to suit the individual's needs. Through this, we were able to determine what modifications would be best suited for me.

I got my drivers license in October of 2003, and I will admit it was frustrating to have it for so long and not be able to make use of it. Again, patience was the virtue to be had here, and about a month ago, my van was finally delivered to my home. I've since completed the last of my training with the van, and am spending time getting a feel for driving without an instructor. It's a bit scary at times, knowing how much time and effort and money has been put into this thing, and that I am in control of it, but I getting more and more confident in driving ability.

It's wonderful to finally taste a bit more freedom and independence, and satisfying to know that my hard work, and the hard work of everyone else involved has come to fruition. To everyone who lent a helping hand in this massive project, and the entire community of Alton, I extend my thanks. I'm on the road at last!

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

A charge will only apply to televisions and computer monitors as follows: Monitors and Televisions 19" or larger -\$10.00 each Monitors and Televisions 19" or less - \$ 5.00 each All other items - CPU, Mouse or Office Machines, etc no charge. ALTON B&M RAILROAD PARK UPDATE By Bonnie Barsanti & Judy Fry

In the autumn of 2003, the Downtown Revitalization Committee, a sub-committee of the Board of Selectman, was formed with the primary goal of selecting projects in the downtown area of Alton where improvements would revitalize the village for the benefit of the townspeople and visitors alike. The DRC is comprised of six volunteers and a representative from the Planning Board and a representative from the Board of Selectman. The first project chosen by the DRC was the former Boston & Maine Railroad vard, an area located behind the Town Hall.

Plans are well underway for the handicapped accessible Walking Trail, Wetlands Walk and Toddler Playground. As progress is made on each component of the Park, an updated report will appear in future issues of Main Street.

This issue is featuring the Toddler Playground.

This colorful area will be located near the Walking Trail, well away from the Wetland Board Walk and wetland area in the park.

One of our goals in the park was to create an area where all age groups could gather and enjoy a quiet respite. Keeping this goal and the needs of the town in mind, the picture of the playground included in this article evolved to be the best use of this area. After extensive research into commercial outdoor playground equipment our committee has agreed upon a creative play area design. The manufacturing company that we chose is the world's leader in playground equipment. Numerous suggestions from this company helped guide us in our choice.

The toddler's playground plan includes a Steam Engine and Railway Carriage, meant to encourage imaginative role-playing for children ages two to eight years old. the Steam Engine features a bench, various knobs and handles, while the boiler house in front is cave shaped with different entrances. The railway Carriage features benches, tables and shelves. Everything a young child would need if they were going on a long train expedition. So, hurry up, get-on-board, imagine the whistle blowing, don't forget to wave to your friends, because your train journey is beginning. The former B&M Railroad brought excitement into the town of Alton in the days of old. We, your Downtown Revitalization Committee Members, (with lots of public support) would like to bring back some of these memories.

Well, enough imagining, included in the design is a bright red spring seesaw. As we all should remember, you have to use social interaction with a friend or you won't be going anywhere on this bouncy toy. Tucked in a corner is a climbing unit, designed to teach balance, sort of like jumping on large rocks on a sandy beach. Notice the monkey bars, what fun the kids or grandkids could have! Least we forget, we'd like to include a park bench for you to sit on while you watch everyone having fun.

Welcome to July, summer is here at last and so are the bugs! All this rain we have had has brought them all out, every where.



July is the middle month. The middle of the summer seasons and most of the fishing seasons. It is a time to be out on the water in the long daylight days.

Coldwater fish (salmon, lake trout, brook, brown and rainbow trout) will be heading into deep water, 40-60 feet and deeper in the Big Lake. As the streams and rivers grow warmer, they also become more shallow. Fish here will be seeking the coolest water they can find like shaded areas and under cut banks.

Warm water fish will be in their glory this month as the water temperature allows them to feed in the shallows early and late in the day. They will seek deeper water, around 20 feet, during the hottest part of the day. To fish for them, use surface or shallow running gear early and late, and deeper running lures during the day.

Starting July 1st, you may keep 5 bass if you wish to eat some. Bass from our local cold, clean lakes are very tasty. Look for these fish around underwater structure like rocks, stumps, trees, or drop offs and points. They also hide under docks, pond lilies, shaded areas and in weeds. Good luck.

For the hunter, Farmington Fish and Game Club in New Durham offers an archery range, skeet range, rifle and pistol ranges. Thursday evenings offer a 3-D archery league to sharpen your shooting skills for the fall hunting seasons.





Calls for service for the month of May kept the department very busy. We responded to 16 Fire related, 31 Medical Emergencies of which 1 was a motor vehicle crash plus 1 service call. Our calls for services have steadily increased and presently are 48 above last year at this same time.


The new Rescue Truck has arrived. This new 2005 E-One Rescue Truck holds all hydraulic rescue extrication tools and other specialized rescue equipment. This vehicle comes with a 3000 watt light tower located on the roof to assist in illuminating emergency scenes and will also carry cold water rescue suits, rapid intervention equipment, vehicle extrication air bags and a whole lot more. Anyone interested in seeing this latest piece of rescue apparatus is encouraged to stop by the Central Fire Station. As long as we are not out on an emergency, we'll be glad to assist you.

Outside burning requires a written Fire Permit as per State Law; this cannot be done on the telephone. Come in to the Central Fire Station at 65 Frank Gilman Highway to obtain a permit Monday through Friday 8-4PM; Saturdays or Sundays call first (875-0222) as we may be out on an emergency.

We wish to remind residents, especially seasonal, that 911 numbers **MUST** be posted as per the Town Ordinance. We are still responding to emergencies with no numbers posted which impedes our response to you and in some emergencies could prove fatal. Please help us to be able to help you. Any one in need of a copy of this Town Ordinance may obtain one at the Town Hall.

BELKNAP COUNTY TASK FORCE LAUNCHES "PROJECT MONITOR" TIP LINE TO HELP PREVENT UNDERAGE DRINKING By Shannon Swett

The Belknap County Underage Drinking Prevention Task Force has implemented an anonymous tip line called Project Monitor, which is a tool used to reduce instances of underage drinking. The task force, comprised of representatives from local schools, law enforcement, and several community organizations came together at the beginning of this year to address the problems associated with alcohol use among youth in Belknap County. The first strategy chosen by the group was to create an anonymous, toll-free tip line to encourage community members to report suspected incidents of youth alcohol use or underage drinking parties.

"The goal of the tip line," according to Shannon Swett, Outreach Coordinator for the Community Response coalition (CoRe), "is to prevent tragic situations from occurring. All calls are anonymous; we even offer a website for people to make anonymous tips online." This initiative is based on a similar tip line in the Plymouth region, also called Project Monitor.

To gain involvement from the community and area youth, the task force recently held a contest to create a graphic or logo for Project Monitor. The award, a \$100 gift certificate donated by Wal-Mart, was presented to the winner, Katie Dobbins. Katie is one of several art students from a high school art class at Gilford High School, which incorporated the contest as an assignment for students. The winning entry, as well as the runners-up, can be viewed on the Project Monitor website, <u>www.projectmonitornh.com</u>.

The Belknap County Underage Drinking Prevention Task Force also hopes to raise awareness about the possible ramifications that can come from hosting an underage drinking party. Since the enactment of what is commonly referred to as the "Party Host Law" (RSA 644:18) in New Hampshire, it is illegal for anyone over 21 to knowingly facilitate a gathering in which there is alcohol use among youth. The penalty could carry fines up to \$2000 and a jail sentence up to one year.

MASTER PLAN 2005 COMMUNITY SURVEY RESULTS

The results of the Town of Alton Community Survey, sent in the April Issue of the Alton's Main Street, were presented at a Public Meeting on June 23 by Kathy Menici, Town Planner and Tom Hoopes, Chairperson. Of the almost 400 respondents, 46% lived in Alton less than 10 years and 54% lived in Alton 11 or more years. The largest age group was 34% in the 41-55 category and 83% had some college education with 53% Graduates. 272 rated Alton's small town atmosphere as #1. 168 felt excessive housing development as the most serious problem. Respondents also felt much more had to be done to protect Alton's lakes, ponds and streams as well as protect historical buildings. 290 respondents wanted Alton to remain primarily a rural residential community and 253 placed single family residences as the type of Housing Development that should receive priority. It was the desire that any new Commercial or Light Industry be limited and mainly be directed to Alton Village on Rte 11, north from the Traffic Circle to Alton Bay. Municipal Services satisfaction were ranked from the Library at #1 to Zoning Enforcement which was at the bottom of the list.

The overall conclusions of the survey calculated by the Lakes Region Planning Committee were:

The environmental quality is an important characteristic to the residents of Alton. The many lakes, ponds and wetlands are perceived as needing more protection as is the groundwater, open space and wildlife habitat.

Development should adhere to architectural standards that are consistent with rural, small town atmosphere in Alton There is support for improving the town beach facilities and revitalization of the Alton Bay area and the Village. The encouragement of recreational and tourism business are possible future commercial directions.

The Lakes Region Planning Committee were very pleased with the almost 10% response to the 3300 sent out by *Alton's Main Street* and with the background of the responders. Kathy Menici commended *Alton's Main Street* for it's Community effort and reminded every one that the Master Plan revisions committees will be continuing their efforts over the next three months. Input from all can be submitted to the Planning Office at Town Hall.



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HISTORIC ALTON

Editors Note: Harry Bickford was a lifelong resident of New Durham. His farm was located in New Durham and Alton, and is currently owned by his grandson, Robert Bickford, Jr. Harry worked as a mailman for many years. He kept a farmers diary, detailing the goings-on of the farm and around the Town. Main Street has received permission from George Bickford, Harry's son, to publish excerpts of the diary. It is an interesting look at daily life on a farm. The diary was compiled by Elaine Bickford.

July 1940

Mon. 1: Fair and cloudy. The boys harrowed the squash piece this AM. We hoed the squashes this PM. Bobby's box of fireworks came by express this PM and is he pleased. Mr. Roberts called this evening and I signed an order for an Allis-Chalmers Model B to be delivered Wednesday morning.

Tues. 2: Fair. Boys mowed the piece between the house and lower barn. The new agricultural teacher called on George and Nelson this PM. His name is Mr. Guptill, born in Northwood, and has been teaching in Colebrook for the last three years. Nelson and George have gone roller skating in the Bay tonight.

Wed. 3: Fair. Hauled the hay in this PM that we mowed yesterday below the wood pile and the lower barn also. The tractor came today and we tried it on the lower end of the oat piece, worked very satisfactory. We went down to Rochester to see the carnival... did not stop long.

Thu 4: Rainy. Harold Cilley came over and he and George lined up the cutter bar on the mowing machine. In the PM we cultivated the potatoes with the tractor. It did a good job. We went to Wolfeboro in the evening to see the fireworks.

Fri. 5: Fair. The boys mowed the big piece today. I dusted the squashes this PM. Nellie went to Concord this PM and got the tractor plates for George.

Sat. 6: A lovely day. Had all kinds of trouble with the tractors this AM. Called up Brackett & Shaw about the noise in the wheel of the tractor and they said they would send a mechanic up in the AM, so the boys started to rake with the old tractor and that wouldn't go right so when I got home from the mail I called up Brackett & Shaw again and they said they would have a mechanic up in the PM and to use the tractor until he came. Got Rennie to come up and fix the old tractor so we could use that while they were working on the new one. We hauled in two loads of hay from the big piece. Sun. 7: Hottest day we have had this summer. Unloaded a load of hay this morning. George went to Merrymeeting for a swim.

Mon. 8: Fair and hot. George disc harrowed the squashes in the AM.

Wed. 10: A hot day. We got a load of hay in. Jean rode the horse rake for us. George and I mowed some after supper in the front field.

Thu. 11: Cloudy. Hilled up the potatoes in the AM. In the PM we mowed in the front field until it began to rain.

Sat. 13: Cloudy. We cultivated the garden in the AM and raked up and hauled in the hay in the front field that was cut Thursday. I dusted the squashes tonight. We hauled in about a good rack full of hay from the front field.

Mon. 15: A lovely day. The boys mowed in the front field in the AM. Hauled in two rack fulls in the PM. The boys and the Fairbanks went roller skating at the Bay.

Tue. 16: Showry. The boys finished mowing in the front field. I hoed the asparagus and some corn.

Fri. 19: Fair and hot. The boys mowed the piece by the pond below the upper barn. We hauled in a load of hay from the flat ground. Set up the horse fork this PM at the lower barn. Sat. 20: Cloudy. Got in a load of hay back of the barn before it rained. The boys went to the pictures in Wolfeboro this evening.

Mon. 22: Cloudy. The sun came out this PM and we turned the hay over beside the potatoes and got it in before it rain. We had a big rain after we got it unloaded. The girls came down and helped us haul in a load of hay. Picked the first lot of string beans this year tonight.

Tue. 23: Hot. The boys mowed the piece above the pines. Hauled in a rackful that was left around the pond. Had our first mess of peas today for dinner.

Wed. 24: Hot. We hauled in a load of hay. The boys took the girls to the pictures in Farmington this evening. Paid Louie \$25.00 for his standing grass.

Mr. M called to see me this forenoon, he was drumming up trade, wanted to get the names of the graduates of the Alton High School. The first time I have seen him in 34 years. Guy Sanborn got the other lot of broilers this morning. 101 broilers at 13 cents a pound.

Wed. 31: Fair. Best day for making hay that we have had this summer. The boys mowed the piece above the garden this morning and by turning it several times today we were able to get it in tonight after we had our supper.



WANT TO HELP? LEAVE FAWNS ALONE From NH Fish and Game Dept.

With springtime wildlife young now on the scene, remember that you should NOT pick up any animals you may find, especially fawns (newborn deer).

"Remember - the best chance a young wild animal or bird has to survive is with its parents," says New Hampshire Fish and Game Wildlife Programs Administrator Mark Ellingwood. "Give fawns and other young animals plenty of space and leave them alone and in the woods, where they belong."

One New Hampshire wildlife rehabilitator, Cathie Gregg of the Elaine Connors Center for Wildlife in Madison reports that, "this is the time of year when people are apt to see deer fawns by themselves. Well-intentioned people are picking up fawns at an alarming rate this year. When a fawn is picked up and admitted to our wildlife center, it is automatically put at a disadvantage, and oftentimes will not survive."

Seeing a fawn alone does NOT mean that it is orphaned or that it needs our help, says Gregg. Typically the doe (female deer) will feed in the

Early morning and evening hours. It is normal for a doe to leave her fawn alone while she goes off to feed. In many cases, the doe will not return until nightfall.

Mark Ellingwood notes that fawns are not defenseless creatures. Their cryptic coloration, tendency to stay perfectly still, and lack of scent, are all adaptations that help boost survival. The absence of a doe at the bedding site of fawns enhances fawn survival as well. Does are easy to detect because of their size and scent; predators would quickly key in on does in order to find fawns, if the two associated with one another constantly. "Well intentioned but misguided humans who apply human behaviors and attributes to wild animals often literally love our wildlife to death," notes Ellingwood.

If you're lucky enough to see a fawn, count your blessings and leave the area. Your continued presence and/or frequent visits will only contribute to the likelihood of the fawn being abandoned. Unless you can verify that a fawn's mother is dead - please leave it alone. If you have questions, call your local Fish and Game office before taking any action.

Note that it is ILLEGAL to have in your possession or take any New Hampshire wildlife from the wild and keep it in captivity. Only qualified people with a special rehabilitator's permit, issued through Fish and Game headquarters, may possess any wild animal.
