SEAN SULLIVAN NAMED NH SCOUT OF THE YEAR

Members of Boy Scout Explorer Post #300 were surprised and delighted last month to learn that two members of the Law Enforcement Post, Sean Sullivan of Alton and Vicki Harzmovitch of Gilford, had been selected New Hampshire Explorer Scouts of the Year.

Sullivan is president of the Post and a member for the past four years. Sgt. Robert Luther of the Gilford Police Department and Post advisor notes that the 15 Explorers represent Gilford, Laconia, and Plymouth, as well as the Alton contingent which includes Robert Gilmore, vice-president for Organization, and Sean's brother, Larry Sullivan.

Gilford Police Dispatch Clerk Paula Harzmovitch, assistant advisor, believes that of the 20 such groups in New Hampshire, this is the most active. Cadets, both boys and girls, accompany officers on patrol duty and may be called upon to assist in traffic control or investigation at vehicle accident scenes.

Training includes introduction to basic enforcement and investigative procedures, the exercise of police authority, substance abuse prevention, firearms familiarization, the law and the courts. Practical work may be the investigation of a mock crime, follow-up procedures, and participation in ensuing court proceedings. The program avails itself of a wide variety of local, state and even national resources to offer insight to many facets of law enforcement and related professions for cadets considering pursuing such careers.

Explorer Law Enforcement Post #300 meets in uniform on Tuesday evenings in the Gilford Community Church. Mature, responsible youngsters between the ages of 14 and 21 may be eligible to join. Further information may be obtained from Paula Harzmovitch at 524-5741.

ALTON SCHOOL REVIEWED BY NE EVALUATION TEAM

An evaluation committee from the Commission on Public Schools of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges visited the Alton Central School October 28-31 to assess the quality of education.

The committee's report has been presented to the School Board by School Principal Sherwood Fluery.

The 36-page report assesses Alton Central School in terms of the school's own stated philosophy and objectives, as well as the Commission's Standard of Membership. Commendations and suggestions embrace staff and administration, curriculum, services and facilities, as well as community relations and involvement.


PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS PLANS FOR WINTER FUN

Judging by the number of "thank you's" and favorable comments received last year, the skating rink behind the Central Fire Station on Route 140 was well used and appreciated. The Parks and Playgrounds Committee wants to offer the facility again this year.

Another area available for recreational use is approximately 100 acres of State Forest which could be made into cross country ski trails, a welcome addition to the winter sports scene.

Predictably, volunteers are needed to help make these projects happen. Spraying operations at the Skating Rink begin as soon as weather permits and cross country trails can be cleared and prepared as soon as volunteers apply. 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ARTISTS IN THE SCHOOLS PROGRAM SET FOR ALTON

The Alton School is again participating in the "Artists in the Schools" program, with a \$1200 grant from the New Hampshire State Council on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Mary Christy, coordinator for Alton, explains that the program places professional artists in educational settings to enhance the learning environment by participation in day-to-day student activities. A final project or event, such as a literary publication or poetry reading, will illustrate goals and achievements.

Returning this year is poet Marie Harris, who worked with high school students in coordination with professional photographer Phil Scalia. The winter months will feature science fiction author James Patrick Kelly and spring will be highlighted by playwright Paul Mroczka.

NEW FIRE TRUCK ORDERED FOR APRIL DELIVERY

Fire Chief Russell Jones reported that Alton's new fire truck, approved at the Town Meeting this year, has been ordered. Manufactured by FMC, the truck features an all aluminum cab on a Spartan chassis. It will be powered by a diesel engine and equipped with automatic transmission.

The truck will operate out of the Central Fire Station on Route 140. Designed as an "attack engine", it will carry 1000 gallons of water and will replace Engine 1, which was purchased in 1962. The cost is approximately \$127,000 and delivery is expected in early April.

Chief Jones indicated that the decision on the purchase of a new truck took many hours. Nearly 1000 miles were logged visiting towns in New England to view the various options available in new equipment.

SAU BUDGET HEARING SET FOR DECEMBER 1

The 1987-88 budget for School Administrative Unit 51 will be reviewed at a public hearing on December 1 at 7p.m. in the Barnstead Elementary School. The SAU includes Alton, Barnstead and Pittsfield.

The proposed budget is \$235,922.

BECOMING A RESIDENT MORE THAN MOVING IN

Just moved to Alton? Bought a house here? Renting an apartment or house? Now you're a RESIDENT, right? Wrong! No one becomes a resident automatically.

The first step in this mystical process is to visit the Alton Town Hall to complete a Resident Application form. The friendly and well-informed employees will lead you on your way to becoming a resident.

This process is governed by state laws and local policies that serve as guidelines and determine the criteria by which your application is reviewed.

For instance, New Hampshire RSA 54:1 states that "Every inhabitant of the state, having a fixed and permanent established domicile, being a citizen of the United States, of the age provided for in Article II of Part First of the Constitution of New Hampshire, shall have a right at any meeting or election, to vote in the town, ward, or unincorporated place in which he is domiciled.

"The determination of one's domicile is a question of factual physical presence incorporating an intention to reside for an indefinite period. This domicile is that place in which he dwells on a continuing basis for a significant portion of each year."

Town policy offers the following guidelines. "An individual may be considered a resident of Alton if he: 1. Domiciles in the town as defined in RSA 54:1; 2. Is on active duty in the armed forces; or 3. Is retired and has no permanent abode.

"An individual DOES NOT qualify as a resident of Alton if he: 1. Considers his 'tax Home' in another town of the state; 2. Lives in Alton weekends and vacations only; 3. Maintains voter registration in another town or state; 4. Has jobs, living quarters and children attend schools in another state or 5. Has no permanent abode in Alton."

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AREA CHURCHES PLAN CHRISTMAS PROGRAMS

Alton area churches have scheduled a variety of services and programs for the upcoming Christmas season.

The Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Alton Bay Advent Christian Church will be holding a special Christmas all-church fellowship on Saturday, December 20. The purpose of this annual event is to enhance the fellowship of individuals and families within the church and to extend the hand of fellowship to those in the area as well as those served by missionaries abroad.

The Baha'i Fireside will have a discussion on world peace on Christmas Eve. Programs throughout the holiday season will focus on this theme.

The Community Church will present a Sunday School Christmas Program on December 14 and observe Christmas Sunday on the 21st. On Christmas Eve at 11p.m., a candle and carol service is scheduled at the Congregational Meeting House. There are no services on Christmas Day.

The Christmas schedule at St. Joan of Arc will be printed in the church bulletin.

On New Year's Eve at 8p.m., the Hosanna New Testament Fellowship will have candlelight services and communion at Elder Richard Veilleux's home in Gilmanton.

CABLEVISION UPDATE

According to Fred Zecha of Community TV Corporation (Lakes Cablevision), 100% of the originally planned areas of Alton now have the capability to receive cable television. There are a few new areas yet to be picked up, according to Zecha, and these few are awaiting the approval of the telephone and power companies.

He points out that better than 50% of "houses passed" on their cable routes in Alton have signed up for some part or all of the program offerings. He indicated further that there have been no particular problems with service and "things are going well." Some of the earliest connections were done during a heavy rain period and there were some early problems, but "that is all behind us now."

SCHOOL LIBRARY JOINS STATE INFO NETWORK

The Alton School has joined the New Hampshire Automated Information System, establishing an on-line computer contact with the State Library in Concord. This program, acquired at no extra cost to the school, gives students access to an extensive range of information sources and provides invaluable experience in doing research via computer.

Alton is one of 13 N.H. schools to join the system. Librarian Marjorie Mohr notes that member libraries have access to three data bases: a union catalog covering resources in over 150 libraries state-wide; a news item index for the Union Leader, the Concord Monitor, and the Nashua Telegraph; and an index showing the status of bills under consideration in the state legislature.

The service can be made available to Alton residents by contacting Mrs. Mohr at the School Library.

ALTON STUDENTS SCORE WELL ON NATIONAL TEST

Students in Grades 2 through 12 in the Alton School took the California Achievement Tests in October. The Tests provide an indication of the skill levels achieved in reading, spelling, language, mathematics, study skills, science, and social studies.

With the exception of the 11th Grade, the total score for each grade was higher than the national average for that grade.

For example, the total battery score for the second grade was 66.3 which indicated that the class scored better than 66.3 percent of second graders nationally. Other scores were Grade 3 - 71.5, Grade 4 - 80.0, Grade 5 - 56.0, Grade 6 - 56.0, Grade 7 - 59.0, Grade 8 - 59.0, Grade 9 - 59.5, Grade 10 - 58.3, Grade 11 - 44.4, and Grade 12 - 57.0.

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FOCUS ON: GEORGE WINCHESTER STONE JR.

In a delightful residence in East Alton with a breathtaking view of Wofeboro Bay and the mountains beyond, the former Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences of New York University and his wife, Hellen, make their home a majority of the year. George Winchester Stone Jr. is an uncommon man of 79 years with a brilliant academic and administrative record. And he's an extremely active participant today in everything that is good for Alton, where he has owned property and been a resident since 1954.

He's still Dean Emeritus of Librarians, NYU. There is hardly space to list his achievements. A few include his role in World War II as Lieutenant Commander in charge of the Reserve Officers Training Corps and the V-12 programs: Executive Secretary of the Modern Language Association of America and Editor of its prestigious journal; President of the Modern Language Association and the International Federation for Modern Lanquages and Literatures; and member of the U. S. National Commission for UNESCO. His scholarly field of interest has been English drama and theatre in the 18th century. He has had several books and many special articles published.

Stone has been a Guggenheim Fellow and a Fulbright Fellow; holds honorary degrees from Hofstra, Middlebury, and George Washington University. He earned his BA from Dartmouth and his MA and PhD from Harvard. He has been a Phi Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar or Visiting Professor of English at such schools as the University of Massachusetts, the University of North Dakota, Tennessee, Johns Hopkins, UCLA, Washington State, and Columbia.

But Alton is his present love. He has served as President of the East Alton Meeting House Society and authored the current brochure describing the historic Meeting House. He is a board member of the United Associations of Alton and a trustee of the Alton Housing for the Elderly. He is one of the prime movers in the Alton Concerned Taxpayers (ACT).

He is an eloquent speaker and master of the written word on current events and issues. A number of letters and commentaries by him have appeared in area newspapers regarding the necessity of good government practices in Alton. When asked what motivates his local community interest and involvement, Stone replied "It just comes naturally. It's a family tradition." His mother was an original member of the Wash-

ington, D.C., YWCA board. He's a strong believer in the Alton Master Plan and one of its most eloquent proponents. "We must", he said, "have orderly planning for orderly growth as well as cooperative activity and planning with neighboring towns in the area." He initiated the petition which resulted in Alton's rejoining the Lakes Region Planning Commission this year.

He's a busy man. As this writer left Stone's home, he was about to mail a review and proof-reading he had done of an article for a writer in National Geographic and then on to a meeting of the Alton Historical Society. Win and Hellen Stone are real treasures in the Alton Community.

Budget Committee Chairman Al Fisher has announced the tentative schedule of hearings for the various departments and offices.

- Establish a sewer development task force.


There also is a need for participants on the committee to study rules and regulations for hawkers and vendors.


