### SCHOOL ADDITION DENIED AT CONTINUED MEETING

Voters turned down a second attempt to pass a motion to authorize a bond issue of \$1.7 million for additions to the Alton Central School.

The vote took place on Wednesday, April 23, during a reconvened School District Meeting that began on March 22. 483 voters participated with 262 yes votes and 221 no votes. A two/thirds vote or 322 yes votes were required for passage. The first vote on March 22 lost when 194 yes votes were recorded to 143 no votes.

## FOREST FIRE DANGER A SPRINGTIME PROBLEM

A lack of rain and warm temperatures are responsible for the high forest fire danger each spring. Careful application of fire permit regulations and common sense can help reduce this danger.

Fire permit regulations include:

- Permits are required for all outdoor burning.
- 2. Permits are issued only for the hours after 5 p.m. and before 9 a.m.
- 3. A new permit must be obtained each time yoù burn.
- 4. Annual permits are available and required for camp and cooking fires and rubbish incinerators.
- 5. Charcoal cooking fires do not require permits, but the disposal of ashes must be done carefully.

Permits may be obtained from Alden's Garage, Fire Warden Russell Jones, Deputy Warden Harold Clough, and Deputy Warden Irvino Roberts.

Permits may be cancelled at any time by the Warden as a result of weather conditions.

#### FOCUS ON: PAULINE BAKEMAN

At 78 years old, Pauline Bakeman still has vibrant eyes and a Katherine Hepburn sort of determination and strength. She's a great raconteur, but very modest as she would rather speak of other people's achievements than of her own accomplishments, which are many.

Ms. Bakeman was born in Jaffrey, N.H., on May 10, 1908, the daughter of a Baptist minister.

She obtained a Master's Degree from the University of Chicago and worked as a psychiatric social worker in Illinois and Washington, D.C. In 1945, she worked with displaced people in Germany who were conquered and relocated by Hitler. After that she went to New York City to work as a guidance counselor for the school system, handling the most difficult cases. She then came to live in her home that her grandfather had called "Home Nook", built circa 1795.

#### TIMBER TAX LAW CHANGES

Changes in the New Hampshire Timber Tax Law will affect those planning to have cordwood or timber cut from their land after April 1, 1986.

Landowners must file an "Intent to Cut" form with the town and pay the timber tax for stumpage harvested from their land. Loggers and timber buyers no longer file this form.

Penalty for failure to file the form or misrepresenting the volume cut has been increased to a misdemeanor.

Exempt from the timber tax is wood harvested for personal use up to 20 cords and 10,000 board feet per year. An "Intent to Cut" form must be filed for harvests over these amounts.
