7th ANNUAL CELEBRATION OF OLD HOME WEEK


It all started in 1978 when Fire Chief Russell E. Jones began talking to local organizations about the idea of an annual celebration intended to spotlight civic organizations and encourage a sense of pride about the town. Chief Jones wanted to bring everyone together and have a good time doing it. The result was the first Old Home Week in 1981.

Now, seven years later, Alton is still observing its 10-day week of civic pride and hometown fun. The schedule of activities and events is very much like the original version, testifying to the planning committee's philosophy - "If it ain't broke, don't fix it!"

The 1987 theme, "Alton - A Town For All Seasons", was created by Diedra Magnifico and the logo was designed by Connie Quindley.

John Conboy is chairman of the Planning Committee and Archie Thibeault serves as Co-Chairman and Parade Marshall. Secretary is Judy Thibeault and Terry Loanes is Treasurer. Doris Selfridge handled public relations and the Craft Fair was organized by Barbara Bohannon. Pat Brady and Ed Consentino represented community organizations.

The 1987 Old Home Week programs are included in the August Events listing and a program booklet will be distributed by the committee.





BARBERSHOPPER'S HOST 38th ANNUAL JAMBOREE

One of the traditional highlights of Old Home Week is the Annual Barbershopper's Jamboree. The 38th annual version will fall on Saturday, August 8, at 7:45p.m. at the Alton Central School.

Once again this year, the sponsors will be the Nashua Chapter of S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. The Nashua Chapter took over in 1975 from the Norwich, Conn., Chapter who hosted the event for 25 years. The host chapter set up a scholarship fund in the name of the Norwich Chapter. The result has been an annual scholarship for an Alton graduate successfully completing one year of college.

Generous support over the years has resulted in many contributions to area organizations and projects. Among the beneficiaries have been: Huggins Hospital, Lakes Region General Hospital, Save the Mill Society of Laconia, Alton Police Department, Alton Bay Community House, town tennis courts, and Alton Central School.

This year, Jonathon Downing reported a \$5,000 pledge from the group toward the matching fund campaign for Phase II of the Parks and Playgrounds recreational development program.

Alton welcomes these fine singing groups to our town, and on the weekend of August 8 the Barbershoppers from far and wide will put a song in the air from early morning to late at night. We can all respond by supporting the event which has done so much for our town and this area.

Items or cash donations for the Penny Sale may be left at the Police Station in Town Hall or call 875-3752 to have your gift picked up.





FOCUS ON: MARY BATCHELDER

She is lovingly and admiringly known to hundreds of Alton youngsters as "Mrs. B.". Scores of Alton School volunteers think her as the "Whirlwind Catalyst", as they contemplate her friendly skill in getting deep involvement from them. And she's simply a "born scavenger" by her own definition. This beloved Enrichment Gifted and Talented Aide at Alton School's elementary division has given new meaning to the word enrichment these past several years. The program and her life are synonomous. And if this article seems to be a Focus On: Alton's Enrichment Program, it's understandable.

She came to America in 1946 as bride from her native village of Torryburn in Scotland. She and her carpenter/builder husband, Calvin, reside in West Alton and are the parents of four grown children, all of whom went all the way through the Alton School system. Three are UNH graduates. One is a chemical engineer, one a medical nologist and one is in linguistics. youngest son starred in cross-country while at Alton High School and now works with his father.

Before starting her present role, she served Alton in the Gilman Library, worked as a part-time Title I tutor and then as a half-time creative writing program coordinator. Her definition of enrichment is "providing educational opportunities not within the regular curriculum." Typical of these

special opportunities is the concept of elective mini-courses in grades 4-6. Some 34 different courses have been conducted in the past five years, and popular and recurring ones have included: Aviation/Space/Rocketry, Tinsel Pictures, Outdoor Survival, and Getting to Know our Town. French, which started as an elective mini-course.


ALTON-NEW DURHAM LIONS PLAN PANCAKE BREAKFAST



CONSTITUTION IS 200; ALTON PLANS OBSERVANCE



Two centuries ago, in May 1787, representatives from the American states met in Philadelphia to revise a document (the "Articles of Confederation") in an attempt to bring unity and order to a nation that was but a decade into its existence. Four months later, on September 17, they completed their work - not revising the Articles of Confederation, but instead creating a new national Constitution that laid the foundations for a democratic society, establishing a federal government of the people, by the people, and for the people.

And now in 1987 on the bicentennial of that Constitution's founding, Alton will join with tens of thousands of communities throughout America in celebration of that Bicentennial.

September 6 will be a memorable day in Alton history, as reported by the Alton Committee for the Bicentennial Celebration of the U.S. Constitution. Chaired by Nancy Johnston, members of the Committee are: Jean Roberts, Pat Merrill, Gwen Jones, Gerard O'Rourke Milton Jensen, Greg Boelzner, Aida Downing, Marilyn Dame, Barbara Simpson, Kathy Harriman, Noelle Strong, and Patricia Callahan.

Complete details will be in the September issue of Main Street, but to get these events on your calendar early, the great day will begin with a sunrise service at 7a.m. at the Advent Christian Campground with the release of red, white and blue balloons with Consitution-related messages. From 8-11a.m.,



a "Constitutional Breakfast" will be held at the American Legion Hall. A huge "Celebrate America Picnic" will be held at 5p.m. along the waterfront at Alton Bay. Large copies of the Constitution will be signed by participants from 5 to 7p.m. The Air Force Band of New England will perform at the Alton Bay Bandstand from 7 to 8p.m. followed by the concluding fireworks at 9p.m.

It seems fitting that New Hampshire communities be in the vanguard of this celebration. The founding fathers decreed that when nine states had ratified the Constitution, it would become the basic law of the land. New Hampshire was ninth!

The American Revolution gave us freedom; the Constitution gave us the means to keep it. It is to be hoped that Alton families will be out in force on September 6 to celebrate and share in that heritage.

higher grades who enjoyed a relationship with her in earlier years come back often. Soveral of this year's graduating class were among her "enrichees" a few years ago.Frankly, it's fascinating to watch Mrs. B., with several activities going on simultaneously. She always seems to find time to listen to the individual child, make suggestions, offer a word of encouragement, and with a wellframed question spur them on to even greater achievements. She knows the great majority of elementary pupils as individuals, and they all feel they know her.

This self-styled "scavenger" lates a wealth of materials and always seems to have the right props or "stuff" right time. And the youngsters seem to know that they can turn to her for even the most novel of materials. Learning around Mrs. is fun. And a team from Cornell University studying enrichment techniques and special programs in New England has come to the same conclusion. The result will be a published article in a national educational publication soon.

Her enrichment program leaves her little time for other activities. She's still a tireless reader and looks back on such favorite earlier pursuits as braiding rugs, collecting antiques and finishing furniture. Mary will be retiring at the end of the 1987-88 school year, but "I won't lose contact" she stresses, "and it will be fun to be a volunteer again." One has the feeling that she will give new meaning to the term "volunteer." She's that kind of very special person.
