

MASTER PLAN COMMITTEES GATHER INFORMATION

The Master Plan Committees for housing, conservation, community facilities, and land use had an orientation meeting on September 8 to discuss the work schedule for data cellection and survey analysis and to augment the list of special characteristics that personify Alton.

That list included: the Bay, the Bandstand, the Straightback Mountain-Mount Major-Cedar Mountain skyline, the community centers, Old Home Week, the Fly-In, the absence of clear-cutting on the lakefront, the school system, tree farms, apple orchards, Antique Boat Show, Lake Winnipesaukee, conservation lands (Audubon property, Merrymeeting Marsh, State Forest), Letter S Road, Prospect Mountain, village character of Alton, lack of neon lights and billboards.

Priority projects for the committees include review of current zoning, collecting local data, and analyzing the survey results. Committee members are looking for more members, as some committees have as few as 3 members. Committee members also expressed the need for everyone to return the surveys mailed in September.

ALTON SCHOOL PRINCIPAL NAMED SAU 51 ASSISTANT

ROGERS WILL REPLACE FLUERY

Sherwood W. Fluery, principal of the Alton Central School since 1982, has been named assistant superintendent of School Administrative Unit 51 according to an announcement by David McKenney, chairman of the SAU Board.

SAU 51 serves the Alton, Barnstead, Pittsfield, and Barnstead-Pittsfield Cooperative School Districts.

Fluery began his career as a physical education teacher for one year in the Governor Wentworth School District after graduation from Plymouth State College in 1969. He then moved to Alton to teach physical education for the next ten years. In 1980, he became principal of the Pittsfield Elementary School and special education director of the Pittsfield School District before returning to Alton in 1982.

Fluery holds a master of education degree from Plymouth State College and is a C.A.S candidate at the University of Maine.

In making the announcement, McKenney described Fluery as "an outstanding educational administrator, an experienced teacher, a person very knowledgeable about the communities in SAU 51 and an educational leader who has the respect of his fellow administrators and the teaching staff."

George Rogers, assistant principal of Alton since 1982, will become acting principal on October 10, the date of Fluery's appointment to the SAU.

Rogers graduated from Salem State College and has a master's degree from Plymouth State College. He also is a C.A.S. candidate at the University of Maine. He taught language arts and math at a private school for dyslexic students and social studies at the Pittsfield High School before coming to Alton.

McKenney indicated that the appointments are for the 1988-89 fiscal year and are subject to further consideration by the SAU and Alton Boards before final decisions are made for 1989-90.

BANDSTAND IN THE BAY FUNDRAISER CONTINUES

The Alton and Alton Bay Improvement Committee is seeking more historical information on the Bandstand in the water, and Co-chairman Cathy Mars urges anyone with observations over the years to contact the Committee. In the meantime, they are going forward with fundraising to rehabilitate the popular landmark.

The sale of \$5 decals got off to a brisk start, but has slowed somewhat. Now that summer has passed and tourists (many of whom contributed) are also largely gone, it is suggested that it is up to those who live here year-round to get behind the campaign. Larger contributions will be gladly accepted as well. Decals are available at the Town Hall, Alton Country Supply, the Busy Corner Store, the East Alton General Store, and from any member of the Committee.

Cost estimates to replace the Bandstand run in excess of \$20,000. A warrant article at Town Meeting would affect taxes, whereas a voluntary project will achieve the same results without impacting taxes.

NEW SEPTIC RULES TAKE EFFECT IN JANUARY 1989

On January 1, 1989, State legislation takes effect requiring more stringent directives in two areas.

Expanding or converting the use of a structure or occupying an existing seasonal structure on a full-time basis will require an application to Water Supply and Pollution Control Division.

Also, the sale of any waterfront property with a sewage disposal system located within 200 feet of the lake will require a site assessment study of the sewage disposal system before the sale can go through.

Details of these new regulations are available from the office of the Building Inspector/Health Officer.


CHARLEY'S AUNT OPENS APACHE PLAYERS SEASON

NANCY ZAPPONE

Last year Nancy Zappone did what many of us have dreamed of. She took a year off from work to learn and experience something new. She gave up the comforts of her home, familiar surroundings and job at the Alton Central School and went alone to Paris, France, to study French and explore the French culture.

Through the European Studies Association Program of California, she enrolled at the Sorbonne to study conversational French and grammar and the Civilization of France, a course given in English. Her aims were to become fluent in the French language, to enjoy the beautiful museums filled with art treasures, and to interact with the French people.

During her first semester, she had a single room in a dormitory. It gave her privacy and plenty of quiet for study and allowed her to come and go as she pleased to explore her new surroundings. She didn't drive the whole time she was there, but got around well by metro, bus or walking. She walked by the Eiffel Tower many times but never got over the wonder of it. She enjoyed going to the huge old palaces that are now museums and house so many art treasures.

She loved the open market where there were not only fruits and vegetables, but rabbits and venison hanging to be sold. The French cafes were wonderful, often with a resident cat or dog roaming the premises. And, of course, there was the food. She misses the French coffee, warm loaves of French bread, the variety of good cheeses, and the delectable wines.

I asked her if she learned French cooking, too. She said it was difficult to transpose the French recipes as they use weights, grams, and litres, but she did do some cooking at the apartment.

WORLD OF SCIENCE GRANT PARTICIPANTS SELECTED

Five Alton students from grades 6,7 and 8 have been selected to launch the "Kids in the World of Science" program. A grant of \$15,000 last spring by the Governor's Committee for Excellence set up a cooperative venture for 25 students in six area schools — Alton and five schools in the Governor Wentworth Regional School District.

Alton students are Barbie McKenney from grade 6, Gerald Fifield and Mike Racine from grade 7, and Kevin Carr and Lisa Racine from grade 8. Kathy Latchaw is serving as project coordinator for the Alton phase. These highability, high-interest students will tackle individual and group projects and sharpen their skills in research, environmental science, creative problem solving and decision-making.

The award is a seed grant for one year, and it is hoped that the selected schools will continue on their own thereafter using this year's group as mentors for the next year. The students from all six schools met together at Kingswood on September 14. For three weeks of each month (after school) the group will work at Alton and then return to Kingswood once a month with the teams from the other schools to participate in seminars and workshops. At the end of the school year, the Alton students will stage a public demonstration of their findings.

PROCEDURES OUTLINED FOR RE-EVALUATION

Field representatives of United Appraisal Company are visiting homes in Alton collecting data to be used for the town-wide re-evaluation. The town of Alton has contracted with the company to conduct an appraisal of every property in Alton for purposes of equalizing the property tax base.

Because there are over 5,000 properties to visit, it is not possible to schedule an appointment for each property. The field representative will arrive announced at your door and will ask to measure and inspect your house and other outside buildings. They will not be looking for personal furnishings or decorations, nor will they be concerned with how neat the house is at the time. What they will be looking for is the number of bathrooms, bedrooms, and the structural integrity and condition of the dwelling. In short, they will be looking for the same things that you would look at if you were considering buying a home.

Each employee of the company is registered with the Police Department and Town Hall, and must be carrying a pictured identification card, as well as a letter of introduction from a town authority. If you have any doubts to the validity or identification of the person requesting to enter your home, please do not hesitate to call the police or the Town Hall to verify his or her identity.

It is important that the appraisal company have complete and accurate data before performing an appraisal on each property. If there is anything they should know about your property, let them know when they arrive for the inspection.

Your cooperation and assistance is needed for a fair appraisal of your property. If you have any questions pertaining to the procedures call 875-5111.



HISTORICAL SOCIETY RECEIVES DONATIONS

Since moving into its new home on the lower level of the Town Hall earlier this summer, the Alton Historical Society has received several donations to add to its antique collection.

Mrs. Rita Varney, niece of Captain Lawrence Beck, gave the Society a variety of photographs; a newspaper called <u>The Winnipesaukee Gazette</u>, dated 1855; several old deeds; and a booklet dated 1912, <u>Valuation of the Real and Personal Estate</u>, Alton, New <u>Hampshire</u> that was discovered in the bottom of a cardboard box.

The gift also included Town Reports from 1894 to 1944 and 1948, seven financial reports dating from 1887 to 1893, and two Belknap County reports from 1921 and 1939. It is one of the most complete collections of early Town Reports and the Society is hoping to fill in the missing reports soon.

The most impressive of these gifts from Captain Beck's estate is a poster detailing Treasure Island. The poster was published to advertise a camp called Mishe Wokwa that was active during the early 1900's. The poster is dated 1905.

Captain Beck was a familiar figure on the "Big Lake", having operated the mailboat out of Alton Bay, first in 1929. In 1941, he purchased a new boat, the "Tonimar", to deliver mail and packages to camps, islands and other stops during the summer season. Captain Beck and the mailboat retired in 1966.

Another donor, Mrs. Ida Sears, recently presented the Society with a crosscut saw that is in excellent condition. The saw was stored for many years in her barn and makes
