
TAX RATE INCREASES 33%

The cold winds of March 1988 and the enthusiastic votes of townspeople at the Annual Town Meeting and School District Meeting put in a second appearance recently as tax bills hit the mails!

The tax rate is up 33%, exactly the increase predicted by town officials and the budget committee after voters made their choices at the annual meetings.

The overall rate goes up from \$27.97 per thousand to \$37.25. Second half tax bills are due for payment without penalty by December 1. Since the first half bill was based on the previous rate, this tax bill picks up the difference for the year.

A breakdown of the rate total shows \$24.53 going to the school, \$8.02 to the town, and \$4.70 to Belknap County.

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FOCUS ON

ELWYN J. DOUBLEDAY

Elwyn J. "Dub" Doubleday of Alton is a philatelist/historian, a character in a recently published New York Times best seller he describes as a "non-fiction mystery/detective story" and the subject of a Cable News Network interview.

His records have been used by the Attorney General's office in Utah, and the FBI has sought his help here. He probably never thought that when he started his stamp business some 16 years ago, that he would be a key figure in the final breaking of the infamous "Mormon Murders" case and its prime figure: Mark Hofmann. But Doubleday's expertise helped solve the case of the man who killed two people with pipe bombs.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints began some 150 years ago. Many letters and documents from the early days were written in northeastern U.S. and new "finds" are turning up all the time. Mark Hofmann began selling documents to the LDS Church - some were complimentary and apparently some not so complimentary. Eventually he faked many documents and sold them to the church and others as genuine. He acquired a so-called "Salamander Letter" from a third party. The implication was that Doubleday had sold it for \$25.00 and when it came into Hofmann's hands, he sold it for more than \$40,000. When some of Hofmann's customers were ready to blow the whistle on him, he eliminated them with pipe bombs. He was arrested and his attorneys plea bargained for two consecutive five year to life sentences.



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




The case had been finally cracked in this small N.H. town when postage cancellations were proved incompatible with the period claimed.

All this happened a year ago, and now books are out telling the story. Gathering of Saints by Robert Lindsey has an entire chapter on Doubleday and perhaps 20-30 other references throughout the book. Other books dealing with the Hofmann story are The Mormon Murders and Salamander. "Dub" thinks that a movie will follow.

Doubleday graduated from the University of Massachusetts and while in college he caught his interest in stamps, covers and related documents. He wrote a monograph on post offices in Massachusetts. He has taught handicapped youngsters and later went to Uganda in Africa where he taught "until things" got too hot in the era of Idi Amin" and he returned to the USA, settled in Alton and started a stamp business from scratch. He now has over 2,000 customers across the U.S., many of whom he has visited and made some lasting friendships.

Philatelist or historian, it's hard to tell. One thing is for sure. He's found a way to make history come alive and meaningful. He speaks widely to stamp societies and historical societies. And this education major from college days appears to qualify as a topflite detective as well.



ALTON CUB SCOUTS JOIN NATION-WIDE FOOD DRIVE

A giant nation-wide "good turn" by the Boy Scouts of America will have an impact in every nook and cranny of America this month as Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts go door to door to solicit non-perishable food products to replenish thousands of food pantries across the nation.

"Scouting for Food" is the theme. In New Hampshire, the Daniel Webster Council reports that close to 80,000 people are "existing" at or below the poverty level and that the N.H. Food Bank which works with 185 food distribution agaencies dispenses over 650,000 pounds of food each year to hungry people.

Cub Scout Fack 53 will be Alton's participant in this program. The plan calls for the Cubs in pairs each accompanied by an adult to visit Alton homes and place a bag with information on door knobs between 1 and 3p.m. on Saturday, November 12. Then they will return on Saturday, November 19, to pick up the container. If not home, people can hang the container on their door. Canned goods and non-perishable foods only are sought. The N.H. National Guard is setting up reception centers, and adult volunteer Scouters from throughout the State will do the sorting and packing.

The local pack is sponsored by the American Legion and is led by Cubmaster John Irving, who announces that their special activity for November will be a bowling party on the 12th following the food bag distribution.

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

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ARTISTS IN RESIDENCE BROADEN SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Alton Central School has received grants from the New Hampshire State Council on the Arts and the Alton School Board to continue its Artists in Residence program.

At present, twelfth graders are working with Poet Marie Harris. Teacher Mary Christy, instrumental in obtaining the grants, says that students respond very differently when working with the artists. They have learned a new perspective and appreciation of poetry this fall.

In November-December, Andrew Schwartz, a well-known juggler, will be working with the children in kindergarten through grade 4. He will strive to teach them hand and eye coordination in a very entertaining way. On Friday, December 2, at 10a.m., he will perform at a school assembly and the public is invited.

James Patrick Kelly, a science-fiction writer, will come to Alton in December-January. He will instruct grades ? and 11 in science-fiction as literature. With the 5th and 6th graders he will deal with the relationship between science-fiction and society.

In January, poet Elizabeth Kirschner will return to the Alton School. Mrs.Christy and she received a \$1,000 grant to write a Curriculum Collaboration on Poetry and the seniors will be using that.

And finally, in May, Dr. Linda Morley will share her knowledge of folklore. She will compare folklore with the mythology that the 10th graders are studying and she will teach 4 graders about folklore in New Hampshire to go with the other information they are learning about their state this year.


These exciting additions to the regular curriculum give students a broader experience in school.

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
