NEW SCHOOL FACILITIES DEDICATED IN CEREMONY

Four Alton people were honored by the School Board last month when major additions to the Alton Central School were dedicated to them. Board Chairman David J. McKenney announced the selections during the ceremony held in the Recital Room on November 16.

The fine arts facility, housing music and art rooms, was dedicated to the late John Laurence Bucher, a former teacher. The physical education/athletic facility was dedicated to the late Dan Francis, a student/athlete who graduated in 1986.

Former Elementary Resource Center Aide Mary Batchelder was honored by the dedication of the elementary facilities to her and the science facility was dedicated to current teacher Ted Bense.

Assistant Superintendent Sherwood W. Fluery, who was the school principal during the planning and construction stages of the additions, recognized the efforts of the students, teachers, school board members and citizens who contributed to the expansion program. He also described the many, now humorous, incidents and situations created by the construction that made last year one that he said he will never forget. He credited the extraordinary efforts of students, teachers, and support staff for helping each other get through the difficult year.

Principal George Rogers accepted the facilities from the School Board and Charles Downie, president of the Alton Teachers' Association, and Stephen Burke, president of the Student Council, expressed appreciation and gratitude to the citizens of Alton for their support of the project.

Guest speaker Charles Marston, deputy commissioner of the NH Department of Education, congratulated the community on its commitment to education.

Superintendent of Schools F. Andre Paquette was the master of ceremonies for the program that also included a trumpet solo of the National Anthem by sophomore Archie Thibeault, a rendition of "The Greatest Love of All" by Elizabeth Lent, English teacher and drama director, and the invocation and benediction by the Reverend Dwight Meader of the Community Church.

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BUDGET COMMITTEE SCHEDULES HEARINGS

Annual Budget Committee hearings for fiscal year 1989 got underway on November 10 as the first step of a trail leading up to the March town and school district annual meetings.

At press time, December meetings, all at the Town Hall starting at 7 p.m., include the following: December 1 - Conservation Commission, Cemeteries, Fire Department, Parks and Playgrounds, and Library; December 8 - Landfill, Highway Department, Town Offices, Debt Services/Insurance, and miscellaneous budgets; December 15 - Petition Articles and Special Articles.

Still to be scheduled after the first of the year are the School budget and public hearings on the School budget, the Selectmen's budget and Petition and Special Articles. The January issue of <u>Main Street</u> will publish the schedule.

Residents are encouraged to attend these public meetings to seek answers to questions they may have prior to casting their votes at the annual meetings.

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ALTON STUDENTS FORM LOCAL SADD CHAPTER

A group of students at Alton Central School has formed a local chapter of Students Against Driving Drunk (SADD) and is in the process of expanding the membership and planning chapter activities.

President of the organization is Rori Boyce. Other officers are Sara Woods, vice-president; Jessie Miller, treasurer; and Carol Young, secretary. Health Teacher Brenda Meehan is the chapter advisor.

SADD was begun 1982 at the Wayland, MA, High School by Robert Anastas, director of health education, as the outcome of a course on the issues of drinking and driving offered to sophomores. The goals of the organization are to help eliminate the drunk driver and save lives, to alert high school students of the dangers of drinking and driving, to conduct community alcohol awareness programs, and to organize peer counseling programs to help students who may have concerns about alcohol.

According to Boyce, "there are currently about 25 members who all agree on one point, to save just one life would be enough to make it all worthwhile."

A 7p.m. Church Christmas Party will be sponsored by the Advent Christian Church on December 10. Christmas Day services will be the same as the regular Sunday schedule.


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FOCUS ON:

FLORENCE HOLWAY

"Best of Fair" reads the art category award in Florence Holway's rambling and delightful 19th century farmhouse on New Durham Road in Alton. It's the Rochester Fair of September 1988, but it's just one of six such awards over recent years, leading her granddaughter to say: "Let somebody else have a chance, Grandma!"

And literally while writing this story, the exciting word comes through from the New Hampshire Art Association's 42nd annual show in the Currier Museum in Manchester that she has won the Miriam Sawyer Memorial Award for painting! The award will be presented at a reception to be held there on December 9. The exhibition will continue through January 14, 1989, at the Currier Museum.





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This unusual lady's art career dates back to the Belmont, Massachusetts, schools when the "Palmer Method" of handwriting was the in thing. So great was her interest and skill that her fourth grade teacher rewarded her completion of the challenging writing exercises in the morning by letting her sketch and draw all afternoon on many a schoolday. And she's been drawing and sketching ever since. And painting with oils and water colors.

A hoped-for matriculation at Skidmore College and a biology career was kayoed by the depression. Instead she graduated from the Massachusetts College of Art in 1937 and many years later from Keene State College as a teacher. "My children practically put me through college with their cooperation," she


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adds. "I promised them we would somehow get a barn someplace. They loved cars and mechanical things and needed a place to spread out." They all came to Alton in 1963, and sure enough it was the barn attached to the home that won their hearts. She taught in Farmington and along the way in Pelham, Nottingham and Somersworth in New Hampshire and Lockhart and Maxwell in Texas among other places. Her children include four grown sons and one grown daughter, one of whom lives next door to her in Alton.

She helped the war effort with paintings of human organs in medical art at Massachusetts General Hospital in 1942. Her work was used throughout the nation in those prepenicillin days when sulfa drugs were in high use. Her talents are many!...prize-winning quilts, 18 years of raising sheep with the wool taken to Maine for blankets, activities director of a nursing home in Rochester, purchaser of services and goods with her art work, and most of all a devoted and loving mother of five and a very special grand-mother and greatgrandmother.

"Diary in pictures" is the way she describes much of her collection. She documented every step of her children's years with collages of drawings and watercolors. Sometimes it covered one day in the life of a child and was entitled "Story of His Day from 6 AM On." There is an endless collection of portraits and portfolios throughout her home. And one gets the impression in talking with this exciting and youthful lady that there is much ahead. Everywhere she has gone, she sketches and draws. She still does!

For two years she lived as she calls it "on the pulse of the world" in New York. She has had commissions throughout the northeast and has exhibited on Cape Cod and in many locations, including New Hampshire Art Association shows. Alton is much richer for her decision to come here some 25 years ago. This scribe continues to be thrilled at the number of talented and special people who now call Alton home, and artist Florence Holway would have to be very high on that list!

VOLLEYBALL TEAMS HAS 10 AND 4 SEASON


