PARKING AND LAUNCHING AFFECTED BY NEW RULES

The Board of Selectmen have recently adopted three new town ordinances affecting the Bay and related areas.

One will ban boat trailer parking in Alton Bay and on both sides of Route 11 beginning on Memorial Day. Parking will be available on town property next to the Highway Department building on Letter S Road.

A second ordinance will make Letter S Road a limited access highway, Memorial Day through Columbus Day, from Route 140 to Route 11. Residents of the road will have freedom to drive in either direction. All others, including those with boat trailers, must observe one-way traffic from Route 11 to Route 140.

These ordinances are expected to ease overcrowding of the limited parking available from Busy Corner west and remove some of the hazards experienced with trailer parking in the area.

The third ordinance establishes a fee system for the Public Boat Launch on specific days between Memorial Day and Columbus Day. A \$10 fee will be paid each time a person launches a boat during the following enforcement hours: Fridays - 4 to 8p.m.; Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays - 7:30a.m. to 3:30p.m.

Alton residents will pay no fee, providing a Landfill sticker is affixed to the driver's side window of the towing vehicle. Any boat and trailer combination exceeding 30 feet in length will be prohibited. A special police officer will be responsible for collecting all boat launch fees. The penalty for breach of the ordinance shall be a violation and a fine up to \$100.

CHECKLIST SUPERVISORS IN SESSION MAY 31

The Supervisors of the Checklist will be in session at the Alton Town Hall from 7 to 9p.m. on Tuesday, May 31. The purpose of the session is to allow registered voters an opportunity to change their declared party affiliation for the state primary election on September 13.

RECYCLING ORDINANCE PASSED BY SELECTMEN

ALUMINUM CANS FIRST PRIORITY

Mandatory recycling of aluminum cans will begin Monday, May 23, at the Alton Landfill as the first step in a program authorized by the recent Town Meeting. The selectmen passed an ordinance on April 18 that outlines the recycling program, clarifies the rules and regulations for use of the Landfill, and details penalties for misuse of the facility.

Aluminum cans must be separate from all other solid waste and deposited in a designated area. From there the cans will be compacted, bailed and sold. The program will expand on June 17 when all corrugated cardboard and newspapers will be collected separately and bailed for resale. All recycled materials must be dry and free of food waste and other garbage.

Anyone who refuses to cooperate with the new rules runs the risk of losing their privilege of using the Landfill. Selectmen expect widespread cooperation with the program that received little opposition during the Town Meeting.

The ordinance is the end result of a major fact-finding and alternatives-seeking effort by the Landfill Study Committee led by Ted Cole. Other members of the Committee are Bob Calvert and Steve Dana.

Beginning July 1, all materials brought to the Landfill in open vehicles must be covered or enclosed to reduce wind-blown debris throughout the area. The responsibility for cleaning up any loose debris will belong to the driver of the vehicle.

The ordinance also details limitations and rules for depositing other household solid waste including furniture and mattresses, scrap metal, brush and clean wood, construction and demolition materials, oil, and hazardous wastes.

Copies of the complete ordinance are available from the Selectmen's Office.

Poppies, the symbol of rememberance of the lives lost in World War I, will be offer-

ed by members of the American Legion Auxil-iary Unit #72 on Saturday, May 7, at local stores.

The memorial poppy is not only a personal tribute to the dead but it also honors the living veteran and helps with rehabilitation work.

Each nine-piece poppy is made by vete-



rans in Auxiliary-sponsored shops that supplement physical and psychological therapy needed by hospitalized and disabled veterans. The poppy is never sold by auxiliary members, but given in exchange for a contribution.

The poppy program has been a part of Auxiliary programs for more than 65 years. It has been estimated that approximately 25 million Americans wear the poppy to honor America's war dead and veterans, contributing nearly \$2 million for rehabilitation and welfare programs.

A SURPRISE TRIBUTE FOR MARION AND LEO

Over 280 people gathered at the Foxy Johnnie Restaurant on Monday, April 11, to pay tribute to Marion and Leo MacDonald in a surprise testimonial.

Selectman Bob Calvert presided over an evening of tributes, recollections, gifts, anecdotes, history, stories, jokes, and a visit from Santa!

The MacDonalds, founders of the Alton Volunteer Ambulance Service, arrived in the ambulance under the impression they were responding to an emergency at the Restaurant. Instead they were greeted by a standing ovation from their family, friends and neighbors from Alton and New Durham.

The ceremonies were conducted in Town Meeting fashion in recognition of Marion's position as Town Moderator. Each speaker and presentation was introduced as a warrant article to be voted upon by those attending.

Ed Sullivan presented a history of the MacDonalds noting that they started their affiliation with Alton 33 years ago when they bought the farm on Valley Road, using it on weekends until they moved here permanently in 1961. They soon became involved in many community organizations including the Snowmobile Club, the Alton Police Association, the Alton-New Durham Lions Club, St. Joan of Arc Church, the Snowmobile Club, ice buggy racing, the Alton Fire Department, the Alton Lioness Club, the Alton Fireflies, Main Street, and the Ambulance Service.

Marion has been a member of the Alton School Board, served as Town Treasurer, and continues to moderate the annual Town Meeting and annual School District Meeting. Leo was Town Constable for many years and they both were special officers for the Alton Police Department. They are less known for the many kindnesses they extend to those in need or those who are alone through their program of Christmas Day dinners and other less publicized efforts of service to their neighbors.

Among the many gifts and tributes were a photo of President Ronald Reagan signed, "To Marion and Leo MacDonald, With Best Wishes", and a flag flown in their honor over the Capitol. These were obtained by Congressman

State Senator George E. Freese, Jr., presented a commendation signed by himself and Governor John H. Sununu. 


SCIENCE FAIR PROJECTS AND NEW FACILITIES ON DISPLAY MAY 11



BOSTON POST CANE CASE PRESENTED TO SELECTMEN


