LIBRARY RAISING \$6000 FOR PBS COLLECTION

The Gilman Library needs your help! The Library has the unique opportunity to purchase an outstanding collection of PBS videos which include "A Walk Through the 20th Century with Bill Moyers", "The Living Planet", "The Brain", and "Heart of the Dragon".

This Library Video Classics Project, offered by the John D. and Catherine T. Mac-Arthur Foundation, allows public libraries across the nation to acquire more than 200 hours of educational programs(20 series) for \$6000. The cost of these videos has been reduced from \$60,000 by the Foundation to courage library purchase. Also, the Foundation is providing gift labels, affixed to cassettes, to acknowledge an individual, group, foundation or corporation that makes a contribution toward the cost of acquiring the series. Each cassette costs \$30 with a series ranging from \$210 to \$390. For example, "Shakespeare's Plays" cost \$210; Claudius", \$390; "Ascent of Man", \$390; "The Brain", \$240.

The Trustees of the Library have pledged \$1000 toward this goal and are now turning to the community to seek its participation in this project.

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

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
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TOWN PERMIT FEES INCREASED BY SELECTMEN

In an effort to help make the Building Inspector/Health Officer function self-sustaining and relieve the taxpayer burden, the Board of Selectmen recently increased several permit fees.

A recap shows that there is no change in the basic building permit fee of \$10 and \$1 per thousand of estimated value. But \$20 fees will now be required for each of the following permits: plumbing, electrical, well, sanitary, sign and driveway permits. A required certificate of occupancy will also cost \$20 as will a site review.

All re-inspections, when required because work is not completed satisfactorily as scheduled, will cost \$25.

WORK BEGUN TO UPDATE 1985 ALTON MASTER PLAN

A 12-month work schedule has been established by the Town Planner and Planning Board for a complete update of the 1985 Alton Master Plan. Closely related will be eventual recommendations for change in the Town Zoning Ordinance for the well-ordered growth and development of the community.

State requirements, since adoption of the last Master Plan, now call for a section dealing with housing with an emphasis on "affordable housing". In addition, there must be a local water resources management and protection plan as a component of the conservation and preservation section. A third new requirement deals much more specifically with transportation and roads. The updated Master Plan must be adopted by the Planning Board and in place before major changes in zoning can be considered.

Nancy Mayville has been designated chair of a committee to implement the schedule and Kenneth Chamberlain will represent the Flanning Board. Many others will be named as the work progresses. Much public input will be sought, and four special subcommittees will be named to deal with: Housing, Land Use, Conservation and Community Facilities. Surveys will be circulated to all residents after workshops have focused on and scoped out community problems and potential solutions.

A public input workshop will launch the program later this summer, building on earlier issue identification by existing town departments and committees. The Lakes Region Planning Commission is being contracted to provide technical and professional services in preparation of the updated Master Plan.

"READING NATURALLY", ADMIRALS, PUPPETS, and RURAL NH IN THE 30's

OPENING LECTURE

"Admirals, Surveyor Generals, Timber Barons, and Conservationists: The Changing Forest of Northern New England" is the title of the first lecture of the summer season. The program will be presented by William L. Taylor of Plymouth State College.

The forests of New England have played a variety of roles for the English, the colonists, and later for the independent republic. Seen as a strategic resource (the mast pines), a sign of soil fertility for land to be converted to agriculture, and as a commercially marketable product, the region's forest resources have been and remain an integral part of the region's history.

FRILLY FROG

Beth Katz and her Red Rug Puppet Theater will perform at the Library at 11a.m. on

Monday, July 18. The ten puppets in the cast will present "Frilly Frog and the Mystery of the Missing Library Book". This action-packed cops and robbers thriller is geared to elementary school patrons. It features a unique dancing puppet stage which acts as the hiding place for the puppeteer who creates all the voices and movements of the puppets and props.

RURAL NEW HAMPSHIRE

Lawrence M. Banaquist and David R.Leinster of Keene State College present "Through the Eye of the Camera: The Changing Rural World of New Hampshire in the Thirties".

This documentary film used archival 16mm film footage shot in southwestern NH during the late 1920's and early 1930's juxtaposed with modern color footage of the same locales and events in the 1980's. The filmakers look at the changes in population, education, transportation, work and leisure over the years, and at the staggering effect of the Depression on rural economy and autonomy.

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

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COMMON FIREWORKS BANNED IN ALTON

The Board of Selectmen adopted an ordinance on June 6, 1988, effectively banning the sale and use of common fireworks in Alton. The State Legislature had recently approved enabling legislation for such sale and use and had overridden Governor Sununu's veto. Several towns are taking similar action. The ordinance does not affect past and current approval of Class B public displays by organizations qualified to handle such displays on special town occasions, when specific approval is given.

The ordinance reads in part: "That it is the policy of the Town of Alton that no official of the town shall grant to any person a permit for the retail sale of any fireworks pursuant to RSA 160-A:2,IV(a), and further that no official of the town shall issue permits for the purchase, possession, or display of Class C common fireworks pursuant to RSA 160-A:2,III."

Failure to comply can result in a fine of not more than \$250.




