

Erma E.Thoroughgood is 80 years old but you would never know it from her youthful appearance and effervescent manner! She came to Alton in 1928 from Presque Isle, Maine for a vacation that has never ended. She says she married the third person she met in Alton on August 4, 1928, the late Wesley Thoroughgood. up visit by this reporter proved a thoroughly delightful and informative experience.

So what was it like here in 1928 and the next several years?

"It was a beautiful little town, treelined on both sides of the streets until the hurricane." And it was a prosperous and very self-sufficient town. "You didn't have to go out of town to buy clothing, food or entertainment...anything!" Ayers Dry Goods Store, where Dazer's Pizza now is. very popular store. Allie Miller had a store where the Village Video is located. Later it became an I.G.A. There was a Cloverdale (later First National) owned Everett and Daisy Rines. Archie Horne had a "very complete clothing store with items for the youngest child to the oldest adult for both winter and summer, shoes...everything!" The Blacks came to town and ran the I.G.A. Store and the clothing store which Horne gave up to devote time to his judicial duties. Where the power company is now located was the garage and auto sales operation of Judge Carl Wyman. Chester Littlefield had a store where the Alton Village 5 & 10 is now. Upstairs was the Grange Hall. Next door was Tanguay's Barber Shop, and the basement housed a bowling alley where Erma's

husband set pins by hand in the pre-automatic days.

Where the Union Telephone building sits used to be Varney's convalescent home. The site of the present Gilman Museum was the location of the Alton Shoe Factory which burned to the ground in December of 1930. Raymond Duncan and his father ran the then White Mountain Light Company.

Mrs. Thoroughgood continues with nostalgic animation, reliving the glory days of Alton and the period in which she raised her family here. The daily train in each direction was nicknamed the "Corn Popper". Our new police station is now on the roadbed of the tracks which went on to Wolfeboro and Laconia in one direction and Rochester



The railroad turntable was on the site of the present Blue Jay Miniature Golf Course. buses ran When the trains stopped running, for several years from Dover to Alton and Laconia and Wolfeboro. With the advent of more and more automobiles, buses also continued running. Erma ran "Dapper Dan" Lynch's Dan's at the Bay and recalls his extensive mail boat routes on the lake. The Lynches built the old skating rink, and her sparkle as she recounts the many "big name bands" which played there in that period.

and Dover to the southeast. The Catholic

Church is on the old roadbed as well. She recalled that at least four Altonians worked

on the railroad: Ken Chamberlain Sr., Wesley

The Town Hall was a beehive of activity in those days. All sorts of events were held there. Wednesday nights featured wrestling - always local folk such as the Cloughs, Thoroughgoods, Primes, Barneses, and the three Locke boys. Friday nights were dedicated to dancing, and Saturdays featured movies. "And they used all town talent to put on great minstrel shows. Nobody ever had to go out of town for entertainment. The children loved it." She stresses that in her opinion children had more to do in those days than today in Alton and that discipline was better.

School was something else too! With dirt roads "kids were brought to school in wintertime on canvas-covered bobsleds with kerosene heaters in the center to keep the kids warm." She thinks the winters are

getting better "because the universe is turning." She recalled snow removal of that day as a matter of "horses flattening the snow by pulling big rollers. When the snow was too deep for the horses, men would shovel the horses' feet out so they could go on."

She recalls with a smile that sugar was two cents a pound, bread three loaves for a quarter, and hamburg three pounds for a \$1. A 100-pound bag of cattle feed went for 45 cents. "It's a whole different world today." Erma never used a babysitter in her whole life. Nobody did then. She always did her own sewing for her young children, and she came by it naturally from watching her dressmaker mother.

It's fun to reminisce and look back at the town or city of our youth or early adulthood. Sometimes it's sad because change is everywhere. "Progress" takes its toll. But it's especially enjoyable and enlightening for those of us who more recently call Alton "home" to visit with this lovely lady and take that look back even if it's only second—hand.




