# AGENDAS SET FOR ANNUAL MEETINGS

That's right, it's plural! MEETINGS! It's important to recognize that the 1989 taxes will derive from three sources: (1) action taken at the 1989 Annual Town Meeting on WEDNESDAY, MARCH 15, at 7p.m. at the Alton Central School; (2) action taken at the 1989 Annual School District Meeting at 1p.m. on SATURDAY, MARCH 18, also at the Alton Central School; and (3) Alton's assigned share of the Belknap County taxes.

At press time, the town portion appears headed for an 8.5% increase, if approved. The school portion is expected to be 18%, if approved, and the county assignment is projected at around 8%.

Action taken at these two meetings will not affect the June 1989 tax billing, but will first impact the November 1989 bill and will include all 1989 increases.

All residents are urged to attend both meetings to participate in these important events.

24 CANDIDATES FILE FOR TOWN AND SCHOOL POSTS

On Tuesday, March 14, voters will be asked to choose from among 24 candidates for 18 town and school positions.Statements were requested from each of the candidates for publication in <u>Main Street</u> and those that were received may be found in this issue.

Also, all candidates have been invited to a "Meet Your Candidates" Night at the Alton Central School at 7:30p.m. on Wednesday, March 8.The program, sponsored by <u>Main Street</u> and moderated by Ted Cole, will be held in the School's Recital Hall. (Please use the Pine Street entrance.)

Marion L. MacDonald and A. James Martin are seeking the Selectman's post and four candidates have filed for the two positions on the School Board. They are Rita Essig, David McKenney, Stanley Moulton, and Archie Thibeault.

In other races, Virginia Dore and Steven W. Rollins compete for Cemetery Trustee, Dávid Countway and Virginia Dore for Library Trustee, Robert Sederquist Jr. and John Streeter for Water Commissioner, and David Jensen and Robert Reinholz for Fire Ward.

Running unchallenged are Joseph Houle for Trust Funds Trustee, Joseph Bristol and Kenneth Chamberlain for the three-year posts on the Planning Board, William Bunker and Donald R. MacDonald for the two-year posts on the Planning Board, Cynthia Watkins for a three-year position on the Budget Committee, and Kim Kroeger for the two-year position on the Budget Committee.

Marion MacDonald also is running for School Moderator, Gwendolyn Jones for School Clerk, and Shirley Young for School Treasurer. Each is unapposed.

No candidates filed for the one-year position on the Planning Board, or two of the three-year positions on the Budget Committee.

Also on the ballot are six amendments to the Zoning Ordinances proposed by the Planning Board. This represents a substantial reduction from the number of amendments originally proposed by the Board due to public opinion offered at the public hearings.

The concert will feature the piano duo of Katherine Dornin and George Loring performing serious works for piano ensemble. familiar operatic and musical theater transcriptions, and contemporary duets.

Dornin is on the piano faculty of both St.Paul's Preparatory School and the Concord Community Music School in Concord and teach-



es at the Notre Dame Community Music School in Manchester. She is currently organist and choirmaster at St. James Episcopal Church in Laconia and pianist with the Philomel Camerata flute, voice, and piano trio. Dornin was instrumental in founding the Doris Shuster Concert Series at the Belknap Mill in Laconia.



# PLAYGROUND FUNDING SOUGHT BY COMMITTEE

A professional playground architect will be in Alton on Thursday, March 25, to meet with students and teachers during the day and with interested parents and other residents at a 7p.m. meeting at the School.

The visit will be an opportunity to receive advice on the planning, funding and building a new playground for elementary students.

The Committee has raised over \$2500 for the project and currently has a cookbook being published to be sold as a fundraiser. The Alton-New Durham Lions Club has pledged the proceeds of its 1989 Penny Sale and Jamboree on Saturday, April 15, to the project. Dazer's Pizza is running a promotion in which they will donate money from their March pizza sales to the playground fund.

# VOTERS TO CONSIDER WARRANT ARTICLES

On Wednesday, March 15, at 7p.m. at the Alton Central School, several articles on the 1989 warrant will be considered by Alton voters. The total value of these articles is down 8% from those presented at the 1988 meeting.

Road maintenance and Landfill needs head the list of larger items. \$148,000 is proposed for road construction and highway equipment. Landfill articles seek \$142,000, including \$50,000 each for escrow toward the eventual Landfill closing costs and the establishment of a transfer station or other successor to the Landfill after its closing. \$32,000 is asked for waste removal (scrap metal, mattresses, tires, etc.) and \$10,000 for potential costs of membership in a solid waste district. All NH cities and towns must have an approvable 20-year solid waste plan by October 1, 1989.

Other special articles will seek \$25,000 to rebuild the bandstand on the water in the bay;\$15,000 for a new police cruiser;\$12,000 to resurface and blacktop the Central Fire Station parking lot; \$27,000 to complete upgrading of the Town Hall; \$8,000 for painting the Alton Bay Community House and the bandstand in the parking lot; \$3,000 for waterproofing the lower level of the Gilman Library;\$12,000 for rebuilding the swim dock on the west side of the bay; and \$5,000 as a matching grant for energy conservation.

Ongoing organizational requests include the Chamber of Commerce,Lakes Region Community Health Organization, membership in the Lakes Region Planning Commission, Community Action Program, Visiting Nurse Association, and Lakes Region Association. They total \$26,231. New organization requests include: Harbor House Children's Shelter at \$750, Lakes Region Community Service at \$600, and Lakes Region General Hospital at \$1,000.

Two petition articles seek funds:\$20,000 for seed money toward rehabilitation of the Pearson Road Community and Senior Citizen Center and \$1,900 toward legal fees of a ci-

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tizen's group. One article would, via recent State enabling legislation, ask the transfer of future land use change taxes into a "conservation fund" rather than going into the general fund as now prevails.Non-funding petition articles include appointment of Planning Board members rather than election as current members' terms expire and discontinuance of the current residence tax.

Articles from the Selectmen include: authorization to grant easements to leasees and abutters for adequate septic systems; authorization to enact an alarm ordinance; and a determination if the town wishes to consider offering long-term leases (20 years or more) on town-owned land in Alton Bay. Traditionally up to a five-year renewable lease has been the practice.

At the School District Meeting on Saturday, March 18, at 1p.m., three warrant articles will be proposed: \$60,000 for replacement of the section of the elementary roof installed in 1973; \$30,000 for replacement of the 1956 oil tank (one of two existing); and \$34,000 for removal of asbestos where it exists in the School. A petition article calls for \$4,000 for playground equipment. One non-funding warrant article proposed by the School Board would seek the voters' opinions about studying the feasibility of withdrawal from SAU 51.

# STUDENTS WIN AWARDS IN ART EXHIBITIONS



MANY BILLS CONSIDERED



Bills that are passed by one chamber are then sent to the other chamber.


Under consideration are bills concerning seat belts for children up to 12 years old, jet ski use,rules concerning the taking of racoons, rabies shots for cats, Martin Luther King Day, raising the minimum wage to \$4 per hour,repeal of moose hunting, current use law changes,future of biennial sessions, parental consent for abortions for minors, and a centrally located educational resource center for workshops, seminars, and professional meetings.




### HAND CHIMES RING OUT AT COMMUNITY CHURCH By Jeanne Cole

There is a new joyful noise in Alton! Last summer members of the Community Church decided to reactivate the hand bell choir. With memorial funds, they were able to order three octaves of Schulmerich English hand bells.

Under the direction of Phyllis Chamberlain, three different groups have been rehearsing every week since October. There are ten young people in the seventh through the twelfth grades who make up the Merrymeeting Music Makers, and nine adults, ranging in age from 20 to 80, belong to the Merrymeeting Hand Bells. Fourth through sixth graders are called the Merrymeeting Chimers.

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

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VISITING NURSES OFFER "WELCOME BABY" PROGRAM

A "Welcome Baby" program will be available for first-time parents in Alton beginning in April.

The purpose of the program is to provide emotional support, information on child behavior and development and guidance to first-time parents during their first year of parenthood. The program is available to parents residing in Carroll County and the town of Alton. Upon acceptance into the program, each family will be assigned a volunteer who will then be available until the child's first birthday.

Volunteers will be given 12 hours of training to prepare for the assistance their assigned family may need. A commitment of approximately three hours per week from each volunteer will be expected.

Training will be provided by the Visiting Nurse Association of Wolfeboro and Vicinity and the Children and Youth Project of Mt.Washington Valley. The Carroll County Retired Senior Volunteers Program will assist with the recruitment and coordination of volunteers, while the NH Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect will provide technical assistance for the program.




