## MARION MacDONALD MCKENNEY & MOULTON

Marion MacDonald defeated A. James Martin for the three-year Selectman vacancy by a 664-125 vote. MacDonald has served the past ten years as the Town Moderator.

In the School Board race, Stanley Moulton received 477 votes and David McKenney got 427 votes to defeat Archie Thibeault (241) and Rita Essig (210) for the two three-year vacancies. McKenney ran as the incumbent while Moulton returns to the Board after a year's absence.

768 "in person" votes and 53 absentee ballots for a total of 821 were cast in the town and school elections on March 14. The turnout was 32.3% of the 2,543 voters on the checklist.

In other races, Steve Rollins (426) defeated Virginia Dore(305) for Cemetery Trustee. David Countway was re-elected Library Trustee by 450-305 over Virginia Dore. John Streeter (533) defeated Robert D. Sederquist Jr. (226) for Water Commissioner. David Jensen (515) won the Fire Ward seat over Robert Reinholz (233).

Running unapposed were Joseph Houle (693) for Trustee of Trust Funds, Kenneth Chamberlain (635) and Joe Bristol (407) for three-year Planning Board seats, Donald MacDonald (458) and William Bunker (428) for the two-year seats on the Planning Board, Cynthia Watkins (693) for a three-year Budget Committee position, and Kim Kroeger (602) for the two-year seat on the Budget Committee.

Write-in winners were Warren Harris(83) over Nancy Mayville (56) for the one-year seat on the Planning Board, and Warren Nott (80) and Evelyn Nardo (54) for the remaining two-year positions on the Budget Committee.

Other School District winners, all unapposed, were Marion MacDonald as School District Moderator with 736 votes, Gwendolyn Jones as School District Clerk with 742, and Shirley Young as School District Treasurer with 711 votes.

## \$3.5 MILLION APPROVED AT SCHOOL MEETING

Approximately 100 voters attending the 1989 Annual School District Meeting on Saturday, March 18, approved all articles on the warrant and voted expenditures of \$3,534,040 for the 1989-90 school year. The increase is approximately 17% over the amount voted last year.

Included in the total were four special articles: \$60,000 to replace the roof on the primary wing of the school; \$30,000 to replace the 1954 oil tank installed during the original school construction; \$34,400 for asbestos abatement in the boiler room; and \$4,000 (by petition) to help complete the school playground. A budget amendment from the floor for \$9,600 to arrange for gymnasium ventilation was approved. Only the roof repair was recommended by the Budget Committee.

In another article, the voters present authorized the Alton School Board to complete a study already underway to determine the "educational and financial desirability of withdrawing from SAU 51 and forming a single district SAU." The article requires a public hearing on the findings of the study and a vote at the 1990 Annual District Meeting.



### ANNUAL TOWN MEETING ADDRESSES 29 ARTICLES

Alton voters met in the Alton School Gym on Wednesday, March 15, to act on the 1989 Town Warrant that included 29 Articles.

All but five of the articles passed and a total budget of \$2,083,971 was approved.

Major items relating to the Landfill included \$50,000 to establish a reserve fund for closing the Landfill, \$50,000 to establish a reserve fund for a waste disposal alternative once the Landfill is closed,

\$10,000 to comply with RSA 149, and \$32,000 to remove scrap metal, mattresses, and tires from the Landfill.

\$83,000 was authorized for road construction, \$25,000 to rebuild the Bandstand located in the water, and \$65,000 for Highway Department equipment.

Other money articles passed were \$15,000 for a police cruiser, \$12,000 for paving the Central Fire Station parking lot, \$8,000 to paint the Alton Bay Community Center, \$3,000 for waterproofing the Library foundation, \$12,000 to rebuild the Alton Bay Swimming Dock, \$20,000 for septic at the Pearson Road property, and \$32,000 for the operation of the Gilman Library.

Town Hall improvements that include upgrading the electrical system, work on the fire alarm system and steeple roof, and constructing new judge's chambers were approved for a total amount of \$27,000. \$10,000 was approved for energy conservation measures in Town Hall contingent upon an offsetting grant of \$5,000 from the Governor's Energy Office.

Organizations that received funds are Harbor House Children's Shelter (\$750).Lakes Region Community Service (\$600), Alton-Alton Bay Chamber of Commerce (\$1,500), Lakes Region Association (\$1,407), Community Action Program (\$3,597), Visiting Nurses Association of Wolfeboro and Vicinity (\$11,275), Lakes Region Community Health (\$3,800), and Lakes Region Planning Commission (\$4,652).

Four of the articles that were denied by voters would have had fiscal impact. One was to eliminate the annual resident tax.

another would have authorized \$1,000 for the support of Lakes Region General Hospital, another would have reimbursed a group of citizens for legal fees used in their litigations with M. Khruso/Bayview, and the fourth would have placed the revenues collected from the Land Use Change Tax in a conservation fund.

Voters authorized the Selectmen to grant septic easements to lessees, users, and abutters to the Town-owned lands in Alton Bay, to offer long-term leases of Townowned property, and to adopt an ordinance regulating private alarm systems.

A proposal to return to a system of appointment of members of the Planning Board rather than by election was defeated.

Other routine articles to borrow monies, seek grants and hear reports were approved.


The meeting concluded with a salute to retiring Selectman Russell Jones by Selectman Robert Calvert.

wide margins. The petition to rezone a parcel of land on Route 28 failed by 288-447. All six zoning amendments proposed by the Planning Board passed with No. 3 winning by a single vote. This requires that any type of condominium conversion project receive a special exception and Planning Board approval and deletes some criteria for Planning Board approval for new construction. All 18 Building Regulation amendments passed by comfortable margins.

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### REAPPRAISAL ENTERING FINAL STAGES

Representatives from the United Appraisal Company will be driving by each property in Alton in the next couple of months making sure that all the data collected in the summer, and fall of 1988 is correct as shown. They also will be taking pictures of every house and efforts will be made to photograph lakefront properties, from the lake side.

It won't be necessary for the representatives to contact property owners at this time, as the data collection phase is complete and everyone has been given the opportunity to have their property inspected by one of the representatives.

If you see a person viewing your property from a car, or taking a picture of your home from the street or driveway in the coming months, it will probably be a representative from United Appraisal Company. But if you are not sure, or are alarmed, please don't hesitate to call the Alton Police or Town Hall to verify the identity of the persons in your area. A description of the individuals and their vehicles will be available for this purpose.

During mid-summer of 1989, after all the information has been correlated and verified by the company, each property owner will receive the company's opinion of value of their property through the mail. At that time property owners will be given the opportunity to discuss or dispute their values with a company appraiser. If compelling evidence is presented to contest the assigned value, adjustments will be made at that time. However, the analysis phase of the project is very thorough, and there have been many sales of properties to use as guidelines.

Other than minor data elements, experience has shown that very few adjustments are called for in the end. Every effort is being made to insure an equitable and fair appraisal for each and every property.

### ELDERLY EXEMPTION HAS EARLY DEADLINE

Based on action taken at the recent Town Meeting elections, <u>qualifying senior citizens</u> <u>must apply at the Town Hall for the new adjusted elderly exemption by April 15.</u>

To qualify, the applicant must have been a NH resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years.

In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married a combined income of less than \$12,000 and own assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence. Net assets excludes social security payments, sale of assets, life insurance payments on the death of an insured, and business expenses if a business enterprise is involved.

The new exemptions will be: 65-75 years old - \$10,000; 75-80 years old - \$15,000; and age 80 or over - \$20,000.





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
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#### TRUCK UNDERWAY RESTORATION OF MAXIM FIRE

Late last fall, a committee was formed to begin a long term restoration project on the Alton Fire Department's second oldest fire apparatus, the Maxim fire truck. This old truck has a colorful history dating back to the early 1930's and the early days of the Alton Fire Department.

Where does one find information about an antique fire truck dating back 60 years? Records in Town Hall, and interviewing firemen, active and retired, their families and friends, helped put the pieces of the puzzle together.

According to the Annual Report records of the Town of Alton, dated March 12, 1929, Article XVIII read, "to see what action the Town will take in regard to the purchase of a pump suitable for fire protection when hydrants cannot be reached. The pump to be approved by the Wards. (By petition)."

A motion by Burt L. Yorke - "it was voted that a committee be appointed by the chair to make an investigation and report at the next annual meeting as to what kind of pump for fire protection shall be purchased." The committee appointed by the Moderator was Charles A. Rollins, Herbert J.Jones, Charles H. Hanson, Herbert E. Hayes, Herman L. Barr, Oe Varney, Martin

Lynch, and Willis H. Reynolds.

One year later at the March 11, 1930, Town Meeting, Article VIII read, "to see if the Town will vote to purchase a fire pump and raise and appropriate the money necessary for the same." Charles Rollins . read the committee report and its acceptance was voted. A very lively discussion ensued. "A motion was made that the new pump should always be located at Alton Bay." Added to the motion was "that Edward H. Downing be the driver and be responsible for the proper care and operation of the apparatus."

"It was voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$7,000.00, the same to be spread over a series of years at the discretion of the selectmen."

Through extensive research, the date the Maxim fire truck was built has been

documented from the original factory work order papers. According to the documents, the truck was ordered April 3, 1930, and delivered from the Maxim Fire Apparatus Company, Middleboro, Mass., May 21, 1930. Retired fireman Judson Downing recalls travelling to Pittsfield, N.H., with his father and uncle to pick up the Maxim Fumper. Riding home on this new fire truck into Alton Village is a special memory of Mr. Downing.

The Maxim Fumper Fire Truck was always kept at the Alton Bay Hose House. With the influx of summer residents and visitors to the Camp Ground and Bay area, the truck would remain there throughout its active service years until retired in the early sixties with the arrival of two new International fire trucks.




He still has his own Dixieland band and also plays with the Freese Brothers Band and
