

The Annual Community Clean-Up Day has been set for Saturday, June 3, by the Alton-Alton Bay Improvement Committee and Chamber of Commerce. Volunteers of all ages are needed to work on the roadside areas and other public areas in Alton. Children, however, must be accompanied by an adult.

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REVALUATION NOTICES TO BE MAILED IN JULY

Alton homeowners will be receiving "the word" by mail in early July, according to Will Corcoran of United Appraisal Company. The "word" will include their evaluation of the property and guidelines for proceeding if the homeowner or property owner feels that some facts may be missing or overlooked and their evaluation is too high or too low. Experience shows that about 10% may have a question.

The procedure, in such cases, will be to schedule an informal visit with United Appraisal to share the information and to discuss possible changes.

Figures then will be finalized when presented to the Board of Selectmen, for which the present target date is August 1. If still unsatisfied, abatement requests can be filed in the normal manner. If still unsatisfied, an appeal can be made to the NH Board of Land and Tax Appeals for a ruling.

A Senior Citizens Building Fund Committee led by Chairman Evelyn Nardo is seeking support to complete the building for use by senior citizens and other organizations and community functions.


FLAG DAY EXERCISES SET FOR JUNE 14

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


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CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT AIDS ALTON POLICE

SESSION NEARING END

After nearly five months, the activity in Concord is almost over. By early June most of the bills will be on the Governor's desk for final enactment.

Of the 759 bills introduced in the House, 461 were submitted to the Senate. Of the Senate's 205 bills, 160 were sent to the House.

The Ways and Means Committee soon will have determined the final income. The Appropriations Committee will be working to fund the newly mandated money bills as well as the balance of the State obligations.

Committee work has ended except for the bills(not many) which need further study and work for next session.

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
