BARBERSHOPPERS HARMONY JAMBOREE CELEBRATES 40th ANNIVERSARY IN ALTON BAY PERFORMANCE

"WE SING THAT THEY SHALL SPEAK"

On the weekend of August 12, barbershoppers from far and wide will put a song in the air from early morning to late at night as Alton Bay again hosts the Annual Barbershopper Jamboree for the 40th year.

This annual fun and vocal harmony time means a lot to this area as a once-a-year attraction that has brought many welcome improvements. The profits from the Saturday night performance at the Alton Central School provide an additional \$600 each year to a scholarship fund with the balance, usually about \$2,000, divided between local projects such as tennis courts, bathing beach, playground, picnic area, and Phase II of the Parks and Playgrounds Recreational Development Program and the Logopedics Institute which helps children with speech problems.

The funds that make these donations possible come from ticket sales with everyone including the audience and all the workers and performers paying the same ticket price.

The committee that arranges the Jamboree each year is composed of area residents and the barbershoppers from the Nashua, NH, chapter - "The Granite Statemen".

The show begins at 7:45p.m. in the School Auditorium and features 35 to 40 different barbershop choruses and quartets from Barbershoppers - SPEBSQSA, Inc., and Sweet Adelines and Harmony, Inc., groups.

If you enjoy barbershop harmony, then Alton Bay is the place to be on Saturday, August 12. Barbershoppers and their families start gathering Friday evening at Downing's Landing where they will register, buy their show tickets, meet old and new friends and harmonize. Many return to the Landing following the performance to continue their harmonizing into the early hours of Sunday.



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PLAYGROUND CONSTRUCTION

Plans are well underway for the construction of the new Alton Central School Playground on Saturday, August 26.

With money raised and donated, the committee hired Chris Clews of Learning Structures, Inc., to design, coordinate and supply specialty materials for the playground that is intended for use by the entire community.

The committee also acquired the services of Plastic Forming Systems, a company that recycles plastic bottles into boards for use in non-weight bearing sections of the playground. Residents are asked to separate their plastic milk, water, and tonic bottles and bring them to a special container at the Landfill.

the first Mount Washington was built by the Boston and Maine Railroad in Alton Bay during 1871-72 and was the largest steamer on the lake. It had a 42 foot beam, a 12 foot draft and was 178 feet in length. Her top speed was 17 miles per hour. The captain was Fred Wiggins. On July 4, 1872, the boat made its maiden voyage stopping at Meredith, Center Harbor, Long Island and Wolfeboro before returning to its home port of Alton Bay.


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

LECTURE PROGRAMS OFFERED IN AUGUST

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
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1988 OLD HOME WEEK COUNTRY AUCTION



New Hampshire derives its name from Hampshire County in England? The name was first used in 1629 by Captain John Mason, original proprietor of this territory. In 1923, he and Fernando Gorges obtained a grant of land, partly in New Hampshire and partly in Maine, from the Council in Plymouth. They called this Laconia and sent two small parties of immigrants to settle it the following spring. These pioneers were probably victims of religious persecution, coming from the neighboring territories to the south.

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
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VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE ANNUAL FUND DRIVE

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
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SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED BY SUMMER PEOPLE

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

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

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
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
