GILMAN CONCERT OFFERS PIANO/VOICE ENSEMBLE

The second program of the Gilman Concert Series will be held Friday, January 12, in the Recital Room at the Alton Central School at 8p.m.

The concert will feature the Philomel Piano and Voice Ensemble with Catherine Dornin, piano, and Holly Outwin-Tepe, soprano. This group was formed in 1982 and is based at St. Paul's School in Concord. Ms. Dornin also teaches at the Concord Community Music School and the Notre Dame College Community Music School in Manchester.

The group explores chamber music spanning the baroque to contemporary periods. At their January 12th concert, they will perform a variety of classical and light classical selections plus a few Broadway show tunes.

This concert is free and open to the public. It is sponsored by the Gilman Lyceum Fund, the Farmington National and Savings Bank, and the Alton Central School.



The Staff Development Committee of Alton Central School is offering three graduate credit courses, two to be taught in Alton and one at Pittsfield Elementary School.



ALTON FILOT FLIES NADIA TO FREEDOM By Debby Eyler

On December 1,Ed Dadura walked into Pan Am's Vienna Operations Office much like he would before any other flight. This time would be a little different though, Nadia Comaneci was one of his passengers. She was on her flight to freedom.

Pan Am's Flight 47 started in New York, flew to Budapest, Hungary, went on to Vienna, Austria, and then returned to New York. Ed was one of the three pilots on the 10-hour leg of Vienna to New York. He found out an hour before the plane took off that Nadia had boarded the plane in Budapest and would go on to New York. Just before he found out, Ed and one of the other pilots had been discussing an article in the International Herald Tribune about the defection. The paper stated that Nadia's trail just disappeared in Budapest and nobody knew where she was.

During his break, Ed was resting in the passengers' cabin reading the paper when he became aware of someone looking over his shoulder.When he turned, he saw it was Nadia. After introducing himself, they chatted a moment. He asked her for an autograph for his daughter, Erika, an aspiring dancer. Even though she spoke English, she didn't seem to want to talk about her escape or her future plans.

Nadia's "Flight to Freedom" was made aboard an Airbus A310, or a Clipper Jet, which was coincidentally named the "Clipper Liberty Bell". These fully automated planes are the most sophisticated planes being flown commercially. They can hold up to 195 passengers, although only 150 were aboard for that flight. Pan Am, by the way, is the only U.S. company that flies into eastern Europe.

Ed and Luanne Dadura have lived in Alton for the past 21 years. While Ed has flown many dignitaries, none have been more publicized than Nadia's flight.

<u>Tuesday, February 6, at 7p.m.</u> at the Alton Central School....the proposed School Budget for 1990-91.




