## NEW TIME SCHEDULE FOR MEMORIAL DAY EVENTS

On Wednesday, May 30, the American Legion Claude R. Batchelder Post #72 will conduct the annual Memorial Day ceremonies at a later time in the day than usual.

5:30pm - All parade participants will meet at the Legion Hall.

6:00pm - Parade from Monument Square to Riverside Cemetary.

6:15pm - Riverside Cemetary Service at the Savage family grave.

6:45pm - Marchers return to the Square for a brief service to decorate World I and II tablets, Korean and Vietnam monuments.

The line of march will be led by the Legion Color Guard, following the Parade Marshall, the Board of Selectmen, Town Administrator, School Board members, State Representatives, members of the Police and Fire Departments, Claude R. Batchelder Post #72, Legion Auxiliary, Junior Auxiliary, Scouts, Brownies and Alton School children.

#### SCHOOL RECEIVES VIDEO GRANT

Alton High School has received a \$1500 grant from Community TV Corporation of Laconia for the purchase of video production equipment.

This grant is intended to encourage high school students to become actively involved in learning the many skills included in video programming. Besides the operation of the photographic hardware, such skills as writing scripts, designing and constructing sets, lighting and audio techniques need to be learned.

The School has purchased a new state-of the-art camcorder and some audio accessories Inspired by this grant, a video club has been formed under the direction of Marjorie Mohr, Library-Media Director. According to Mohr, club members will work in teams to video tape school and community events. Instruction in video technology will be incorporated into the journalism and performing arts curriculums.



#### BIG BAND SOUND AT MAY 4 CONCERT

The final program of this year's Gilman Concert Series will be held Friday, May 4, at 8pm at the Alton School Gymnasium.

This concert will feature the Freese Brothers Big Band, familiar to many in Alton because of their previous apperances here. The group has about 22 members and is known for, its renditions of the big band classics — music from the bands of Glen Miller, Count Basie and Duke Ellington. They also mix some contemporary music in with the old favorites.

Band members come from many professions and different towns in New Hampshire, but their love of music brings them together for rehearsal once a week in Concord, and they perform several times a month around the state. The musicians donate their services and the proceeds from their concerts go into the William S. Freese Memorial Scholarship Fund, providing help for young people pursuing music studies.

This concert is free and open to the public. It is sponsored by the Gilman Lyceum Fund, the Farmington National and Savings Bank, and the Alton Central School.

#### A MUD SEASON SAGA

They say there are three seasons in New England - Winter, Mud and the Fourth of July. And unless you have lived through a New England Mud Season, you don't have any idea what a season it can be!

It all starts innocently enough; the first warmish day, everybody ready to get out of the house and do spring-type activities. The boys usually head straight for the fishing gear, then the stream. Make sure everything is ok, new bridges and dams to be built. Dad heads for the baseball gloves, bats and balls. Then he spends the next half hour trying to lure the boys away from the fishing rods to play catch with him.

I, on the other hand, get that primordial impulse to clean. (I suppose cave women cleaned out their caves each spring. "Would you get that dinosaur out of here!! I just washed the dirt!") Which brings me back to the point of my story.

After throwing open all the windows in the house, filling the bucket with Murphy's Oil (what a good smell), finding plenty of rags and laying out a plan of attack, I dig right in. And in our house, it really is "digging in". Soon the house smells clean,

You tear open the door to embrace your little one, and all hell breaks loose! The dogs come tearing in, they have obviously been down at the stream as they shake the stream all over your clean house. The two boys fall in behind the dogs, they forgot to tell you that it was the mud puddle in front of the stream where they fell. And it went all down their boots to mix in with the stream that is also in there. Every step they take, showers of semi-dried stream and mud puddle fall to the floor and coze out of their boots. #### 1930 MAXIM RESTORATION RIGHT ON SCHEDULE

One year ago, two articles appeared in Main Street telling about the history and proposed restoration of the Alton Fire Department's second oldest fire truck, the 1930 Maxim. Checking in with committee members Jack Woodland, Dick Brown, Tom Fry and Norm Barrett on the progress made over the past months, the news is good. The restoration plans are right on schedule.

Undertaking the restoration of any old vehicle will test one's patience and skill over a period of many months or in some instances years when accuracy and authenticity are of utmost importance. With the Maxim Fire Truck for example, considerable time was spent having special parts machined, researching the correct paint color, locating just the right plating company to do the bumpers, headlights and handrails, and a gold leaf expert would be needed, too.

Restoration projects are extremely costly and this 22 foot Fire Truck is no exception. Funds have been generously donated from the Firemen's Association and the East Alton Fire Association. Members of the West Alton Fire Association are making a donation toward a set of tires. An antique bell was donated by the Fire Auxiliary last year.

As of this writing, the fenders and running boards have been removed, and the body has been readied in preparation for the new paint. Contributions for this part of the project have been received from Robbins Auto Parts Company, pPg Industries and Manter Oldsmobile & Pontiac Inc. The outer coat of bright red paint, to give an idea of why restoring an antique vehicle is costly, is approximately \$100 per gallon.

Progress on this 60 year old Fire Truck is moving along nicely, according to the Committee. If anyone has any old photos or early history of the Maxim Fire Truck please contact one of the Committee members. Also, donations for helping defray restoration costs may be made by contacting one of the Committee members. If all goes well, completion date for the truck will be early 1991. Progress reports will be included in future issues of Main Street.






