EIGHT RACES HIGHLIGHT TOWN/SCHOOL ELECTIONS

ALL POSITIONS HAVE CANDIDATES

Eight of the 21 openings will be contested in town and school elections on Tuesday, March 12. All 21 slots have candidates.

Contested town races include a three-way race for Highway Agent among incumbent Richard P. Drew and challengers Malcolm F. Simonds and George W. Thoroughgood. There is also a six-way race for three 3-year Budget Committee seats with incumbents Ruth A. Messier, Warren B. Harris and John Lord joined by David J. Gleason, Neal L. Harris and Beverley A. Kempton.

A Planning Board race shows four vying for two 3-year seats with incumbent Donald R. MacDonald and Harold M. Bothwick Jr., Lawrence Alting and Robert Sederquist Jr. Four seek a vacant 3-year seat as Water Commissioner: Robert Sederquist Jr., Richard E. Helie, George M. Jones and Richard D.P. Duncan. Candidates for Cemetery Trustee for one year are Richard Helie and Jane B. Porter.

Contested School races have four seeking two 3-year Board seats: incumbent James E. Newton, Richard Quindley, June D. Tanguay and Jack D. Henderson. Three seek the 1-year School Board seat: Jeanne M. Sullivan, Stephen G. Parker and Diane M. Alting. Mary Jane Finethy and Jeanne M. Sullivan are competing for the vacant 1-year School Clerk slot.

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING FACES EIGHT ARTICLES

The Annual School District Meeting will begin at 1p.m. on Saturday, March 9, in the Alton School Gym. There are eight articles on the warrant.

Traditional articles include those dealing with reports, School Board salaries, and the authority of the Board to seek and expend funds.

Article 3 asks the district to raise and appropriate \$15,000 to replace the high school oil tank, as recommended by the Capital Improvements Committee.

Article 4 seeks \$60,360 to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and fringe benefits for the 1991-92 school year, resulting from the recent contract negotiations.

Article 5, submitted by petition, asks voters to see what sum of money will be raised and appropriated to fund the Master Contract for the 1991-92 school year.

Article 6 will determine what sum of money will be raised and appropriated for the school budget. The School Board's budget of \$3,917,898 is recommended by the Budget Committee.

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TWO POLICE EXPLORERS PERFORMED KEY ROLES IN RECENT EMERGENCY

Two Alton Police Explorers deserve a special accolade for their recent performance in a local emergency. Ed Soucy and Stephen Thibeault, members of Police Explorer Post 600 of Gilmanton, put their training to the test, and it worked!

Soucy was the first to discover the recent structure fire on Main Street next to the Town Hall. He ran across the street to the home of Post Treasurer Helen Sullivan and alerted the Alton Fire Department and met fellow Explorer Thibeault there. They quickly returned to the scene, knocked on doors and windows and carefully checked that no occupants were trapped.

When Police Officer Shagoury arrived, they reported to him and assisted with traffic control. The Alton Fire Department, assisted by neighboring departments, did a fine job in fire suppression and protecting the adjacent Town Hall. The speed element began with these quick-thinking Explorers.

Alton Police Corporal Susan Roberts, who is the volunteer associate advisor of Explorer Post 600, is very proud of the young men's actions. She also proudly reported that the Gilmanton Post, which draws young men and women from Gilford, Gilmanton, New Durham and even Laconia, has more members from Alton than from any of these towns.

Exploring is a high school age division of the Boy Scouts of America, and it would appear that the Explorers also subscribe to the motto: "Be Prepared!" Soucy and Thibeault certainly were.

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VOLUNTEERS NEEDED AS SENIOR COMPANIONS

The Senior Companion Program is a Federal volunteer program funded by ACTION which enables eligible senior citizens (age 60 or over) the opportunity to serve others in the community.

Companions visit older persons who are homebound because of physical or emotional frailties to help such older persons remain independent. No fees are charged for companion visits. The need for volunteers exists in Alton, and those interested in serving should contact Program Coordinator Beverly Down (Belknap-Merrimack Community Action Program) at P. O. Box 1016, Concord NH 03302 or call 225-3295.

Common tasks include sharing hobbies, encouraging exercise, doing errands, reading or writing letters, assisting with meal preparation, making community contacts and providing respite services. They do not include housekeeping or nursing-related services.

Companions can qualify for a tax-free stipend of \$44 per week for 20 hours of service as well as a transportation allowance. Service does not affect Social Security, food stamps, SSI, subsidized housing, etc. Ongoing training and supervision is provided as well as an annual physical exam and accident and liability insurance.

"GET READY" MONTH

March is the "get ready" month. This is the time to prepare for the coming seasons. Get out your gear and look it over. You don't want to miss that big fish or game because of faulty equipment.

How was that sight or scope on your deer rifle last season? Now is the time to make any changes so you can sight-in and get used to it before the next season.

Want a new shotgun? Turkey season is not far off. This is a good time to look around for a trade or a new gun. You can practice at the Farmington Fish and Game Club's newly installed trap. Check the sign at the club in New Durham for the operating hours.

Repaire all your fishing gear now.Patch old boots and waders; check rods for broken, bent or worn eyes; give the rod a coat of Armor All; and clean your reels. Clean your sinking lines with Armor All and your floating lines should be "greased". Replace any worn line on your reels now.

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TOWN MEETING WARRANT ADRESSES 25 ARTICLES

Alton voters will be asked to decide on 25 warrant articles at the 1991 Town Meeting on Wednesday, March 13, at 7p.m. in the Central School Gym.

Four articles provide three alternate approaches to securing the proposed refuse disposal transfer station. One would transfer funds from the Sewer Capital Reserve Fund (2/3 favorable vote required) and cost nothing on the tax rate. One would then authorize expenditure of the transferred funds (majority vote). The second alternate would call for bonding and would impact the tax rate (2/3 favorable vote required). The third alternate would fund the transfer station in the current year. The total cost of the transfer station would be \$360,000 in each case, less \$82,000 already in the Transfer Station Capital Reserve Fund.

Traditional articles include the total operating budget exclusive of warrant articles; authorization for Selectmen to apply for federal and state grants and to accept gifts in trust; to borrow monies in anticipation of tax collections; and to hear reports and conduct any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Ongoing money articles include: earmarking additional funds for Landfill closure; energy conservation measures in town buildings; road construction; capital items such as replacement of one police cruiser, replacement of police radio base station; emergency repairs to a section of Alton Bay retaining wall; a highway back-hoe; Gilman Library; and authorization for grants to Visiting Nurse Association, Community Action Program, Hospice of Southern Carroll County, Red Cross, Harbor House, and Household Hazardous Waste Day.

New articles include: ratification of a two-year labor contract with Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Local 534; authorization to the Planning Board to delegate minor site plan reviews to a special committee for this purpose; a referendum article to determine whether the town should consider possible acquisition of the Pavillion property in the Bay; granting of a septic easement on specific town-owned property; and formal action to accept Barbara Clough's bequest of land and money and establish a trust instrument for same.

Petition articles include: \$10,000 for completion of Senior Citizens-Community Center on Pearson Road; \$12,880 for Belknap
