BUDGET CUTS APPROVED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Over 300 voters turned out for the 1991 Annual Town Meeting on Wednesday, March 13, and in an extremely close vote cut almost \$60,000 from the operating budget bottom line. They also cut \$30,000 for a Highway Department backhoe and rejected an attempt to provide funds to repair the old one.

By an overwhelming 241-34 vote (2/3 required), voters approved the transfer of \$333.178 from the Sewer Account Capital Reserve Fund to the Transfer Station Capital Reserve Fund with \$278,000 designated for the proposed transfer station and the remaining \$55,178 to remain unappropriated.

\$5,000 for energy conservation measures at the Mt. Major Community Center was eliminated, but a similar amount for the Gilman Library was approved contingent on a matching grant from the Governor's Energy Office.

A total of \$157,500 was approved for road construction with \$80,714 of it offset by a highway block grant. \$50,000 was added to the capital reserve fund for Landfill closure. Capital projects approved were: replacement of a four-wheel drive police vehicle (\$20,000), replacement of a police radio base station (\$5,000), and emergency repairs to a portion of the Alton Bay Retaining wall (\$9,000). Agency allocations were approved as follows: Community Action Program \$3,966, Hospice of Southern Carroll County \$1,200, Visiting Nurse Association \$8,625, Red Cross \$976, Harbor House \$750, and Household Hazardous Waste Day \$3,253. Also approved was the increased cost of the first year of the two-year labor contract (Highway and Landfill Departments) at \$10,798.

Only one of three money-related petition articles was approved: \$10,000 for completion of the Senior Citizens Community Center on Pearson Road. Rejected was a request for \$12,880.37 (later amended downward to \$8,600.26) for Youth Services Bureau's Court Diversion Services Program for first

1026 VOTERS RESPOND TO TOWN/SCHOOL ELECTIONS

The annual election for town and school positions were held March 12 with 1026 voters turning out.

The race for Highway Agent (3 years) resulted in Richard P. Drew (517 votes) outpacing Malcolm F. Simonds (251) and George W. Thoroughgood (207). Jane B. Porter (604) topped Richard E. Helie (299) for Cemetery Trustee (1 year). Richard D.P. Duncan, Jr. (376) defeated Robert Sederquist, Jr. (204), George M. Jones (182) and Richard E. Helie (168) for Water Commissioner (3 years).

A six-way race for Budget Committee (3 years) elected Ruth A. Messier (692), Neal L. Harris (510) and Beverly A. Kempton (488). Trailing were Warren B. Harris (367), John W. Lord (306) and David J. Gleason (252).

For Planning Board (3 years) Donald R. MacDonald (450) and Lawrence J. Alting (440) topped Harold M. Bothwick, Jr. (397) and Rob-

All 16 zoning amendments proposed by the Planning Board were approved.

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING APPROVES ALL ARTICLES

On march 9 the Alton School District Meeting aproved all warrant articles resultting in an approved budget for the 1991-92 school year of \$3,863,594. This represents an increase of 4.29% over 1990-91.

After long discussion, Warrant Article 4 regarding \$50,485 for salaries, fixed charges and professional improvement costs passed by a written ballot of 176-158. The written ballot was requested by petition. The amount was based on a one-year contract negotiated between the School Board and the teachers.

Warrant Article 3 approved the expenditure of \$15,000 to replace the high school oil tank, as recommended by the Capital Improvements Program Committee.

At the close of the meeting, School Board Chairman Jim Newton recognized School Board member Terri Noyes with flowers for her years of dedicated service to the Board.

GOOD NEWS FROM CONCORD

ALTON GARDEN CLUB SEED PLANTING

By Shirley M. Barnes

In recent years, I was shown a slick trick to give seeds a fast start. The key is watering with warm water (not hot) from the kitchen faucet.

Prepare hard seeds like beans, peas, morning glories, etc., by immersing them in warm water for a few hours before planting. Mark your row with twine pulled taut between two sticks to keep a straight line.

Loosen soil along the twine to accommodate the width you want. Plant seeds and cover to a depth according to the directions on the package; then press ground down with a hoe or your feet.

Use a sprinkling can and warm fertilized water to water the row. Then cover the row with a board, 4" to 6" wide. Lift the board daily and when seeds are surfacing in good numbers, remove the board. Voila!


Carefully release any non-keepers by wetting your hand before you touch the fish, gently remove the hook, and cradle the fish in the water until it has recovered.

offenders; and a request (\$149,000) for a new revaluation. No one moved or seconded this petition article.

In other action, voters approved plans a special committee to consider minor site plan reviews; said "no" to a referendum article on whether to explore purchase and use of the Pavillion property in Alton Bay; granted a septic easement to Robert and Martha Jane Peck on a piece of town-owned land; accepted with gratitude the gift of the late Barbara Clough to be administered as the "Clough-Morrell Trust" and handled by the Trustee of Trust Funds; authorized the Selectmen to accept gifts, legacies and devises made to the town; authorized the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend grants from state, federal and other sources; approved a resolution urging the Congress to propose an amendment to the Constitution forbidding desecration to the U. S. flag: authorized Selectmen to adopt an ordinance to prohibit firearm discharge in an area along the Merrymeeting River from the fire station on Route 140 to the bridge at Alton Bay; authorized the Selectmen to borrow monies in anticipation of taxes; and approved a resolution endorsing action of Selectmen to pursue in concert with the selectmen of other Belknap County towns, long-range action to keep the Gunstock Area off the local tax rolls.

Another highlight will be the winner of the grand prize, a color TV. Tickets for the TV are available in businesses throughout the community and from members of the Lions Club.


The Town Jail, a favorite activity for
