The citation accompanying the award stressed his sevenyear-long leadership of <u>Main Street</u> and its communications importance in the life of this community.


The award has been in existence for 6 years, and prior Alton winners are Ted Cole, Bob Calvert and the late Marion MacDonald.

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#### ON THE APPALACHIAN TRAIL: THE NEXT TWO MONTHS

For those who missed the last issue, I'd like to do a


quick recap.

Calvin Batchelder, 70, and his wife, Mary, 69, married 47 years, spent six months and two days this summer hiking the majestic Appalachian Trail. They hiked 2,142.9 miles crossing 14 states....beginning atop Springer Mountain in Georgia and ending on Mount Katahdin in Maine. The highlight of their first month was a surprise 70th birthday party for Calvin atop Clingman's Dome, given by five hikers they had met earlier. A good ending to their first month on the Trail.

Now for some events of the next two months as told by Mrs. B.

During the next two months (mid-April to mid-June) Calvin and I travelled 576 miles through parts of North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania. Although the elevations were not quite as high as in the Great Smokies, we were in mountain country, with lots of ups and downs, until we reached northern Virginia. In Tennessee we slept in one shelter that was only three feet lower than Mt. Washington.

The Trail ran, for the most part, through hardwood forests. But we did camp on many bald, treeless mountain tops. The fair-weather views were spectacular. Because the southern woods are more open, wild flowers grow profusely. We saw great patches of trilliums, violets, larkspur and many other varieties. The scent of lily-of-the-valley saturated the south Virginia woods. Miles of the Virginia trail passed through rhododendron thickets. We enjoyed beautiful dogwood, wild magnolias and azaleas, although the cold spring weather delayed the blooming of most of the shrubs.





of Mount Rogers in Virginia where we observed more than forty herds of wild ponies, including stallions and mares with nursing foals. We felt like we were in the middle of a carousel when one group of young ponies decided to run around us.

Also in Virginia were the breathtaking panoramic views, trees and flowers at the Shenandoah National Park. In the Park, where they are protected, the deer are so tame they stand close to the Trail and watch as people pass by. I had one deer browse to within six feet of me. It looked me over and ambled away, not in the least disturbed. Bear are fairly common, too. Many hikers had the good fortune of seeing them; we weren't that lucky. We did see our first rattlesnake, which Calvin moved from the side of the trail with a long stick, so it wouldn't bother other hikers.

One word describes the weather during most of this period - DAMP. We had a good deal of precipitation all through Virginia, starting with light snow as we entered the state at Damascus and progressing through rain and thunderstorms. The many damp and overcast days were good for hiking if the trail was not too wet, but we missed many panoramic views. The weather gave us one of our worst days of the whole trip when we had to cross a dozen or more flooded brooks. Ordinarily these streams would have been easy to cross on rocks, but that day, after two weeks of wet weather, they were three times as wide as normal and at least a foot deeper. So, we had to wade. Fortunately, we were headed to a hostel not an open shelter. When we arrived at 9p.m. we took hot showers, cooked a hot meal and dried our boots and clothing. The next day, a relative picked us up and we spent the day sight-seeing in Washington. We stayed overnight at her home. It gave us a welcome break.

A few days later, we reached historic Harper's Ferry in West Virginia, where the Trail headquarters is located. We signed in and had our picture taken for the 1992 yearbook.

We met some interesting hikers in this stretch, a couple from Maine who hike on the Trail for two weeks every year, a father and son from Australia, also an Englishman who was hiking across the country on some of the historic trails. He was writing material called "A Walk Across America" for a publishing company in England.



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
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

#### **HUNTING & FISHING SEASONS END**

December ends the calendar year and the 1992 hunting and fishing seasons. Firearms deer season ends December 6 and archery deer season continues through December 13.

These late ending season dates may allow the hunter to hunt on snow which easily shows the deer movement patterns. This advantage is countered with the need for thicker, warmer clothing and footwear. With thicker clothes, the rifleman must be sure to tuck the butt of the stock into the shoulder for proper sight picture. The archer must keep bulky clothes away from the string. One should practice to assure nothing interferes. Climbing trees to reach a hunting stand can be hazardous with slippery footing. Keep these disadvantages in mind when hunting the late season.

Ruffed Grouse (partridge) may be hunted until December 31. These fast and tasty birds give the hunter one more excuse to be in the woods before the years ends. If you were lucky enough to flush a few partridge during the deer season, you will know where to find them. Snowshoe hare, gray squirrel, and fox may also be hunted through this month.

December 6 ends the second half of a split bear season. This second season allows the Fish and Game Department to control the taking of female bears as they den up for the winter before the males do. For those looking for a bear skin rug, the thickest fur is found at this time.

With December bringing the end of the year, it is time to reflect on season's past. What did one do right, do wrong? What could one do, or use to make the outdoor experience more fulfilling?





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
