# NO WINTER DOLDRUMS FOR INNOVATIVE SPORTSPERSONS

February can be a pretty dull month for some people. Winter doldrums set in and it's couch potato season. Not so for the innovative sportsperson.

With the rabbit season open through the month, one still has an excuse to take a walk in Alton's woods and call it hunting. With the lack of snow, the white snowshoe hare are easier to spot and the walking is easier, too. If we get deeper snow, use cross country skis or snowshoes.

For the fisherman, there is ice fishing if you find some safe ice. You can try the smaller lakes and ponds in the area and explore some new water.

New this year: the NH Fish and Game Rule Digest makes note that there is an active runway (landing strip) on Alton Bay. Look for the markers and be aware.

The 13th Annual Great Rotary Fishing Derby takes place on Saturday and Sunday, February 1 and 2. Take a ride to the headquarters in Meredith on Sunday to see the size of the fish the competitors register. Bring your camera!

A representative of the National Muzzleloading Rifle Association will give a presentation on Wednesday, February 12, at 7:30p.m. at the Farmington Fish & Game Club in New Durham.

You could spend some time browsing around the Fishing and Outdoor Show at the Manchester Armory. It costs \$3 and is open from 5 to 9p.m. on Friday, February 14; and from 10a.m. to 9p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, February 15 and 16.

When you do venture outdoors this month, pay attention to the weather and dress accordingly. If you dress in layers, you can shed clothes during the warmer part of the day or while you're active and add them on as the sun sets. Sleeveless insulated vests and turtlenecks work well for me.

#### COUNTY DELEGATION BUDGET PROCESS

The 1992 Legislature opened January 8 and Heard Governor Gregg address education, broad-based taxes, and economic development. We, the legislators, are busy hearing new bills, upwards of 500 in the House and 300 in the Senate. At the same time each year, the counties are working on their budgets for the year. The members of the county delegation (the 19 House members in the county) evolve the budget. The County Commissioners actually administer the county business.

At the beginning of the fiscal year, a public hearing is held for each county entity to present their requests for funding. The members of the delegation are appointed to five or six member committees to discuss each budget with its administrator. Committees cover the Nursing Home, law enforcement, Court House, Gunstock, outside agencies (Conservation District, Family Planning, Extension Service, CAP services), Airport, Mutual Aid (fire dispatch), Children and Youth Agencies, wages and personnel.

After deliberation the Committees present their budget conclusions to the full delegation. Another public hearing is held at which the departments and entities again discuss their budget needs. The Delegation debates the entire budget and votes on the final figures. (Dates of Public Hearings were not available at press time.)

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# COMPOSTING: NATURE'S WAY OF RECYCLING

With the impending closure of the Landfill, the role each homeowner can play in the recycling of organic waste through composting becomes extremely significant.

Composting is the process of managed decomposition

and compost is a natural product that results.

Across the country, landfills are closing, forcing us to realize that our waste is piling up and disposal options are getting costly. We can observe first hand the need for alternative waste strategies to prevent water pollution and soil degradation.

By composting, you produce a useful horticultural product while disposing of kitchen scraps, yard wastes, and other organic wastes. It is disturbing to think that 5000 tons per year of organic materials is taking up valuable space in our local landfill. Now that Alton is turning to the use of a transfer station, the savings become very apparent. The smaller the volume of trash that must be transported and disposed of at another site, the smaller the cost for that transportation and disposal. Either through taxation or a user fee system, these costs must be paid. With composting you reduce your volume of waste and recycle materials that would otherwise be placed in the landfill and converting
