BONNIE JOSEPH & REUBEN WENTWORTH ELECTED TO BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Incumbent Bonnie Joseph and political-newcomer Reuben Wentworth were elected to three and two year terms respectively on the Board of Selectmen. Joseph with 529 votes defeated Florence Shaw (455) and William Watson Jr. (108). Wentworth (349) outdistanced Lawrence Alting (166), Jonathan Downing (120), Francis Metcalfe (165), and Norman Nardello (301).

There were three three-year positions open on the Budget Committee with seven candidates. Elected were Robert DesRoches (473), Ralph Drew (589), and Paula Kelson (514). Defeated were Warren Harris (370), Catherine Mars (433), Warren Nott (199), and Michael Sullivan (391).

Richard Quindley (571) defeated Robert DesRoches (476) for the open three-year seat on the Water Commission.

The results of unchallenged positions were: Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, Joseph Houle (966); Library Trustee for three years, David Countway (986); Cemetery Trustee for three years, Jane Porter (957); Fire Ward for three years, David Jensen (989); Planning Board for three years, Harold Bothwick (774) and James Washburn (803); Planning Board for one year, Richard Mongeon (831); Water Commissioner for one year, George Jones (917); Moderator for two years, John Duffek (983); and Supervisor of the Checklist List for six years, Alice Ziegra (996).

All amendments to the zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board were approved.

1153 voters cast ballots in the election.

\$2,580,166 BUDGET APPROVED AT ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

When the town moderator gavelled the 1992 Annual Town Meeting to adjournment following a five-hour session on March 11, a total of \$52,131 (not recommended by the Budget Committee) had been restored to the overall town budget. Voters approved a grand total of \$2,580,166, up \$75,868 from the 1991 budget. With 1992 projected income technically down from 1991, the impact on the 1992 tax rate (November billing and due December 1) will be greater than expected. When school and county portions are factored in, the overall tax rate increase would appear to be around 5%.

Items restored for 1992 include police overtime (\$2000), a riding mower for Parks and Recreation (\$2500), a parttime assistant to the Town Clerk (\$2500), support for Old Home Week (\$1500), and \$974 additional for Hazardous Waste Collection. Also restored in warrant articles were \$35,525 (down from an original \$45,000) for a replacement highway dump truck; \$4647 to fund a \$300 deductible health insurance plan for non-union employees rather than the Budget Committee-proposed \$500 deductible; \$8036 for five outside organizations: Hospice of Southern Carroll County (\$1200), Red Cross (\$986), Lakes Region Community Service (\$600), Lakes Region Community Health (\$3800), and Lakes Region Association (\$1450); and \$3923 (down from \$6500) to repair and maintain the Mount Major Community Center. Voters sustained the recommendations of the Budget Committee in not passing \$4400 for underwater electrical cable and light fixtures for the Alton Bay (water) Bandstand. Similarly, voters turned down \$17,000 for a second police cruiser and \$9400 for engineering septic plans at the Bay.

Other moneyed warrant articles passed included Alton Bay Community Center repairs (\$15,000), one police cruiser (\$17,000), rebuilding of the M-5 fire truck (\$50,000), and the Alton Bay retaining wall (\$15,000). Also approved: \$285,000 (\$175,388 from general taxation) for road reconstruction, and \$40,000 for sidewalk repairs.

The petition article to eliminate the position of Town Planner, later amended to reduce the position to two days per week, were both soundly defeated. Traditional housekeeping articles were all approved; and Article 14 to authorize sale of a parcel of town-owned land was withdrawn. New RSA 40:10 was extensively used to restrict reconsideration of action taken that night.

VOTERS CHOOSE PARKER AND BURBANK FOR SCHOOL BOARD

A large turnout (1153 voters) elected Stephen Parker (692) and Albert Burbank (553) to the two three-year posts on the Alton School Board. They defeated Robert Boyce (468) and Arthur Thomits (438) in the annual School District elections last month.

Mary Jane Finethy (623) defeated Judy Biggar (451) for School District Clerk.

Shirley Young (975) was unopposed for School District Treasurer and William Finethy III (872) was unopposed for School District Moderator.

THE PILGRIMS ARE COMING TO HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEETING



VOTERS REJECT FACT-FINDERS REPORT AND ADD TO BUDGET AT SCHOOL MEET

An independent fact-finders report, intended to settle the contract dispute between the Alton School Board and the Alton Teachers Association, was rejected by voters 115-171 in a secret ballot at the Annual School District Meeting on March 14. The report favored the Association in 11 of the 12 areas of disagreement.

The vote sends the two sides back to the bargaining table to resolve their differences. School Board Vice-Chairman Jack Henderson presented the Board's opposition to the report and Frank Walker, acting president of the Teachers Association, spoke in favor of accepting the report. Rejection of the report appeared to be based on a desire by the voters to see the issues settled locally rather than by an outsider and a concern for a number of inaccuracies in the printed report. The procedure for handling grievances, one of the 12 areas, was a thoroughly discussed item by the voters.

In other business, voters approved \$8474 to pay for the district's share of the State Retirement cost due to recent action by the State Legislature, \$60,000 to replace half of the high school roof, and \$10,000 to replace paving.

The recommended budget of \$3,841,286 was increased by \$5454 to cover an increase in health benefits for support staff and \$16,688 for a computer network system linking various administrative offices. A third amendment to allocate \$33,755 for possible increases in faculty salaries as a result of the pending negotiations was rejected.

Retiring School Board member David McKenney was presented a gift certificate by the Board and honored by a standing ovation for his years of service to the Alton School.

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
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GIRLS BASKETBALL TEAM REACHES STATE FINALS

LEGISLATIVE SESSION UPDATE

Because of the infusion of Medicaid funds, the budget is settled for this year. In looking forward to 1993-94, we have the reality of severe economic problems to reckon with now.

The Senate has passed a \$95 million economic development package to give low interest credit to small businesses and venture capital tax incentives for larger

The House has sent a bill to the Senate trying to expand coverage in the Business Profits Tax. The three main bills resulting from the "Study of Rape Statutes" Ad Hoc Committee have passed the Senate and were heard by the House Judiciary Committee. One will improve training in rape case handling for law enforcement personnel, prosecutors and others involved in the trial process. The second will establish a registry of sexual offenders. The extension of sentences and sentence review are in the third bill.

We are halfway through this session. Of the 433 bills which started in the House, 193 have been passed to the Senate. The rest were killed. We are hearing 116 bills from the Senate. They had introduced 184 bills.

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

To some, opening day seems to be a fishing circus; to the outdoor enthusiast, it is the time to fish for salmon, lake trout and rainbow trout. Notice, I said "fish" and not "catch". Sometimes the fish do not cooperate in this sport!

A good season is predicted as the salmon run last fall in the Merrymeeting River was very good. Some hefty rainbows were caught through the ice this winter, too.


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BASEBALL SEASON PROMISING

The season opens at home on Monday, April 6, against Derryfield.

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
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CANDIDATES SOUGHT FOR FIRE DEPARTMENT OPENINGS
