SCOTT J. DUNN NAMED TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

The Board of Selectmen announced the appointment of Scott J. Dunn as town administrator effective July 13 following the unanimous recommendation of the search committee. Dunn replaces Pam Andrade who left to become town manager of Lancaster.

Dunn is currently the director of parks and recreation in Plymouth, NH. He has held that position since June of 1990. Prior to that he was recreation director for the town of Southbridge, Massachusetts, a position he began in November of 1987.

He has a bachelor's degree in public administration from Nichols College in Dudley, MA, and a master's degree in public administration from the University of New Hampshire.

Dunn and his wife, Laurie, have one daughter, 3-yearold Katie, and are expecting a second child.

Dunn was selected from 150 applications that were narrowed down to 16 candidates.

MICHAEL M. BURKE NAMED TOWN FORESTER

Michael M. Burke was recently appointed Town Forester by the Board of Selectmen.

His responsibilities include aiding the town in managing the current use program, assisting the town in assessing the timber tax when an individual harvests timber, management of town-owned forest land under supervision of the Conservation Commission, and assisting the town with shade tree management.

Burke brings over nine years of forestry and consulting experience to the position. He currently manages over 20,000 acres in the Lakes Region with an annual harvest and sale of over two million board feet of timber and 5,000 cords of pulpwood.

Burke has an associate degree in forest technology from the Thompson School at the University of New Hampshire, a bachelor's degree in forest management from UNH, and a master's degree in forest resource management from UNH. He is a member and former chairman of the Conservation Commission and a former member of the Planning Board.

JUDY BIGGAR RESIGNS POST FOR CHESTERFIELD JOB

Judy Biggar, administrative assistant for the past four years, has been named to the top job at the Chesterfield, NH, town hall as of June 29. 

Principal George Rogers addressed the parents, relatives and friends of the members of the Class of 2004 before presenting "diplomas" to the graduates in ceremonies last month.





"GETTING TO KNOW YOU"

How well do you know the area of New Hampshire that you live in? For those who don't get off the beaten path, July is a good month to do some exploring. The longer days and warmer air temperatures make it a great time to get outdoors and see the many wonderful areas around the Lakes Region.

Want to see deer? Take the kids and go to Long Island, way out on the tip of Moultonboro Neck. Bring your camera as the deer are relatively tolerant of humans and you can get some good close up shots. You can pack a picnic lunch and make a day of it.

Got a boat you can launch on the Big Lake? There are a lot of places to explore there. Try Stone Dam Island at the tip of Meredith Neck. It is set aside as a preserve and there is a dock on the east side of the island. At the end of the dock is a map showing the hiking trails and picnic areas. Part of this island is private property so be sure to obey trail signs. If you are real quiet hiking you may see deer or other wildlife.

You can also explore the Big Lake underwater with a snorkel, mask and fins. Weekdays are the best time for this as the boat traffic is lighter. There is a lot of underwater scenery to enjoy, and you can also find spots bass hang out that most fishermen don't know about. (Check out the rock structures you see.)

You can hike up Minge Brook to a series of beaver bogs. There's nice wooded scenery, and brook trout available to the diehard fisherman.

Mount Major is a little crowded for me. I always enjoyed a hike up Straightback Mountain for the opposite view. Unfortunately, an old 4x4 access road to this area has recently been closed, possibly because of abuse to the land.

Wherever you go, use the land wisely, leave only your tracks behind. There's more out there than you know. Enjoy!

1930 MAXIM FIRE TRUCK RESTORED BY VOLUNTEERS

Restoration of the Town's second oldest fire truck, a 1930 Maxim pumper, is coming to a close. This project was begun in the fall of 1988 by Jack Woodland, Dick Brown and Tom Fry.

Contributions from the Alton Firemen's Association, East Alton Fire Association, Fire Auxiliary, West Alton Fire Association and help from several businesses have made the costly job of restoring the truck possible. There were no funds allocated from the town budget for the work done on the truck.



The committee carefully researched original documents, looked at old photos, and interviewed several older firemen to assure that the truck would be restored accurately. Craftsman-artist Jerry Rooney of Tuftonboro applied the gold leaf exactly as it was on the cab and body of the truck before the restoration was undertaken. Photos taken each step of the way were used when the truck was repainted, reassembled, and the gold leaf applied.

The truck was delivered from the Maxim factory to Alton on May 21, 1930. It remained in active service until the early 1960's. It was stored in the Irving Roberts' barn for several years before it was moved to the East Alton Station in 1976.

There are several area parades that the Maxim will be participating in during this summer and fall. With care, the truck will be a source of pride and enjoyment for many years to come.







New events featured this year are Pony Rides offered each evening by Pop's Clam Shell and Bungie Jumping from a crane high above the Bay.



LAND CONSERVATION PROGRAM ACHIEVES ITS GOAL

Alton surely has cause for great rejoicing. Last month the final step in the Land Conservation Investment Program was reached. Alton now owns three-quarters of the land surrounding Gilman Pond and will control conservation easements around the remainder of the pond. The town's Conservation Commission will be responsible for maintaining the area which will be open to the public.

Gilman Pond is unique in that it is one of the few bodies of water in the state that has no development except for one house which was built in the 1800's. Gilman Pond is also home to the federally-endangered small whorled pegonia, one of the rarest plants in the United States.

The state provides grant funds to the town on a matching basis. To come up with its portion, the town can either find land owners willing to sell their property at half its value, pay cash, raise funds privately or receive donated easements. To complete this particular transaction, Robert and Dorothy Seavey and Diana Eley have agreed to sell a portion of their land on Gilman Pond to the town, and place much of the rest under conservation easement, as has the Hoopes family.

In addition, the Barbarossa family placed 88 acres in South Alton under conservation easement, supplementing the town's credit.

The total project encompasses about 510 acres of land, with a total of \$708,000.




