## ALTON 2 ALTONS FLOOD RELIEF DRIVE REACHES ITS \$10,000 GOAL

This past summer many of us watched on television the devastation to cities and towns located along the banks of the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers. We witnessed the destruction as city after city, town after town and thousands of acres of farm land disappeared under the rampaging rivers.

Could we, here in Alton, reach out a helping hand to West Alton, Missouri, and Alton, Illinois? Yes, we could and yes, we did come together to help our sister towns in the mid-west. Officials were contacted and efforts were coordinated between the three communities. A committee was formed August 5 to begin immediate plans for raising funds for the families in these towns.

The 16-member committee met weekly from August 5 through September 22 to exchange ideas for raising monies and to select a motto. The motto chosen was "Alton 2 Altons Flood Relief Drive". Canisters with bright yellow labels began appearing on counters throughout the town, posters and flyers

float was entered in the parade, bottled water was sold during the Block Party and the sponge toss raised more funds for the drive.

Rain didn't dampen the spirits of vendors and the large crowd at the very successful Flea Market held in September. Walk-A-Thon t-shirts, bottled water, baked goods, hot dogs, flea market spaces and a raffle raised our hopes of meeting the \$10,000 goal.

A successful Walk-A-Thon was held September 11 on Route 11D. A chilly, but sunny day brought out 34 stalwart participants including several school children. Pledges for the walk were most generous.

While these activities were going on donations from Alton residents, summer residents, visitors and surrounding communities continued to arrive in the special accounts opened at the First NH Bank and Farmington National Bank.

The drive was extended until the end of September. At the September 22 meeting, it was announced that the goal of \$10,000 had been reached. In fact, the amount to date totalled \$11,096.57 and more was arriving daily.



## ENHANCED 9-1-1 EMERGENCY REPORTING BEING PREPARED FOR 1995 LAUNCH

About three years ago, we reported the activation in Alton of an Address Committee to formulate plans for a street and road numbering system for all homes, buildings and currently vacant lots within the town as well as to prepare road name changes where duplications or close similarities existed.

In addition, local road names were being recommended for sections of state and local numbered routes. The purpose: for the life and safety of the town's residents whereby fire, ambulance, police and any emergency vehicles could locate residences without delay. It would also be helpful in establishing permanent mail addresses, rather than changing from time to time.

Alton has a large road area, and it has understandably taken a long time for this volunteer group to handle the measuring task and set up the grid. Many roads are still to be measured. All lots will be given numbers ultimately and on fixed distances between properties any location will be easy to find in an emergency.

A recent insert in our phone bills advises that it's full steam ahead to be ready for the state-wide activation of the Enhanced 9-1-1 Emergency Reporting System on July 1, 1995. This announcement and the work of the Address Committee are related! The Address Committee's work is preparing for the 9-1-1 operational start.

RSA 106-H:9 provides that the Enhanced 9-1-1 System will be funded not through local taxation, but rather through a modest surcharge starting August 1, 1993 on our monthly phone bills, initially established at thirty nine cents per line.

Because Alton started early on in the measuring and road names exercise, it's well ahead of many other communities at this time.

If you don't know what an identity crisis is, just try to cash a check in a strange town.

Altons in early October. Along with the two checks, Wentworth will take with him two albums filled with photos of our town and fund raising activities, Walk-A-Thon shirts, Old Home Week shirts, and two maps of Alton with donors signatures and accompanying messages from well wishers here. Each Alton will receive a \$5,000 check for their flood relief fund. The remaining dollars over \$10,000 will be donated to the West Alton (Missouri) Fire Department so badly damaged in last summer's flood.

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## TRAVELS TO LITHUANIA: THE STORY CONTINUES

Here is a recap of the beginning of this story with new stories intertwined for folks who missed it in last month's issue.

Kevin Thomits, 16, son of Linda and Arthur "Skip" Thomits, flew to Moscow with the Laconia Theater/Arts Company on February 14, 1993. The group took a bus to one end of Arbat Street, a two-mile, outdoor, pedestrian, year-round shopping mall. Some of the group departed the bus, changed their currency and were given a two-hour shopping spree with orders to meet at the other end of Arbat Street where the bus would be waiting. The rest of the group rode to the end of the street to begin their spending adventure. When Kevin and his friends arrived at the end of Arbat Street, the other party and the bus were nowhere to be seen. Kevin and his friends searched the side streets to no avail. Finally, Sergei (tour guide) waved them down and led them to the bus where everyone was waiting. The bus was on a different street parked between two large buildings. Tension was as thick as an iceberg because Kevin's group was late and everyone was polar bear cold.

The theater group performed children's plays and dances

in St. Petersburg, Russia, and at the home of the U.S. Consulate General. From Russia the theater group took the train to Vilnius, Lithuania, (see photo) where they performed at the Lithuanian Youth Theater and Salomeya Neris School. Kevin met and stayed with the Jurkunas (Yurcoon-us) family. They enjoyed Kevin so much, they invited him back.




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Kevin, filled with bold courage and self-esteem, arrived in Vilnius, Monday, July 5, and spent three exciting weeks with the Jurkunas family.

While in Vilnius, the capital and largest city in Lithuania, Kevin had the pleasure of frequenting Parliament. a beautiful open area surrounded by old and modern buildings, and taking a trolley bus to Cathedral Square. He went to a Catholic church in Cathedral Square to listen to and enjoy many different choir groups from many countries, singing religious folk songs in their native tongues: Swedish,

Latvian, Estonian, Lithuanian, Scottish, English...from America.... Indian...from India..., and more.

Kevin also had the opportunity to attend "Baltic '93", an International Folklore Festival featuring dancing and singing.

Vilnius, with a population of 535,000, lies along the Neris River. It was founded about 1323 by Grand Duke Gedimina. The State University there was established in 1579. A major cultural and educational center, Vilnius is also an important transportation and industrial center. It is famous for its many old churches and other buildings, some dating from the 1400 to 1800's. Today, modern high-rise buildings stand among the older structures. Railroads pass through the city and an airport is nearby.

During a stay at the Jurkunas' summer house in Nida with Jonas Jurkunas, Kevin got to visit the large seaport of Klaipeda. There were many freighters and fishing vessels from different countries. Kevin also saw the old Naval Fort (see photo), built in the early 19th century, which now is a naval museum with ships and other naval regalia, plus the first fishing vessel in dry dock. The Museum surrounds a large aquarium which is home to penguins, seals, sea lions, etc. The boys toured Nida, took pictures and went swimming. The next day they did more swimming and played on the dunes. However, the bus broke down and it took them four hours to get back to the summer house.

The following day, Kevin, Jonas and friends met a group of Americans who came to Nida with Project Harmony to do some touring. The boys rode back to Vilnius with the Americans the next day. The arrived in the evening and dragged their weary bodies into their beds.

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


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
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## VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION OFFERS FLU SHOT CLINIC

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
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#### APACHE PLAYERS TO STAGE AGATHA CHRISTIE CLASSIC

#### A FEW PROMINENT MEN

Let us step back in time and reflect on a few prominent men in Alton's past who were influential in the town.

Waldo C. Varney was born here and attended our public schools. During his political career, he served as postmaster, selectman, town clerk, and library trustee for several years. In 1892, he was one of the foremost workers in the interest of a new town library.

Oliver J.M. Gilman was a well known public man of Alton who served in the state legislature for eight years. He took an important part in town and state affairs. He was superintendent of schools for 10 years and held various other offices. Gilman's gift of money for the church, Gilman Home, the Lyceum Course and the Library helped to promote cultural activities in the town.

Another man who helped to promote the growth and prosperity of Alton was Charles C. Mooney, who was the first station agent for the B & M Railroad Company. He was also the first shoe manufacturer of Alton and conducted that business for many years. He also was one of the founders of the Masonic Lodge.



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


