A Lifestyle of Digging for Opals

Have you ever dreamed about digging in your own mine claim? At the April meeting Club members learned about opals, their formation and special conditions for lapidary applications from a member's own claim. We enjoyed a hands-on presentation by Vince Wolf whose family digs for specialty opals in the Royal Peacock Mine. This mine has limited buy-in opportunities for serious rockhounds.

In the northwest corner of Humboldt County the site offers a unique opportunity for finding black opals, where

common silica treated under heat and pressure became fire opals, and eventually Virgin Valley opals. Virgin Valley opals prevail over others with vivacious color. The famous 'black' opal is native there as well as moss opal, lemon opal, crystal, and white opal. In addition, an exclusive feature is found in Virgin Valley fluorescent opals, which fluoresce green when illuminated with a black light.

An insight to the past was staged with more than a dozen items from Vince's collection. From petrified wood to a

mystery molar, not only were the fossils impressive, but they also had opalescent features throughout them. Though Vince and Alicia have ownership in the mine, Royal Peacock Opal Mine welcomes guests to try their luck at mining their own opals. \$190/day/person to work on a bankside, and less fees to go through tailings. It is hard work; however, it may offer the best chance to find a noteworthy opal.

Meeting adjourned at 7:10 p.m.





What to Use for Carrying Specimens and Equipment

Take these items to use to carry and transport your newly found specimens from the site to your home. For starters you can probably find some items are already in your garage or home closet. Or, order one from tool resource sites:

 Bucket - A bucket is a good option for containing multiple specimens. You can prepare buckets of different sizes. Get durable ones that can handle heavy loads.



These containers come in handy when packing small or delicate specimens. Also prepare different sizes of tubes, boxes, and other containers that can cater to assorted specimens.



Wrapping material Avoid cramming hard and fragile specimens together

fragile specimens together in one container to keep them from getting chipped or broken. Wrap them in newspaper or fabric so they don't jostle with each other during transport.



Rock Buckets
