Date Festival Now & Then

The Fair started in 1921 to celebrate the annual date harvest in the Indio area. It was eventually named the Riverside County Fair and Coachella Valley Date Festival.

In 1940 the original 40 acres expanded to include date grove on the fairgrounds. Presently, the fairgrounds cover 120 acres. When World War II began, all fairs in California were halted. After the war it was reinstated, and an "Arabian Nights" theme was introduced.

The covid pandemic shut down the Fair in 2021.

The County Board of Supervisors approved in June 2022 a partnership with Pickering Events LLC to bring the Festival back. Today, thanks to Club members who worked with Pickering we were able to sustain the Gem & Mineral building and its activities. With thousands of volunteer hours by Club members we promote the joy of rockhounding and execute our mission statement.

What is a Cabochon?

If you've heard the word "cabochon" before, I bet several questions came to mind afterward.

First, what is a cabochon? How do you even pronounce the word properly? And how do you use cabochons for jewelry making?

Below, you'll find all the answers to these common questions and more. Here's everything you need to know about cabochons.

Historically, a cabochon — also referred to as a cab — is a gemstone that has been shaped and polished instead of faceted. These stones typically have a flat side and one domed side.

Before, I go any further, let's address the elephant in the room. How do you pronounce the word "cabochon"?

It has French origins and the way it's pronounced goes like this: Ka-bowshawn. If you're still struggling, just call it cab for short.

Cabochons are usually cut from a gemstone slice or other materials using a calibrated stencil template or in freeform shapes. They are then ground into shape using grinding disks or belts coated with silicone carbide or diamond dust.

Nowadays, cabochons are made of more than just gemstones. You can find ceramic, porcelain and even wooden ones.

The cabochon shape varies and is available in all sorts of geometric and asymmetrical cuts. One of the rarest, and most desirable, is the sugarloaf cabochon. It looks like a pyramid, having four sides, a flat base and rounded tip.

The shape of the cab doesn't matter, though. What's most important, is the flat side which allows for you to attach it to jewelry.

Cabochons make beautiful focal points for jewelry. They're typically used to make pendants and rings.

Spheres

Spheres are basically divided into two groups. The first group of spheres are mass produced, mostly in foreign countries. The second and most desirable group of spheres, also the most expensive group, are handmade spheres. Making one of these spheres is a labor of love and takes many, many hours of work to produce a finished product sphere. Typically, 40 to 50 hours of work to make a single sphere is not uncommon.

So, if you see two spheres that may look similar and one has a low price and one has a high price, the low price one is more than likely a production made sphere and the higher priced one is hand made.

Rockhounding 101: Must-Have Tools for Safe Rock Collecting

A productive and convenient rockhounding trip requires thorough preparation. After identifying your desired rockhounding spot, you'll want to be armed with the necessary (and your preferred) tools that will help you collect rocks and minerals safely and with ease. **Here's the ultimate checklist of tools and equipment for beginner rockhounds,** suggested by Arthur Rocha of Stonebridge Imports.

- Goggles This is the most basic safety equipment you must bring to every rockhounding trip. You'll need a reliable pair of safety goggles to protect your eyes from dust, chips, and metal fragments.
- Gloves Wear a pair of work gloves to keep your hands clean and protect from possible cuts and scrapes when hammering through rocks.

- Hard hat If your trip involves exploring caves, cliffs, and other areas where rock falls are possible, it's always best to wear a hard hat.
- Appropriate footwear Wear boots with ankle support for treading on mountains with rough terrains, or waterproof boots for walking on lakes, rivers, and tailings.

• First aid kit -For emergency purposes, always have a first aid kit ready for treating minor injuries.
