We stutter and stammer about God's holiness. We tremble before God's majesty...and yet we grow squeamish and skittish before God's love.


I am flabbergasted by the widespread refusal across this land to think big about a loving God. Like nervous thoroughbreds being guided to the starting gate at Churchill Downs, many Christians bray, bridle, and bolt at the revelation of God's all-embracing love in Jesus Christ.

In my ministry as a vagabond evangelist, I have encountered shocking resistance to the God whom the Bible defines as Love. The skeptics range from the oily, over-polite professionals who discreetly drop hints of the heresy of universalism, to the Bible thumper who sees only the dusty, robust war God of the Pentateuch, and who insists on restating the cold demands of rule-ridden perfectionism.

Our resistance to the furious love of God may be traced to the church, our parents and pastors, and life itself. They have hidden the face of a compassionate God, we protest, and favored a God of holiness, justice, and wrath.

Yet if we were truly men and women of prayer, our faces set like flint and our hearts laid waste by passion, we would discard our excuses. We would be done with blaming others.

We must go out into a desert of some kind (your backyard will do) and come into a personal experience of the awesome love of God. Then we will nod in knowing agreement with that gifted English mystic Julian of Norwich, "The greatest honor we can give Almighty God is to live gladly because of the knowledge of his love." We shall understand why, as Kittel's Theological Dictionary of the New Testament notes, in the last years of his life on the island of Patmos, the apostle John wrote, and wrote with magnificent monotony, of the love of Jesus Christ. As if for the first time, we shall grasp what Paul meant when he said, "But however much sin increased, grace was always greater; so that as sin's reign brought death, so grace was to rule through saving justice that leads to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans 5:20-21).



If your are wondering what kind you should buy here are a couple things to think about.

OPENING PRAYER: Rick

APPROVAL of minutes from June 13, 2021. Motion made & passed. Jennifer/Chuck

APPROVAL OF AGENDA. Motion made & passed. Chuck/Carl

TREASURER'S REPORT. Motion to approve to file for audit. Jennifer/Carl

Audit for 2019 & 2020 will be done in-house. Chuck will get it ready on the computer. Carl & Bryan will do it together.

PASTOR'S REPORT:

1. In the past month I made visitations to Judy Curtis (both hospital and home), Charlene Hale, Pat Beatty and Barb Ligett.

2. In talking with some Area Pastors (Conner from First Christian and John from the First Methodist and Scotty from First Baptist) - they liked the idea of having a joint picnic on August 15th here at our church - 12:30 pm with Conner's sister giving a short presentation on her mission trip to the Dominican Republic. So, John thought I should invite the Lutheran Church and 2nd Baptist as well - and I did with the stipulation that an RSVP will be necessary by August 8th. It was thought that this picnic should be indoors in case of bad weather but the possible problem would be too many people RSVP about coming and we have no room for them. Hopefully, the number will be on the lower side. This will be a good way to establish some neighborly relations with the area churches. They are asked to bring a main dish if their last name starts with the letter A-L and a dessert if it is M-Z. All are asked to bring their own drink. 

