Council is pleased to announce that we have hired an interim minister. Reverend Don Erickson's first Sunday will be July 14. Some of you will already be familiar with him since he led our worship service on June 9. He will be commuting from Milford where he lives with his wife and son. He will guide us through the search process for a called minister, he will have office hours similar to Ann's and will visit the homebound and hospitalized. As we get to know each other he is open to seeing what other interest might unfold. Welcome Rev. Don!

Rev. Don is a 2004 graduate of Union Theological Seminary in the City of New York and clinically certified in pastoral care (ACPE), receiving his residency training in 2006-2007 at Tampa General Hospital. From 2007 to 2013, Don served in the role of hospice chaplain in Florida and New York State. In August 2009, Don was ordained by the Riverside Baptist Church (Alliance of Baptists) in Jacksonville, Florida. Don is currently in the Privilege of Call process with the Southwest Ohio Northern Kentucky Association (SONKA) of the UCC.

In July 2013 he was called to serve as the minister of the Community Church of North Orange & Tully (CCNOT) in Central Massachusetts, a federated UCC and Unitarian Universalist Association church. Don ended his ministry at CCNOT the summer of 2018 and moved to Cincinnati, Ohio where he has served as a chaplain at Hospice of Cincinnati.

Don is an expert in Christian theology and Buddhist philosophy. He is a published poet, amateur musician, film-buff, and book-lover. In the fall 2019 or winter 2019/2020, a book he wrote titled, A Life Lived and Laid Down for Friends: A Progressive Christology, will be published by Wipf & Stock Publishing.

I wanted to share a story with you.... I have heard of Crayons to Computers but to be honest I never truly was aware of how important they are to our teaching community.

My daughter had just graduated from college, her first teaching job and she had moved back from Bowling Green, OH and was excited about her first job. I was excited for her because she was living with me and she had a job. (Shhh...don't tell her that). She came home distraught one afternoon and I asked her what was bothering her. I knew teachers spent a lot of money on their own supplies and since she was going to be working for a small non-profit school I had imagined it would be even worse. She was worried that she wasn't going to be able to give the children she was going to be teaching the proper tools because of limited money. She had an appointment the next day to go down to the Crayons to Computer store in Cincinnati the next day and planned to volunteer on top of it.

She came back from the experience exhilarated because she had no idea what to expect and the magnitude of supplies available to teachers across the county. I just thought you would want to know that the money that you donate to this cause helps not only first year teachers but so many across our county and others and provides our teachers with valuable tools that would otherwise come out of teachers hard earned paychecks which are much too small as it is. JUST A REMINDER



You will notice the box in Fellowship Hall marked "Love Packages". This box is for depositing all the items the Church Women United collect for recycling and dispersing to communities locally and around the world. Ruby McQuade is St. Paul's Representative to the Organization and is the Corresponding Secretary.

Aluminum can tabs are collected for the Ronald McDonald House in Cincinnati where families of Children's Hospital patients can stay without charge. **Religious materials**, including Bibles are collected for distribution to third world countries who are just being introduced to the Christian faith but have no study materials. **Pill bottles** are collected and given to the local Human Society for multiple purposes at the animal shelter. The bottles should be empty and all labels removed.

The other collection that continues is the green bin. *Plastic or paper grocery bags* are to be placed in the bin. These are given to the Choice Pantry that is a part of Family Services of Middletown. Charlene and Jack Kiniyalocts empty the bin each week and on Wednesdays go to Barn N Bunk to receive the produce they give to the Pantry and take all that was placed in the green bin. Sometimes you will see Jim Rockwell place bars of soap and/or toothpaste and brushes. From time-to-time we have sent out an appeal for personal products that cannot be purchased with government assistance cards. Jim continues to donate such items and I hope I always remember to let him know how much it is appreciated by those who must rely on the Pantry to get by. We are no longer asking for plastic bottles with caps. Their purpose was to put small amounts of shampoo, dish soap, laundry soap, etc. rather than give entire large bottles of taxable personal items. They are no longer receiving donations of such products. When this changes I will send out an appeal for the bottles again.
