I hope this month's messenger finds you well and safe during this season. I hope you don't mind that I am taking this opportunity to speak to a topic. I do not do it often but it has been on my heart and I thought that I would use this space.

As the person who prints and put your bulletins together not only do I get some extra bible reading in but I read the back of your bulletins because to be honest I like the UCC and the way they think about many of the trending social justice topics nowadays. I don't know if people read the back of the bulletins but on the August 9 The topic was "When All Seems Lost" and referenced Genesis when Joseph was sold into slavery. After reading that I wondered to myself if anyone reads the back of the bulletin here? I wondered if this congregation knows the human trafficking happens all around them here in Middletown and at some point in time you were probably standing next to a someone that is still being exploited. It is a sad fact that human trafficking in every form happens in every state, every city and township in Ohio. Ohio is ranked #5 in the United States in human trafficking cases but that is not a true number. That number is used because it is a trackable number from the Polaris Project who run the National Human Trafficking Hotline. Human trafficking is the most under-reported crime in America. One, because most victims do not identify as victims and two, because there are not enough resources for men, women and children, exiting a trafficking situation.

The UCC does good work in many areas including Human Trafficking but here in the Middletown and Butler County fails the men, women and children that are being exploited. You might ask yourself how I know this....I know this because working here is not my first job. It's actually my third job. You might also not know that I am a survivor of human trafficking and some very serious childhood sexual trauma. I am a founding member of a non-profit here in Middletown that specializes in biznitries (Business with a ministry) and the Springhaven Community which is our Anti-human trafficking division. I also sit on the Butler Co. Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force which is working diligently to bring services here along with Springhaven. I work locally and nationally with survivors and work as an advocate in the justice system and the mental health systems that most of go through at one time or another.

So I ask you what are you doing to help stop human trafficking because it is not white paneled vans and kidnappings. That is 1% of all trafficking cases. Does it happen? Yes, with no doubt but here in Middletown it looks like parents selling their children for rent. Men exploiting woman for drugs and money and for teens it's for survival. Trafficking just isn't about sex it's also about labor. According to the ILO out of the 24.9 million people trapped in forced labor, 16 million people are exploited in the private sector such as domestic work, construction or agriculture; 4.8 million persons in forced sexual exploitation, and 4 million persons in forced labor imposed by state authorities.

Here are a couple of real time action items that you can do to help. And yes one person can make a difference even if this is a global problem made worse by a global pandemic. Check your slavery footprint at www.slaveryfootprint.org. You might be surprised. Buy local, buy 2nd hand, re-purpose. Support local/grass root organizations because the large national one really do not do any direct work with survivors or helping them exit their situation. Soroptomist is very active in this area to bring awareness. Get educated and ask questions. Do you go to a nail salon? Who is doing your cleaning if you use a cleaning service? My advice is if you think or feel like something is wrong call the National Human Trafficking Hotline I have several friends that have been able to leave their situation safely because of them.
