Still awaiting compensation

Wiltshire's air ambulance service (WAA) has yet to receive compensation for the costs incurred when responding to the Salisbury and Amesbury nerve agent attacks. Now, more than two years after attending both the Salisbury novichok poisonings and, a few weeks later, the Amesbury incident, where Dawn Sturgess tragically lost her life, the charity is still waiting for the Government to compensate it for the £100,000-plus costs incurred during and after the incidents.

It costs £3.75 million a year to keep the air ambulance flying and saving lives. It relies entirely on donations and yet is the only emergency service not to have been compensated by the government for its losses. The Department of Health and Social Care recently announced a £6 million COVID-19 grant to be shared by all 21 air ambulance charities, although the Wiltshire service is unsure how much it will receive from this grant.

In February, all seven Wiltshire MPs, including the Lord Chancellor Robert Buckland, wrote to the Home Secretary in support of this claim but to date the charity has heard nothing.

Climate network to tackle change

Wiltshire Council is a founding member of a new national network to promote the voice of the countryside in climate change discussions.

The Countryside Climate Network aims to ensure that the voice of rural knowledge and experience on climate action is listened to in Westminster, and asks that rural councils are an active participant in transforming the national economy into one that saves, rather than harms, our environment.

The Council is also working closely with the Local Government Association and the County Councils Network to develop a tool that measures the council's levels of carbon emissions.

The tool will create a standard, comparable measurement for all councils in the country, which can then be used to baseline carbon emissions and report on them regularly, as Wiltshire seeks to become carbon neutral by 2030. The trial of this new system is expected to begin later in the summer.

Views sought on library plans

Wiltshire Council is seeking the views of residents and library users to help it plan for re-opening library services safely during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The existing e-books, e-magazines and e-audio service continues to provide access to reading material, and a new service launched via Facebook offers rhyme times, tea and chat, bedtime stories and online book groups. A home library service launched in June, serving those members who are shielding and without digital access to download books. The online library content produced since lockdown has so far generated more than 83.000 views.

The Council would like to hear your ideas and feedback on how to re-open services safely. Possible options being considered include an order and collect service; an order and collect service; an order and collect service with bookable computer access; and a socially-distanced service offering some access to browse stock and use computers.

Rainbow for Freshford

Some of you will by now have spotted the art installation taking shape in Freshford. The project is for local children to contribute to, and be a part of, even if they can't be together while making it.

A large-scale rainbow created from painted stones has been developing week by week, colour by colour, on The Tyning field. Social-distancing measures in place are simplified by the nature of the project. This is a temporary piece of art. The stones will be removed in time and may be re-positioned elsewhere.



The idea for the rainbow came from local artist, Annabel Menheneott, who wanted the children to have something which they and their friends could contribute to as they couldn't be together during lockdown. "Every day I get lovely comments from all ages saying how

much it gives a sense of joy and focus to the children. They love seeing how many more stones have appeared. What is also lovely is that the project has reached and touched so many people across all ages, from our youngest participant who is 11 months old, to the older residents in the village", said Annabel.

New safety measures for walkers and cyclists

A segregated cycleway and footway on the B3108 road between Winsley and Bradford on Avon has been approved, giving cyclists the option of a traffic-free ride from Winsley into Bradford and then on to Bath along the Kennet & Avon canal. Wiltshire Council has received funding for the project as part of the Government's Covid-19 plans for reallocating road space for safe walking and cycling.

The proposal for the scheme was put forward by Wiltshire Councillor Johnny Kidney. Work is due to start within the next four weeks and will involve re-allocating part of the existing carriageway to create a cycleway. The footway will remain separate from the cycleway.

Litter is a safety issue, says Highways England

Roadside litter is not just unsightly but a threat to wildlife and the environment, as well as a safety hazard for motorists. Highways England (HA) has begun installing signs and litter bins in laybys on major roads in the south-west, including Wiltshire and Somerset, to discourage littering. The £80,000 scheme is designed to help local councils which are being swamped by sackfuls of litter.

HA will be working at 14 locations on major roads, including the A303 and A4.

Wiltshire Councillor Bridget Wayman said: "We welcome this initiative on our major roads in Wiltshire, and we are pleased to be working in partnership with Highways England to reduce litter throughout the county. Wiltshire is a beautiful county and we are committed to keeping it that way, so please use these bins and help to keep our laybys litter free."
